EASTER SUGGESTS EGGS: HERE ARE NEW RECIPES

Easter even though a sacred day immediately suggests spring, eggs and egg hunts. The cheapness of eggs and their high nutritive value assure them of a valuable place in the diet before or after Easter.

Eggs are exceedingly high in vitamin content. They contain vitamins A, B, D and E, reports Miss Willota Moore, instructor in nutrition at Oregon State college. Vitamins are body regulators essential for proper functioning of the system.

Eggs are also valuable because of their high mineral content. Phosphorus, iron and sulphur are all found in egg yolk. The protein found in eggs is of superior quality, because it is of animal origin and easily assimilated by the human body. Milk is the only rival of eggs as a nutritious and complete natural food.

One attractive way of serving eggs is as bacon rings thus: Line muffin rings or ramekins with slices of bacon, which have been slightly pan broiled. Break an egg into center of each, and season with a bit of butter and a few grains of salt and pepper. Place in a moderate oven to bake until eggs are set. Garnish with parsley and serve immediately.

A dainty luncheon dish is golden rod eggs. To make these mince hard cooked egg whites finely with a silver fork, and season well with salt and pepper. Force yolks through a sieve and season. Add whites to white sauce made of butter, flour and milk, and pour over toast. Pile yolks lightly over the too. Garnish with parsley.

Creamed eggs may be easily prepared by cutting whole hard cooked eggs in eighth lengthwise and heating in white sauce without stirring. Pour over toast. A bit of curry powder may be added to the white sauce as a variation.

Plain or foamy omelets are delicious. Here is one good recipe: To yolks of four fresh eggs beaten until thick and lemon colored, add salt and pepper to taste. Fold into whites beaten dry, to which one-fourth cup of water had been added when half beaten. Pour mixture into hot skillet greased with melted butter. Cook over low fire, uncover after 2 minutes. When the omelet is well puffed—after 5 or 6 minutes—it will have light brown lower crust. Finish in a slow oven, until top is firm to touch. Crease omelet at right angle to handle of pan, fold over; invert hot platter over top. Garnish with parsley and serve immediately.
