SIX OUT OF NINE CONVICTED IN ZEV LIQUOR PLOT CASE

SEATTLE, Feb. 27.—Six persons were convicted and three acquitted in the verdict of the jury in the Zev liquor conspiracy case. The verdict was reached at 10:30 yesterday morning and opened in federal court today.

The following were convicted: Benjamin A. Newman, John Arthur Boyd, Christopher Skrondahl, Laurent Verecken, Fred Nourse and Dan Huron. They announced thru their attorneys that they would appeal. Jack Minsky, Louis Bussanich and Mrs. Eva Boyd were found not guilty.

The case was given to the jury late Saturday night. Three hours of actual deliberation were required to reach the verdict.

Alfred M. Hubbard and Richard L. Grant, suspended prohibition agents, were the principal government witnesses. One thousand dollars in cash, alleged to have been paid as an attempted bribe, and a quantity of liquor seized when the speedboat Zev was captured, was the material evidence against the defendants.

Sentences were imposed on the six convicted conspirators at once. Newman and Boyd were sentenced to 15 months in McNeil Island Skrondahl and Nourse drew a year and a day in prison and were fined \$500 each. Verecken and Huron were fined \$250 and given a county jail sentence of six months.

A two-day stay of sentence was granted to give the other defendants time to file new bonds and notices of appeal.

THREE CHINAMEN DIE IN TONG WAR

CALEXICO, Cal., Feb. 27.—Tong war broke out in the Chinese quarter of Mexicali, across the border from here, last night, and today one of the most prominent Oriental resort owners in lower California and two of his henchmen were dead while three others were injured in hospitals.

Francisco Chao, Chinese owner of the resort, "Casino Chino" and the "Mexicali cabaret," died with five bullets in his head, and two in his chest.

Chee Gee and Alfonso Yee, both close aides of Chao and employed in the two gambling palaces, were the others killed.
