Essay Contest Is Open Students Of County Schools

Students of the 7th, 8th, 9th and 10th grades of the schools of the county have an opportunity to share in the \$50 in prizes to be distributed by the News-Review for essays on the subject "What Makes Me Grow from Day to Day," submitted to the contest editor on or before March 12. The newspapers and magazines of the country today show the claims of various food products, while the text books used in school together with valuable books to be found in the public libraries, afford a wealth of material from which to prepare essays on the subject assigned for this contest. It is not necessary to select any one food, either natural or manufactured, nor is it necessary to take any group of foods, but what is desired is an essay on body building, written in a manner showing that careful study has been given the matter of proper foods to bring about strong, healthy bodies.

For the best essay of not more than 350 words in length, the News-Review will give a first prize of \$15, while other prizes will range down to \$5, there being five cash awards offered.

All students must be regularly attending either public or recognized private or parochial schools. All essays will be judged strictly upon their merits. They must be written on regular theme or letter head paper with a margin of at least 1½ inches at the left side of the paper and must be written on one side only.

WM. H. BARNUM, OF MEDFORD, PIONEER CAPITALIST, DIES

MEDFORD, Feb. 28.—William H. Barnum, long identified with the industrial activities of this city, died this morning, aged 71 years.

MAJESTIC

OLYNTHUS, RAZED BY MACEDONIANS, IS DISCOVERED

BALTIMORE, Feb. 28.—Johns Hopkins faculty members and a group of Baltimore men connected with the Baltimore museum of art are awaiting with interest further reports from Dr. David M. Robinson, professor of archaeology at Johns Hopkins University, on discovery of the site of the city of Olynthus, razed by Philip of Macedonia about 400 B. C.

For centuries the location of the city had been uncertain, but a cable message from Dr. Robinson to Dr. Hugh Young of this city announced the finding of the site. Authorized by the Baltimore group, Dr. Robinson reported he had engaged 100 refugees for excavation work.

Dr. Robinson reported the find in a letter written January 15, and in his cable last week, he added to this report "fortress, granaries, wine press, many statues, large head of Silenus, many vases, important Greek villa, coins already found."

The site is about 400 kilometers from Salonika.

MYRTLE CREEK MAN DEAD; FUNERAL WED.

Berry R. Jones passed away at his home at Myrtle Creek last evening at about 5 o'clock following a brief illness. He was born on October 16, 1855, at Myrtle Creek and lived there but for brief trips away, during his entire life. He was 69 years, 4 months and 11 days old at the time of death.

Mr. Jones was married to Hattie Rhee on June 30, 1888. Four children and the widow survive. They are Charles and Clinton Jones, Clara Copeland and Hazel Weaver, all of Myrtle Creek. He also leaves a sister, Mrs. Mary L. Brewer, of Coos county, and a brother, Henry Jones, of South Myrtle Creek and twelve grandchildren. The body has been taken to the Roseburg Undertaking company parlors and the funeral will be held on Wednesday at Myrtle Creek, services to be at 2 o'clock in the afternoon at the Methodist church. Rev. Walbeck will officiate and interment will be in the Myrtle Creek cemetery. M. E. Ritter has charge of arrangements.
