SEDUCING A STATE

Just why various states and the government should figure on doing state printing any more than they should figure on doing state banking, state clothes manufacturing or state grocery wholesaling, is a mystery to most people. The cost records of state printing plants and of government printing do not offer encouragement to the taxpayers to have public funds expended in this manner, even if such state industries were consistent with our form of government. The Mississippi Press association, backed solidly by the job printers of that state, are fighting a state printing plant from the standpoint of the principle involved in the undertaking. The publishers are working under the motto, "Keep the government out of business, but put business into government." They will seek to show that it is bad business judgment for the state to engage in a venture of this character; that it would be just as logical for the state to engage in the wholesale grocery or clothing business. They hope to save the state from being seduced into setting itself up in business in competition with private citizens and taxpayers. After the state went into the printing business, it would be but a step for supporters of a socialistic program to advocate that it go into some other line of business. Thus all private citizens and business men are interested in the fight of the Mississippi publishers, to uphold the American principle favoring private initiative and enterprise and the right of the individual to carry on his business free from the crushing influence of government ownership, control or operation of industry.

Umpqua valley broccoli is now up to \$1.75 per crate in the Portland market. This is for the best grade. It is still below the top quotation of last year, around \$2.00 per crate, chiefly in the eastern markets where there was less competition than on the Pacific coast from other varieties of fresh vegetables. Before the present shipping season is over, the price may climb up to the 1927 mark, if not go higher. Inferior grades are selling in Portland now for \$1.00 and \$1.25 per crate, hardly enough for the grower to break even. The same market is offering the handsome price of 25 cents per pound for best quality lambs and 27 cents for top-grade live turkeys. All of which proves the truth of two trite sayings: that the farmer who has money is the one who always has something to sell and that quality counts first in reaping profits.

Now that the Hickman trial is on the verge of being forever forgotten, it might pay us to consider, once more, the whole question of "expert testimony" in murder trials. In the Hickman trial we had two sets of psychiatrists, one called by the state, the other by the defense. The state experts unanimously declared that Hickman was sane; the defense experts unanimously contradicted them and said he was insane. To a layman, it would seem that there are only two possible deductions to be drawn. Either there are psychiatrists who will testify to anything if they get paid for it, or the whole science of psychiatry is so poorly developed that there are cases where it is utterly impossible to say whether a man is sane or insane.

The spirit of modernity has been permeated that old western industry of cattle rustling. Down in Curry county, Oregon, according to reports, range thieves are using automobile trucks to take away cattle and sheep. To halt these depredations, the county may yet have to supply its officers with airplanes.

NINE MILLION WOMEN IN U. S. INDUSTRIES

BOSTON, Feb. 28.—Although 20 years ago there was only one woman in every ten in the United States, today there are now about nine million women and girls in industrial, commercial, mechanical and professional positions in the United States.

Mrs. Mary Schenck Woolman, textile specialist for the General Federation of Women's Clubs, made this report in an address before the department of university education of the National Education association here today. After first crowding the unskilled occupations, she added:

GOODFREY WINS 10-ROUND BOUT WITH UZCUDUN

Negro Behemoth, 44 Lbs. Heavier Than Spaniard, Forced to His Best

MAULING IS TERRIFIC

Neither Fighter on Verge of Knockout Any Time—Attendance Sets New Record

(Associated Press Leased Wire).

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 28.—George Goodfrey, left-handed fighter, was established more definitely in the status that has long been claimed for him by his backers and admirers—that of a champion of the heavyweights. Before the greatest crowd ever to witness a ring spectacle in the far west, the giant negro last night clubbed and mauled his way to a referee's decision over Paulino Uzcudun, the bounding Spanish basque. But it was only after the squatty woodchopper of the Pyrenees, fighting for a shot at Gene Tunney's crown, had lashed the big negro into giving his best to win.

It was a one-sided affair insofar as physical measurements were concerned, but what the basque ring idol lacked in size he made up in fight and a stout heart. Goodfrey, at 234 pounds, outweighed his stocky adversary by 44 pounds, towered over him by several inches, and outreached him by several more.

Paulino Drives in Hard. The wild rushing Paulino opened the going with a two-handed mauling attack. Goodfrey, however, aided by his superior bulk, tied him up shortly after and through the early sessions of the fight the negro held the advantage. Uzcudun clung in to his bigger opponent steadily enough to take the second.

In the sixth, the woodchopper again was able to wield his mauling attack, and continued on the aggressive throughout the next two rounds, taking them, round after round. He bored in continually, bumping with both fists to the body and face. Several times he backed the ring Goliath into the ropes or a corner and worked steadily on his misdeeds.

But there Goodfrey, stung by the "mile" that faced him, stopped the march of the basque, setting upon the black, lumbering Spaniard with his clubbing blows to the body and crossing to the face. In the tenth Goodfrey continued the mauling of his smaller opponent, beating him from rope to rope throughout the round. There were no knockdowns and at no time did either of the brawlers appear in danger of a knockout.

Fight Money Maker. The attendance at the fight set new marks in western boxing history. Official figures showed that 36,000 persons paid \$121,191 to see the giant negro gain the verdict over his basque rival. However, of this crowd, the actual attendance was closer to 40,000. INA COOLBRITH, CALIFORNIA POET LAUREATE, DEAD

BERKELEY, Calif., Feb. 29.—Ina Coolbrith, 85, poet laureate of California, died at the home of her niece here shortly after midnight this morning. She was critically ill early in the winter, but rallied, and had been in comparatively good health until shortly before her death.

Born of Puritan stock, Miss Coolbrith came to California 75 years ago and got her first glimpse of western life in the mining camps. She became the only woman member of the early day Bohemian group in San Francisco and through her literary accomplishments was hailed as "the Sappho of the West."

In 1895 Miss Coolbrith's best known book, "Songs from the Golden Gate," was published. "A Perfect Day" and "Other Poems" had previously appeared. Her writings won the admiration of George Meredith and other English writers of the Victorian age.

The poetess was the only woman ever to be elected to membership in the Bohemian club of San Francisco. She made poet laureate of California by act of the state government in 1916, and that title was conferred upon her with great ceremony. She realized but little money from her writings. Miss Coolbrith never married.
