THE STATE MARKET AGENT'S LETTER

The Dales Packing Corporation was organized recently and took over the fruit handling property of the Kings Products Co., which was operated as a dehydrating plant before that company was manipulated into bankruptcy. The new company is composed of local capitalists, headed by Hon. J. L. Kelly and his sons, and the intention is to, dry apricots, prunes and apples this year, and some spinach, with the purpose of adding other products later. This will make a local market for producers in the upper Columbia valley (rhyme) to The Dales and will maintain a prosperous industry with good payroll, says the Optimist.

Winter Wheat Suffered

Reports from Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Missouri, Tennessee and Kentucky are to the effect that fall sown wheat was seriously injured by unfavorable weather conditions last fall and by lack of snow covering during the winter. Thus, the soft red winter wheat crop promises to be a small one again this year. In some sections it is claimed that very little wheat survived the winter. These conditions have already considerable effect on the markets. Advances from Russia, Hungary, Jugoslavia and Albania indicate a shortage of foodstuffs and now, with a crop scare developing in the United States, a higher level of values is anticipated.

Ex-Praeher Now Power in Business World

Utilities Worth Billion and Half Headed by Cyrus S. Eaton and Associates.

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio, March 1.—The seats of the mighty have been shifted in the "alley," where a great part of America's steel is produced.

A 73-year-old man, one 70 and the third a comparative youngster of 44 sit in new positions of financial power in the steel industry centered in and around the Mahoning Valley, "the Ruhr of America."

Just three years ago the youngest of the triumvirate, Cyrus S. Eaton of Cleveland, figuratively slayed \$18,000,000 down on a conference table—that was his entry into the steel business.

In 1906 he was a Baptist minister in Cleveland. Today he is the chief figure which resulted in the Republic-Trust steel merger to form a new company with assets of \$250,000,000.

Eaton left his pastorate for an executive position in a public utility corporation. One year later found him immersed in public utility promotions, which resulted, after six years, in the organization of the Continental Gas and Electric corporation, one of the largest power companies in the United States.

Today Eaton and a small group of associates control public utilities scattered throughout the midwest, representing a billion and a half dollars in capitalization.

The incident of the \$18,000,000 trump play occurred when Eaton learned that "Trust" steel was heading for the financial rocks. He was told \$18,000,000 would put the corporation off its feet—and he furnished the \$18,000,000.
