NEW ASSISTANT REVENUE CHIEF FORMER RESIDENT

Harris F. Mires, better known in this county as Fred Mires, a son of Benton Mires, pioneer merchant of Drain, has just been appointed to the position of assistant collector of internal revenue, according to press dispatches. Mr. Mires was born and reared at Drain, the son of Benton Mires, who for many years has been one of the prominent residents of the northern part of the county.

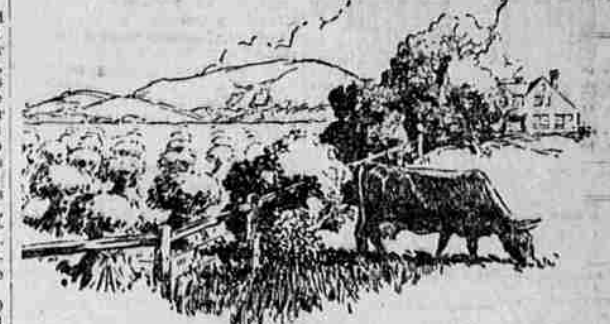
She told the court the children she thought were abducted by their father, had never been located by her. The court gave their official custody to her and directed the father to pay \$300 a month to her for their support.

SIXTH OF U. S. CANDY
SELLS FOR ONE PENNY

NEW YORK, March 1.—(A. P.)—The childish plea, "Give me a penny for candy," has not lost its meaning since the days when pennies would buy other things than sticks of gum and lollipops.

Penny candy sales increased by 3,000,000 pounds in 1926, the department of commerce has discovered, though prices went down so that the amount spent on penny candy was \$1,500,000 less than in the year before.

Sugar, milk, chocolate, nuts, butter, gelatine, corn syrup, and fruits were among the ingredients that went into the making of 177,645,996 pounds of penny candy, which comprised 16 per cent of all the confectionery produced in the United States.

WOMAN HAS CLOSE CALL
IN PARACHUTE JUMP

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., March 1.—Nursing slight injuries today

after she miraculously escaped death when the cord of her parachute became entangled in the plane from which she made a test jump preparatory to attempting a new altitude leap yesterday, Miss Jeanne Durand, 18, declared she would try the jump again Sunday.

"It's the last thing I ever do," she credited her life today to a skillful maneuvering of the plane by the pilot, Dr. R. L. Ellis, Minneapolis, who, observing her plight, when the jump failed at an altitude of 1,500 feet, circled down to land on one wheel and tilted the craft so that Miss Durand would not be dashed against the ground.

Hanging helpless from the wing of the plane, Miss Durand was taken off by field attaches, who took her to a hospital.
