SIGNS OF SPRING ARE OBSERVED IN FARM ACTIVITY

The agricultural industry is preparing for spring work, although the season is not so far advanced as it was at this time a year ago, according to the March 1 report on the agricultural situation by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, United States Department of Agriculture.

Planting and growing are going forward slowly in the South, and some cotton is in the ground around the Gulf. A tendency to increase acreage of important truck crops is noted. Farmers in ten states report an intended increase of about 3 per cent in early potato acreage. The spring lettuce acreage is around 50 per cent larger than last year's, the increase being especially marked in Arizona and California.

"The winter marketing season is drawing to a close under varying circumstances," according to the report. "Corn has moved in large volume especially from the western corn belt and at rising prices. The expected heavy run of hogs has also materialized, with prices nearly \$4 per hundred pounds below last year's. The number of hogs slaughtered under February inspection during January was 214 per cent larger this year than last. The price ratio between corn and hogs is no longer in favor of the feeder."

"Larger stocks of potatoes were carried through the winter compared with last year and, for the most part, have moved out at lower prices, especially in the West. Eastern growers have had an encouraging year. If one may judge by their expressed intention to increase potato acreage by about 10 per cent this spring. Such increase, if accompanied by fairly good yields, might mean very ample supplies next fall."

"One encouraging development this winter has been in the lamb market. There were twice as many lambs on feed in the West as a year ago, and in spite of the fewer lambs in the corn belt some misgiving was expressed about the marketing of these western lambs. Reports the middle of last month showed more than 1,250,000 lambs in the three important western districts compared with half that number a year ago. But these lambs have been marketed in an easy way and meanwhile instead of going down the market has gone up. Lamb prices averaged about \$15.50 per 100 pounds in latter February against about \$12.50 a year ago."

"The cattle market made a seasonal decline during February but prices averaged between \$3 and \$4 per 100 higher than last year's, in general, the winter markets

have been encouraging to most producers of livestock products except hogs."

COMBINE HARVESTERS ARE OBJECT OF SHORT SCHOOL

OREGON STATE AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Mar. 5.—Uses, limitations, adjustment and general economical operation of combine harvesters will be the subject of a one day school here Friday, March 16, which will be open to all present or prospective owners of these machines. The school is sponsored by the farm crops and agricultural engineering departments of the school of agriculture.

The program is prepared largely for farmers of western Oregon where 75 combines are now owned and where many more are contemplating making such investments but are undecided about their suitability.

"Not every grain farmer can make profitable use of a combine," says W. J. Gilmore, head of the agricultural engineering department, "while those who can want to know how to get the most efficient use out of an investment that requires a \$2,000 outlay. All such questions will be 'threshed' out."

C. D. Kinsman, formerly with the U. S. Department of Agriculture and author of "An Appraisal of Power Used on Farms in the United States," will be the principal outside speaker. A new combine will be here for demonstration purposes. All four harvester companies, the Western, International, Advance-Rumely and J. I. Case, have agreed to send specialists to assist in the program which is as follows:

9:30-10:00—"The Combine Situation in Oregon," W. J. Gilmore, professor of agricultural engineering.

10:00-11:00—"Results of National Combine Study," C. D. Kinsman.

11:00-12:00—"Crops and varieties suited to the use of the combine," George R. Hyslop, chief in farm crops.

1:30-2:30—"Combine Adjustments for Grain Saving."

2:30-3:00—"The Combine as a Harvester for Grass Seed and Seed Grain."
