NEW YORK, Mar. 7.—Gene Tunney may have his social obligations to fulfill while spending most of the winter in Florida, but he is not allowing them to interfere with preparations for his fistic engagements in the summer.

The picture of gentleman Gene, as brought back from Miami Beach by the big gymnasium and muscle man, Artie McGovern, is not of an athlete in repose on the sands but of an energetic business man concentrating upon the plans for one or two deals this year in left hooks preferred.

"Tunney is close to fighting shape right now, training regularly and thoroughly," said McGovern. "Like Babe Ruth he knows the value of all year around condition. Gene is within three pounds of his best fighting weight now. He doesn't vary that much the year around, he told me."

For those who may be skeptical of the way Mr. Tunney puts in his time, this is a sample daily schedule verified by Mr. McGovern:

Up and dressed by 8:30 or 8:45, regularly, after going through a series of setting up exercises.

Boxing, shadow boxing and sparring with one or more of his camp mates.

Hearty breakfast, about 10:30, the first of only two meals on the daily schedule.

Attends to correspondence and other business until about 1:30.

Afternoon diversion, usually golf, the champion's only sports hobby outside the ring.

Dinner at about six, followed by evening social activity or reading before retiring in time to insure regular rest of at least 8 hours.

Tunney's rules for health and proper condition are far from complicated. "If I was passing on any advice to boys and young men," Gene told McGovern, "I would urge them to do these four main things—exercise consistently and properly, regulate the daily schedule, eat wholesome food and avoid stimulants." He does not use even coffee or tea. Two quarts of water are part of his daily diet. While he is in training camp before a fight, he drinks two quarts of milk daily.

The opinion abroad that Gentleman Gene has become "high hat" since assuming championship stature is not shared by Professor McGovern.

"I think some of the boys do Gene an injustice in spreading that idea," said Artie. "They do not understand him."

"Gene is not a professional gladiator and never will be. Neither has he any allies around to promote his personality and color. The champion has never pulled any of the 'how are you, kid' stuff, accompanied by the old slap on the back, just for effect. That may be why some of the boys think he's uptight."

There's one thing you can be sure of. Gene Tunney knows his own business and attends to it himself. If and when he takes it on the chin, and stays down, it won't be because he has neglected to be fit in mind and body."

FIND MAN'S BODY

KELLEY GETS HIS
THIRD SENTENCE

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 7.—Ellsworth Kelley, convicted of first degree murder in connection with the killing of two guards when he and three other convicts shot their way out of the state prison here on the evening of August 12, 1925, was for the third time sentenced to hang by Circuit Judge Perry R. Kelly here today.

The date for the execution, which Kelley has escaped for two and a half years through appeals and petitions by his attorneys, was set by Judge Kelly for Friday, April 13.

Kelley was brought into court today by Warden James Lewis and Deputy Warden Hawley. In a short talk he begged the pardon of the court for any remarks he might have made on occasion of his previous appearances before it.

LARSON FOUND
GUILTY ON VICE
CHARGE CASE

requires the testimony of an accomplice to be corroborated by additional testimony. It was held by the defense that in this case the boy called as the state's chief witness was equally guilty with Larson and an accomplice in all the acts, and that therefore his evidence could not be held against Larson unless there was sufficient additional evidence of a corroborative nature to connect up the testimony of the accomplice.

Claiming that the evidence had been insufficient a motion was introduced last night for a directed verdict, and the argument on that question was renewed this morning. Judge Hamilton, however, overruled the motion, holding that the jury should decide whether or not the additional testimony was sufficient, and in his instructions told the jury that the statements of the boy must be sufficiently corroborated before a verdict of guilty could be returned.

The jury, however, apparently seemed satisfied that the circumstantial evidence linked in sufficiently with the testimony of the youth to prove the charges brought in the indictment, and quickly returned their verdict.

The closing arguments of the district attorney were scathing in their denunciation of the prisoner, and very concise in recounting the evidence. The argument of the defense was largely in connection with the technical point of law involved in the case.

Maximum 15 Years
Following the return of the jury's verdict Judge Hamilton announced that the sentence of the court will be pronounced Saturday morning at 10 o'clock. The maximum that can be imposed is fifteen years in the state penitentiary.

Prisoner Closely Guarded
Sheriff Webb stated this afternoon that the prisoner is being kept closely guarded. He has been reported to have told other prisoners in the jail that he would commit suicide if convicted. It is also feared that an attempt may be made to break jail.

His brother and a friend arrived today from California and officers state that he may have other friends in this vicinity, and they are keeping a careful guard over the jail to see that no attempt is made to release him.

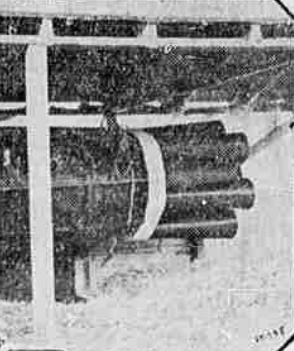

EUREKA RUM RAID
NETS 53 PERSONS

EUREKA, Calif., Mar. 7.—Fifty-one men and two women were arrested here last night in prohibition raids said to be the most extensive since the passage of the Volstead act. Federal officials rounded up the suspects and took them to jail, fixing bail at \$500 cash or \$1,000 bond. All but six of the prisoners obtained bail by midnight.

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Farm News

THE STATE MARKET
AGENT'S LETTERBy SEYMOUR JONES
Encouraging for Cherry Growers

The Dallas Itemizer-Observer says that the cherry growers of that vicinity are in hopes of some increase in the production of that fruit as will make Dallas a shipping point for fresh black cherries direct to eastern markets, instead of trucking them to Salem for train loading. "At the present time," says the paper, "prospects are very good for a cherry crop, and market indications are encouraging. Buyers are already in the field representing consignment shippers. Cherries during the past year or two have been the most profitable local fruit crop."

Give Them Iron Food
A correspondent of a farm exchange answering as to what can be done for a 12-year-old orchard that does not bear fruit, says: "Your land has no iron in it. Dig around your trees and plant old rusty iron nails and all sorts of broken iron. If you can obtain steel shavings from the machine shops, that would act quicker than pieces of iron. Drive a few rusty nails into the trunks of the trees this spring close to the ground and see the result."

Handling Seed Potatoes
Keeping freshly cut seed pieces in the dark results in better stands of potatoes, finds the experiment station. Sunlight usually injures them when freshly cut. By keeping them well moistened a thick covering is formed on the cut surface, serving as a protection from sunlight and rot. When handled in this way the seed often remains in good condition in the soil during the entire growing season.

Protecting the Apple
There was a high percentage of cull apples in the Hood River district last fall because of a misunderstanding early in the season about the laws regarding spray residue, which caused the growers to fail to follow the spraying program, thus giving the codling moth too much freedom of operation, but this year the growers are wide awake and are providing weapons and ammunition to dispose of Mr. Codling Moth and other pests.

Giving Unfair Advantages
Idaho potato growers are demanding that the Interstate Commerce Commission reconsider an order recently issued which gives to Wisconsin and Minnesota shippers a preferential rate to Texas and Oklahoma, which gives them an advantage of 22 1/2 cents a hundred pounds over the Idaho shippers. Oregon growers of potatoes are directly interested also and should join Idaho in the demand for fair play.

The wheat market continues firm, owing to unfavorable crop reports from some states, also from central European countries.

ADVISORY BOARD
CONFERENCE TO
START TOMORROW

Between fifty and seventy-five of the leading fresh fruit shippers and growers from all parts of the state are expected to arrive here tomorrow for the opening conference of the Pacific Northwest Advisory Board meeting. The conference of fruit men will start at 2 o'clock in the afternoon in the Indian room of the Umpqua hotel, and will be featured by addresses from some of the leading fruit men of the state.

Friday morning the main conference of the board will open at the armory, and it is expected that there will be an attendance of nearly 500 fruit, vegetable and livestock shippers and producers. This is the first time such a conference has ever been held outside of the leading cities of the Pacific northwest and the meeting is in the nature of an experiment to see whether or not it is advisable to hold future meetings in the smaller communities.

Another carload of American fence will arrive at Wharton Bros. this week.

WARRANT ISSUED
FOR THE ARREST
DR. KIRKPATRICK

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 7.—Warrant was issued today for the arrest of Dr. George Kirkpatrick, originator of a purported cure for tuberculosis, on charges of practicing medicine without a license.

Dr. Kirkpatrick, a veterinarian, developed a medicine which has been under investigation by a "citizen jury" appointed by Mayor George E. Baker.

The complaining witness against Dr. Kirkpatrick was Rosine C. Barnes, who alleged she went to him for treatment and took his medicine with disastrous results. Following a test of the Kirkpatrick medicine on tubercular cattle, some time ago, claim was made that the cattle showed cure. This was questioned in local medical circles.

Mayor Baker later appointed a committee to make an investigation of the medicine. This committee has not yet made a formal report.

HAKE ADVERSE REPORT

WASHINGTON, Mar. 7.—An adverse report was ordered today by the senate foreign relations committee on the Heflin resolution proposing withdrawal of American marines from Nicaragua.

FARM INDUSTRY ON
UPWARD TREND, IS
VIEW OF HARVEY

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 7.—America's farm problem will be solved by application of scientific methods, said Paul Harvey, speaker on international affairs, in a lecture here last night. Already the low point of depression has been passed and conditions are improving, he said.

Farming has been going through a transition. He pointed to the experience of Iowa farmers who have consolidated several farms

into a corporation, each farmer working his own unit and sharing in the company's activities and profits. Tom Campbell made a success of an investment of \$550,000 in a gigantic wheat farm enterprise in Montana, he said, and others would do the same.

Harvey said that a farm subsidy would have the effect of depriving farmers of the incentive to intensive effort in improving their own condition. He was not alarmed by the movement of population to the cities from the farm, saying that fewer farmers hereafter would produce more with the aid of implements and electricity.
