AMERICAN SCHOOL IN EGYPT VICTIM STUDENTS BATTLE

(Associated Press Local Wire)
CAIRO, Egypt, Mar. 8.—During a series of student disturbances yesterday, an attack was made by students of the Sheikh school at Assuit on the American College, causing minor casualties among the defenders, including Dr. Russell, the principal.

The Sheikh school students, who are on strike, endeavored to make the students of the American college come out also. The latter refused, whereupon the strikers smashed the gates, tore up trees and broke windows with stones.

Dr. Russell, with his staff, defended the building valiantly and the efforts to drive out the students under his care failed.

Student disturbances growing out of the Anglo-Egyptian question also took place in Cairo this morning. A body of 1500 striking students marched to the Wafd, or nationalist headquarters, and stoned police, the latter scattering the demonstrators after a charge.

In the melee eight policemen and 27 students were injured and were carried into the Wafd headquarters where they were given medical attention. The brush with the police produced more or less rioting in other streets and many of the rioters were clubbed.

As part of the same nationalist demonstration, school boys at Tanta, 500 miles northwest of Cairo, burned three automobiles, including one belonging to the Egyptian commandant who was severely manhandled.

Student demonstrations and strikes have been in progress ever since it became known that the differences between the Egyptian government and the British authorities over treaty negotiations were becoming accentuated.

NE YORK, Mar. 8.—Dr. Charles P. Russell of Hastings, Neb., who was reported injured in an attack on the American College at Cairo, has spent more than a score of years as an educator in Egypt. A former associate in the work of the school of which Dr. Russell is principal today said that the college proper is located a mile outside of Cairo while a preparatory branch is near the Cairo railway station.

In 1925 this college had 748 students, of whom 45 per cent were protestants, about the same number Coptic Christians and the remainder Musselmans.

BROOKLYN ROBINS TRAIN YOUNGSTERS

CLEVERWATER, Fla., Mar. 8.—Uncle Wilbert Robinson, manager of the Brooklyn Robins, sat on two chairs placed between the plate and first base as he watched his great pitchers tossing the ball to batmen.

Dazzy Vance, the speed ball king, was throwing bird shot at wide-eyed youngsters, swinging with one foot free. Jess Pratt, with a touch of silver in his hair, was showing a few left handed hooks and Bill Dink, his alert face lined by wrinkles of a dozen years on major league diamonds, was now and then contributing to the young fellow's education with a knuckle ball. Hard by the McWeney, even bigger Elliott, Babe Schneider and William Watson Clark were loosening their able arms.

Manager Robinson's eyes strayed from the pitcher's to his almost equally great catching staff, Deberry, Igaraves and Renline, and with a plaintive note in his voice, in a brief sentence, wrote a prescription for his ball club.

"What a bunch is run," he said. "The Brooklyn boys can only hope that he will get the run. He will not know for some time yet if his club is to be fulfilled. He does not want many, just a few will do he thinks, for his pitchers and catchers will form the basis for a tight defense. If baseball teams were made up only of batted Brooklyn, you would always be in the first division."

Dave Bamert, former manager of the Boston Braves, has added noticeable strength to the infield. He will play shortstop, probably between Partridge at second and Harry Riconda at third. Riconda seems likely to draw the first base assignment. Partridge is the only holdover.

Howard Freising will be available as utility as will O'Arcy, Rogers and Charlie Corgan of last year's team.

The Brooklyn outfield is scrambled. Captain Max Carey, the veteran, will start in center field. The field of candidates for the two other positions is large. Tyson, another of the men from the minors who have been in the majors before, will make a bid. Babe Herman, converted first baseman, is devoting all his time to outfield efforts and Arnold State is back again from last year. Harvey Hendrick, Brooklyn's lone 300 hitter in 1927, is now regarded as an outfielder, subject to call at first base. Overton Tremper, fast youngster who played well at times last season, is back again. Max West from Waco, Tex. Dan Taylor from Memphis, complete an outfield array that is impressive in numbers. Manager Robinson, who can go into a huddle with President Robinson, with out leaving his two chairs, has no idea how he will arrange the outfielders. He will seek a combination to supply his needs of run.

RELATIVES COMING FROM EAST FOR TRITES FUNERAL

Coroner Ritter found it unnecessary to call an inquest into the death of Rev. George P. Trites, killed yesterday afternoon at Oakland. Rev. Trites, who is pastor of the Methodist church at Sutherlin, purchased the old Methodist church at Oakland, the building being sold at public auction, having been abandoned several years ago. Rev. Trites together with several other workmen was engaged in tearing down the structure and hauling the materials to Sutherlin to be used in building houses there. They had, instead of tearing the building down, heard by board, pulled it down in sections, removing first the side walls, leaving the front and back walls supported by props. As the north wall was leaning slightly Rev. Trites proposed that it be allowed to fall, so that it would not be dangerous. The workmen yanked out the supports, and ran out from beneath the falling timbers, but Rev. Trites, slipped and fell, and was caught under the wall, his skull being fractured so that he died instantly.

The body was taken to the Dealing undertaking parlors in Oakland and is being held there until relatives can come from the East, the arrangements for the funeral having not yet been made. Rev. Trites, who was 58 years of age, is survived by a widow and an adopted son and daughter.

UMPQUA NOT INCLUDED IN SCHEDULED SURVEY

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 8.—Stream flow in five main rivers and many smaller streams of Oregon can be forecast accurately by a survey of snow in the mountains, State Engineer H. L. Luper believes, and such a survey is to be introduced in Oregon this year by the engineer. It will be in charge of Gail A. Hathaway, hydraulic engineer in the department, with the field work in the hands of the water masters in various parts of the state.

Depth, weight and water content of snow will be ascertained at stations in the Blue Mountains, Deschutes National Forest, Fremont National Forest and the headwaters of the Rogue River.

44-YEAR-OLD ENTRANT IN MARATHON IS FAVORITE

LOS ANGELES, Mar. 2.—One of the oldest entrants ranks as one of the prime favorites in the Los Angeles to New York marathon race, starting Sunday.

Arthur Newton is 44 years old, yet the British runner is regarded as one of the best bets among the 276 freedom-runners and walkers—qualified to start in the cross country event.

Hailed as England's greatest long distance runner, Newton holds several world's amateur records for marathon jaunts. He is credited with holding every record from 25 miles to the century mark. His acquisition of the 100 mile record was a recent accomplishment. It took 11 hours 22 1/2 seconds. The marathoner is a resident of the Rhodesia, Union of South Africa.

ANTELOPE FASTER THAN SPEEDING CAR IS CLAIM

GLACIER PARK, Mont., March 2.—The antelope is the swiftest thing on four legs, according to members of the Pack-Findley Wild Life Expedition, which spent some time in Glacier National Park last fall. Flowers given out by the American Nature Association show that when going at full speed this animal makes 15 ft. in a jump and that it runs as fast as 45 miles an hour.

The Pack-Findley Expedition went into the Park during September to gather moving and still pictures of mountain goats and wild life generally. Arthur Newton Pack, associate editor of the American Nature Magazine, and Van L. Findley, his field photographer, came out of the Park with new ideas concerning an antelope's fleetness.

"On a high plateau we came upon an old buck," Findley said. "He did not look so much for speed but how he could run when he not under way!"

"We chanced to be in a motor car in a level area that had little

or no vegetation when the buck decided the barrier had gone up, and the race was on.

"Stepping on the gas, we got right on Mr. Buck's tail and pulled alongside. I began to crank the camera. I asked the man at the wheel what the speedometer registered. 42 was his answer; then in a few seconds, 45. He was keeping his eye on the front wheel and the racing antelope because we wanted no collision right then."

"The buck seemed to like the game, and he let himself out a notch, but our stretch of clear country was gone and we hit some sage brush again. An antelope can negotiate sage brush, but an automobile can't. The buck kept on going for a mile and then turned and looked at us."

"Members of the United States Biological Survey measured the tracks and at top speed the antelope was doing 15 feet to the jump and going 45 miles an hour."

HEART PAYS FOR GREAT SPEED IN UNITED STATES

CHICAGO—Pity the poor, abused American heart. It bears the brunt of all the speed so much a part of the average citizen.

Dr. Franz M. Groedel, heart specialist and professor at Frankfurt university, Germany, broadcast this warning here recently.

He told his audience that life in America is putting a terrific strain on the human pumping station.

"You ride in fast autos when you ought to walk; you drink poison when you ought to have light wine and beer; you eat three heavy meals instead of four or five light ones; you tire yourselves with strenuous sports instead of exercising moderately; and most of the strain is on the heart."
