WORLD MARKET CONQUEST SEEN AS AIM OF U. S.

Super Production Prompts Campaign Abroad, Says Kin of Mussolini.

INFLUENCE IS FELT

Intervention in World War Brings "Highest Price With Interest" Is Declaration.

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
MILAN, Italy, Mar. 9.—The steadily growing prominence of the United States in world affairs was analyzed by Arnaldo Mussolini, brother of the premier, last night in a speech dealing with dominating forces in the world.

In the address, delivered before the cultural institute, he said America soon intended to pursue "a grandiose policy" and that because of economic necessity, the American market would launch out on world conquest.

He began his references to the United States by saying America could declare herself satisfied with possessing the maximum riches among nations. "In that privileged position, she seeks influence with her foreign policy of the European continent," he continued.

The United States intervention in the European war had its weight in the means which it offered old Europe to defend herself. For the rest her military heroism was limited to a few actions on the French front.

Intervention Cost Felt.
"We have paid the highest price with corresponding interest for this intervention and since then there has not been a problem affecting old Europe which has not always been discussed with a certain attitude of superiority among American circles."

"In a period of grave economic necessity those who have the means always find a way of imposing themselves. This explains how Parker Gilbert, the inter-allied commissioner for reparations at Berlin, an American who does not know a word of German, knows how to evaluate in a perfect manner Germany's economy."

Furthermore it is superfluous to recall America's ambiguous policy in regard to the league of nations."

World Market Needed.
Arnaldo Mussolini continued by saying that having privacy in the possession of gold was a great fortune, but also a great responsibility.

"The American internal market hereafter will no longer absorb surplus production and therefore it was necessary to launch out on the conquest of the world."

"This, he said, created a political problem."

"Go into this," he continued, "it is a people of such fabulous riches dominated by a universal idea."

"The force of bayonets would find a means to defend it and impose it on the whole world. Up to the American it is only a mass of reinforced concrete, she lacks the heaven of history. Nobler in its traditions and stronger in its conception is the English imperial formation."

SURFACE EUGENE AIRPORT MUDDY

Eugene is planning on immediate improvements in the airport there as a result of difficulties in getting the Cascadian, the big passenger airplane, into the field. When the big ship made a forced landing in Eugene a few days ago, when weather in the southern part of the state prevented continuation of the trip, was ground was so soft that the plane sank into the mud for several inches, making the landing dangerous and the take-off difficult. A gravelled runway is to be prepared immediately. The Eugene press announces. The passenger ship pilots are also complaining that the Medford runways are too narrow. Aviators greatly prefer a sod surface on a field, as gravel is thrown against the ship in landing, when there are loose rocks on the surface, the force of the propeller being sufficient to pick up the small pebbles. Where sod, however, is not practical gravel is the next choice.

It is the plan of Umpqua Post of the American Legion, sponsor of the Roseburg airport project, to sod the surface of the local field, provided the city purchases the land. It will be necessary to use gravel runways while the sod is started on the rest of the field, but eventually a sod surface will be secured on the entire tract, it is hoped.

After the field is properly drained there will be little difficulty, it is believed, in getting the sod started.

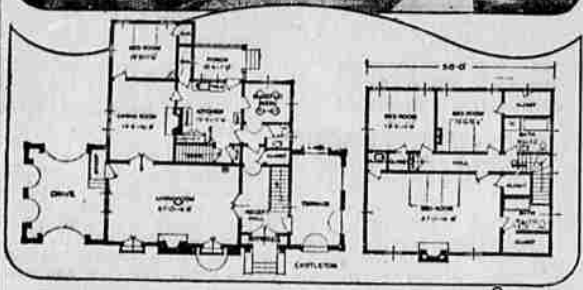

WRESTLING TRUST BUGABOO PERSISTS

CHICAGO, Mar. 10.—Still suspicious of a wrestling trust, Samuel P. Luzzo, member of the Illinois State Athletic Commission, took steps today to block the match between Ed "Strangler" Lewis, heavyweight champion, and Alex Garkawenko, billed as the European champion, scheduled for next Monday night.

Luzzo made public today his reasons for voting an emphatic "no" when the permit for the match was issued last week by Chairman Paul Prehn. There has been no third member of the commission, who might break such a deadlock, since John C. Highmeyer, the chairman at that time, sent his resignation to Governor Small last fall.

Rumors of dissension in the two-man commission have been current for some time, with reports that pressure was being brought to bear in behalf of Hans Steinko, the local contender of the New York state commission, and John Evko.

Luzzo, in a public statement, charged that Chairman Paul Prehn issued the permit for the Lewis-Garkawenko match over "vigorous protest" "overstepping all bounds of authority."

"Many reports have come to me recently," Luzzo said, "that many of these heavyweights are under the same management. And like-wise there are reports current in the middleweight division."

"I am investigating these and other reports and for many reasons I refuse to sanction this show. My vote stands as absolutely no."

"Wrestling is much in the public's disrepute not only here but in other sections."

Luzzo pointed out that Lewis had already defeated Garkawenko several times; that both are liable to fine and suspension for not being in training here five days previous to the match and that Joe Maloney of Utica, N. Y., whom Lewis wrestled at Kansas City, February 29, was on the semi-circuit of the one card Monday.

HERBERT HOOVER ENTERS 4 STATES

WASHINGTON, Mar. 9.—Herbert Hoover, for seven years secretary of commerce, today was definitely in the race in four states for 35 delegates to the Republican national convention at Kansas City.

This figure will be raised to 209 when plans are carried out to file his name in three other states having 75 delegates.

Further indications that friends of the wartime relief and food administrator are not going to let any grass grow under their feet in their quest for his presidential nomination in June were given yesterday when they obtained his consent to enter the May 8 primary in Indiana, where he will back another favorite son candidate, Senator Watson, for its 33 delegates.

Hoover has already filed in Ohio, where on April 24 he will fight it out with Senator Willis of that state for its block of 51 delegates; in Maryland whose delegates number 19 and Michigan, which has 33.

He also has definitely decided to enter California, his home state, with 29 delegates; New Jersey, with 31, and Oregon, with 13.

The players think that on a vote of confidence all of these problems the ayes have it. O'Farrell is throwing the ball and hitting it. Thayer's leg seems to be sound again with his chief worry a blister on his heel. Hafey will not have to wear spectacles and the batting Blades seems as fast as ever. Bell's hitting has been a sensation of the spring camp and Heth seems set for an impressive.

If all these rosy prospects develop, Bill McKechnie, a major league manager, again, will have a pleasant summer. His pitchers have rotated into great early season form and half a dozen of them could start now.

Former manager O'Farrell will have two able understudies in Gus Mancuso from Syracuse and Virgil Davis, late of Buffalo.

The pitching staff may be bolstered by a competent performer who was not included in advance calculation.

Tony Kaufmann, former Cub and Phillie, gives every indication of making a comeback.

Grover Cleveland Alexander, with his 34th birthday behind him, shows the way to all comers for hard work. The veteran Alex pitches longer than any one to bat in the morning and then bats in the afternoon.

Sylvester Johnson, who was brought from the Pacific coast at heavy expense by Detroit several years ago, has shown as much as any pitcher in the fold this spring. If these nine come through, the Cardinals will have a dozen ambitious youngsters.

The infield is established with Outley, Frisch, Thayer and Bell assigned. Rabbit Maranville, looking years younger than his admitted 34 winters and summers, will be held in reserve as will George Toporcer, who is many pounds over his normal weight, a good thing for a player of his nervous energy as the extra flesh gives him something to work on.

The Cardinal outfield is not so firmly established. The final condition of Hafey and Blades will be important and in addition four youngsters have made their presence felt. The outfield talent is so striking that Taylor and Dore hit may have to divide center field with some of it.
