CONDITION HARRY RAPP IS GREATLY IMPROVED TODAY

Coroner's Jury Selected to Hear Evidence But Will Wait for a Few Days.

Coroner Ritter last night drew a jury to inquire into the accident which happened Sunday, resulting in the death of Jack Wayne, local restaurant employe, and the serious injury of Harry Rapp. The jury is composed of H. O. Pargeter, Glen Wimberly, Stanley Kidler, John L. Huff, Joe Shockley and Oliver Johnson. The jury was sworn in last night and viewed the remains of the young man, who was killed in the accident, and an adjournment was then taken until the condition of Harry Rapp becomes such that his testimony can be taken.

Mr. Rapp was considerably improved today. He had partially regained consciousness and was much stronger. It is not believed that his injuries will prove fatal.

Mr. Rapp is the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Rapp and has spent the greater part of his life in Roseburg with the exception of the six years that he spent with the U. S. Marines, serving during the World War and later having active service in Russian and China. He returned home about two months ago and has since that time been in charge of the mechanical department at the Rapp Brothers Star Garage. He is a member of the American Legion.

Every effort is being made to locate the parents of Wayne, but so far it has been impossible to locate the parents. The local post of the American Legion, of which the deceased was a member, is assisting in trying to locate the parents, who moved sometime ago from Kentucky to some unknown address in Arkansas.

OWN Donation Described—I objected to doing so because I would be making a subscription that was not what it purported to be. As far as I recollect, he asked me to make the loan and hold the bonds, but to me that was the same thing. I told him I would make a bona fide subscription and that I had expected to make a subscription as I felt I was obligated to make one. I said I would send one for \$50,000. About that time I sent a check to the treasurer, Mr. Upham, at Chicago, for \$50,000.

As I said in my letter to you Saturday I had given only \$2,000 to the Harding campaign.

Early in the campaign Mr. Hays called me on the phone from New York and asked me to invite some people to a luncheon and that he and William Boyce Thompson would explain the financing plan. He said subscriptions were to be limited to \$2,000; one thousand before the convention and one thousand after the convention. I had not thought then of entering public office.

Raised Big Quota—Mellon explained that he saw Hays in New York and was given a \$150,000 quota for the Pittsburgh district, he said, and the quota was over-subscribed.

"It was all done consistently with that plan. I subscribed \$2,000 as did my brother and my nephews," the secretary continued. As he talked the secretary sat far forward in his chair with his forearms on the table.

Senator Reed, Republican, Pennsylvania, a close personal friend, sat near him.

"What explanation did Hays make about where the bonds came

from?" Senator Walsh asked. "He said he had a large amount. It seems to me it was about \$300,000. It's difficult to remember details now. He wanted to use them so that there would not be one large subscription to the party."

"Did Hays tell you where he got the bonds?" Walsh pursued. "Oh, from Sinclair," said the secretary as he moved back in his chair.

"What did you understand to be the deficit at that time?" "It's not very clear, but it was in excess of one million dollars."

"Knew Nothing of Shady" "Did any of your banks make any loan to the Republican national committee?"

"No. That subscription from Sinclair I looked upon as without significance. I had no knowledge of any irregular proceedings regarding Teapot Dome. You see that was in the winter of 1923."

"Let me call your attention that the taking of testimony in the naval oil leases began in October, 1923, and this transaction you tell of took place a month later," Walsh said.

"That may be," Mellon replied. "I can't follow all these investigations. I have troubles of my own and much work to do."

"Did Mr. Gilbert act in any other capacity than that of messenger?"

"What's your recollection as to the time you had the bonds?"

"As I said, it's not clear. It may have been several days or longer. I have no recollection positively. It was an incidental matter that was disposed of."

Senator Walsh had read into the record all correspondence he had had with Secretary Mellon relating to the Sinclair bonds and the income tax that might be due from the now extinct Continental Trading company.

One of Mellon's letters said the agents of the internal revenue bureau had been investigating the matter of the income tax the Continental should have paid on its \$3,000,000 of profits in the oil deal with the late A. E. Humphreys of Denver, and the Prairie Oil and Gas company and the Sinclair Crude Oil Purchasing company.

The treasury secretary said the inquiry had not yet reached the stage where he could advise Senator Walsh whether any additional legislation was necessary to prevent companies in the future from escaping taxes as the Continental did.

Not Obligated to Tell—Questioned by Chairman Nye, Mellon said three or four persons met him to discuss the cleaning up of the deficit, but Hays was not present.

"Was the matter of the Sinclair loan discussed at that meeting?" "Oh, no, that was before the bonds were given."

"You knew that Sinclair was involved. Won't you tell us why you did not come forward sooner and tell the committee of the Sinclair bonds?"

"Well, would that have added anything?" Mellon said. "You had all the information and that all could have been added was my name. It was an incidental thing. What purpose would have been served by that? I could not have told about \$200,000 in bonds."

"You had reason to assume that the bonds Hays gave you were Continental bonds?" Nye said.

"The bonds had been returned," Mellon said. "It never occurred to me that there was any reason for me to tell about it. I had no responsibility with the republican national committee or with Mr. Sinclair."

MELLON TELLS WHY HE SHIED AT OIL BONDS
(Continued from page 1.)

opened and Hays took it away with him. WASHINGTON, Mar. 13.—Testifying under oath today before the senate Teapot Dome committee, Secretary Mellon said that Will Hays in 1923 told him he had received a batch of bonds from Harry F. Sinclair to be used in wiping out the Republican national committee campaign debt of 1920.

Mellon said he declined to take \$50,000 in bonds from Sinclair on the ground that the deal would not be what it purported to be. Mellon was placed under oath by Chairman Nye. The veteran cabinet officer's right hand wavered slightly as he held it aloft during the oath.

Hays, former chairman of the Republican national committee, reached the room just as Mellon began to testify. Hays' Visit Recited "I had a phone call from Mr. Hays from New York saying he was sending me the Liberty bonds and that he would come to Washington to see me about it," Mellon said. "I was busy at the time and laid the package aside. I kept on being busy and forgot them. The next morning I opened the package and saw that it contained bonds."

"In what amount?" asked Senator Walsh of Montana, the committee prosecutor. "\$50,000. Mr. Hays did not come that day and I took the bonds home for safe keeping as I had mistaked the combination to my office safe.

"Mr. Hays came on here. He was going to Indiana and I said I would send them on to him at New York. This I did through S. Parker Gilbert, under secretary of the treasury."

"What was the denomination of the bonds?" Walsh asked. "I did not notice."

"Did you keep any record of the numbers?" "No."

"When Hays came what did he say to you?" "Generally, it was that he had a large subscription in bonds and he asked me to take these and hold them and that I make a subscription to the committee (Republican national committee) to discharge the hanover debt.

SLIDE COVERS 125 FEET R. R. TRACKS EASTERN OREGON

LA GRANDE, Ore., Mar. 12.—Rock and dirt, loosened by rains, swept over the tracks of the O. W. R. & N. company branch line to Joseph, Oregon, to a depth of 25 feet, halting rail traffic until Wednesday night or Thursday when a crew of 125 men expect to have the debris cleared from the right of way.

The slide, which stretched about 125 feet, occurred between Vincent and Minan, about 35 miles from here. At this point the state highway does not parallel the railroad so that auto transportation is not impeded, although stages report occasional rocks falling onto the highway in Willowa county. The Oregon Trail highway between La Grande and Pendleton and between Haines and Baker is reported to be in poor condition due to "frost boils."

Load limits, recently placed on the highway, are being strictly enforced.

FOSTER BUTNER SAYS NEW CRATE MEETING FAVOR

Foster Butner, of the Umpqua Broccol Exchange is well pleased with the new crate which his association is using this year. The new style crate was adopted after a great deal of heated discussion, the Umpqua Broccol Exchange being the only one of the shipping concerns to use this style crate, which greatly reduces the weight of the shipment by cutting down the amount of leaves in which the heads are packed, the same number of heads being provided per crate.

"Our new crate is a winner," Mr. Butner said today, reporting that immediate repeat orders had been received together with compliments for the new crate. "Our first eastern car arrived in Chicago Thursday," he said, "and the government report for that date reads: 'California pony crates fancy \$2.00 to \$2.15. Oregon new style crates 16x23x17 inches, medium to large sizes \$2.25.' In other words, our crate not only sold for more money than the old style crate but it was transported for about 25 cents less freight charges.

"The Chicago Fruit and Vegetable Reporter under date of March 8 reports 'W. J. Ellis and Company received the first car of Oregon broccol yesterday. Quality was fully up to expectations. This car was shipped by the Umpqua Broccol Exchange and was sold by their Chicago representative the Riley, McFarland Co.'"

"Under date of March 10 we have the following letter from the Canadian Fruit Distributors of Vancouver, B. C.: 'Car Pacific 31946 arrived this morning. The trade was delighted with the quality of your broccol and the new crate pack is satisfactory. This car was peddled on all the jobbers were participating in sales and several of them mentioned to me this morning what a nice delivery.'"

"From all indications it would appear that our new crate is a success in every way."
