At this time Mrs. Sadie Orr Dunbar, executive secretary of the Oregon Tuberculosis association, was present and gave a very interesting talk, urging the Douglas County Health association to send a representative to the institute to be held in Portland June 25th. Dr. Jacobs, publicity director of the National Tuberculosis association will be present and conduct the institute.

Mrs. H. C. Boyle, county seal sale chairman, gave a report of the results of the Christmas seal sale in Douglas county. It is as follows: Roseburg, Mrs. B. R. West, chairman, \$151.49; Winchester Bay, \$10.00; Smith River, \$26.90; Garfield, \$17.50; Reedsport, \$71.39; Mrs. Stanley Chouin, chairman; Brinn, chairman, Mrs. H. L. Cowles, \$18.00; Myrtle Creek, chairman, Mrs. Carl Starbuck, \$25.65; Oakland, chairman, Mrs. F. Fortin, \$9.90; Glendale, chairman, Miss Lucille Cunningham, \$30.87; Sutherlin, chairman, Mrs. Lewis Allen, \$24.57; Riddle, chairman, Mrs. M. J. Jones, \$21.10; Yoncalla, chairman, Miss Christopher, \$12.94; other schools, \$262.81. Total, \$622.73.

Pet capita sale 34 seals, Mrs. H. C. Boyle, county chairman. Reports were made of the work being done in the county by different health groups. Mrs. Asam of Glendale reported that fifteen minutes of every Parent-Teacher meeting was set aside for health work. At their last meeting they gave a health play. This play was given by the pupils of the school under the direction of Mrs. Hill and was very interesting and well received. At another meeting Mrs. Asam told a story entitled "The Two Tooth Factory." Glendale group reported a social held in the early fall at which time \$37.85 was raised and the money spent for a sanitary couch for the rest room in the school. A Christmas carnival was held early in December and \$183 was raised at this time. Half of this sum was spent in completing the furnishing of the rest room and in play ground equipment. A tonil and adenoid clinic was held and twelve children successfully operated. A large dental clinic was held in December. They reported a loan closet which contains sickroom supplies. Fifty-two calls have been made upon this loan closet and in every case the closet contained the necessary articles. A social and program was held in February at which time the health films were shown which were furnished by the Douglas County Health association.

Mr. McElhinny brought up the matter of a dental survey being made in Douglas county. The need for this work has been felt for some time and some work has been done toward the establishing of this work. The health association voted to match the state dental board dollar for dollar in starting this project, up to \$300.00. This sum was thought sufficient to make the survey by equipment and perhaps start the work. The association felt this would be a very good way to place part of the Christmas seal sale money.

PARIS, Mar. 17.—Jean Patou has the reputation among smart French women of being essentially Parisian in his conception and creations of clothes, besides possessing that great gift of imparting to them an air of great youthfulness, which, as we all know, is the all-important point with modern woman. His collections therefore are always awaited with the keenest interest, as they never fail to be replete with new and original ideas.

The Patou spring collection came up to everyone's expectations and the general opinion was that it would be a difficult matter to find anything more dainty and feminine than the creations shown, at any rate as far as afternoon and evening gowns are concerned.

Four Hundred Models

To try and enumerate all the new ideas which Jean Patou has put into execution would be too lengthy a matter, seeing that he has something like four hundred models and that each one of them is different. The new colors are in the fashion of the 1890's for inspiration is evident in his use of fountains and the placing of fullness at the back of the skirt; these points, together with a nearly normal waistline, are sufficient in themselves to cause much comment. His three new colors are unexpected and brilliant, and in the case of his English red and Japanese green, and call for a great discrimination in their wearing. His third color, which he calls "egg-shell white," cannot be described, but is meant to out white. The color has a very small part in his new collection.

Black and Navy Blue. Black and navy blue, on the other hand, are very prominent, usually combined with another color or with a printed material. White, pink or red seem to be the favored shades used in conjunction with the above and the color scheme is followed in all the details of the ensembles.

Tweeds in soft colors—beige, blue and gray—and woolen cashmeres are used to a great extent and the sweaters are made of silk, wool or a mixture of both. Corded Silk for Afternoon

Another interesting feature of this collection is the afternoon suit in corded silk with which is worn what used to be known as a dressy blouse. Some of these suits have a beige jacket, short and loosely belted, worn with a black skirt and beige blouse; another combination is a black and white skirt worn with a black jacket and vice versa. The long coat is seen in a number of variations in a printed material over a dress or plain silk or the contrary—but in nearly every case it is perfectly straight, with a small tailored collar. But-tonholes of figured materials are worn with these ensembles, and in the case of a two-color ensemble the flower will follow suit.

Over at Madame Lanvin's, though coming at the end of a strenuous three weeks' attendance at openings, proved all that was expected of this great artist. Although she is known the world over as the originator of the modern "robe de style," Madame Lanvin's creative genius expresses itself in countless charming and spring-like ensembles which are synonymous of perfect taste. Still another novelty is the creation of the "robe princesses" which is as different from the robe de style as is possible to imagine, but preserving nevertheless the slender silhouette and fluid line.
