FUGITIVE WHO ESCAPED LOCAL OFFICERS CAUGHT

While being brought into Roseburg he succeeded in opening the door of the car in which he was riding, and rolled onto the pavement and made his escape, despite the fact that he was handcuffed. He was riding in the front seat with Deputy Leas while Deputies Daugherty and Hodges were in the rear seat, the car being a touring belonging to the prisoner. Prosser opened the door with his knee and rolled out, one of the officers striking at him as he fell. Prosser stated this morning that after rolling out of the car he plunged into some brush beside the road and crouched down beside a gatepost into some brush while the officers searched up and down the road firing several shots into the brush. He cracked a bone in his shoulder in his desperate plunge from the car. He later succeeded in removing the handcuffs and went to Medford where he was arrested last week on a charge of having liquor in his possession. Medford officers stated that they believed him to have continued booze running while in that city. When arraigned this morning he asked for time in which to consult an attorney and was placed under bonds in the sum of \$1,000.

PRUNE GROWERS GIVE APPROVAL TO MARKET PLAN

The meeting of prune growers held Saturday afternoon at the city hall was very successful, approximately 125 more acres being signed up for the association by eight more growers. This makes a total of 2,300 acres now in the new association. Plans were made Saturday for a strong membership campaign to be continued until the first of April. The entire county is to be covered by groups of association representatives in an effort to sign up all the remaining small orchards. The plan as so far presented has been given practically unanimous endorsement by the prune growers and with but few exceptions every grower solicited has signed up as soon as the organization system has been carefully explained. The factor which eliminates the usual objection to the organization plans is that title to the prunes belongs to the individual grower and he exercises full control of them. The title at no time passes to the association. The working plan of the organization is that the directors of the association fix a minimum price. The grower

agrees that he will not sell at a price lower than that fixed, although he may still hold out for a higher figure if he desires. He may also designate to whom the prunes are to be sold.

terday, in a temperature of 70 degrees. Today dawned bright, and as noon approached another record for spring temperature seemed in prospect.

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 18.—Spring weather has come suddenly to Oregon. From most of the state reports tell of balmy weather and high temperatures. At Portland the maximum yesterday was 73, and the weather bureau expected the same figure to be reached or passed today.

While spring is not supposed to make its debut until tomorrow afternoon the young lady gave a warming up party yesterday, presenting the highest temperature since October 19, 1927. The mercury at the local weather bureau station, according to E. H. Fletcher, local meteorologist, went to 76 degrees, which was the warmest day to be recorded since the date in October when 78 was the maximum.
