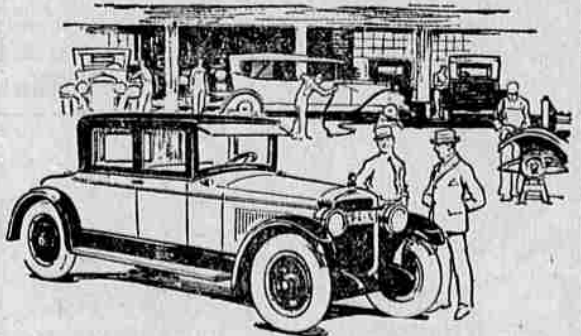

NEW HIGH RECORDS ON STOCK EXCHANGE—(Associated Press Leased Wire) NEW YORK, Mar. 20.—Radio and General Motors led another violent upturn in prices which lifted more than a score of issues to new high records on the New York stock exchange today. Radio soared \$15.50 a share to \$152.50 or \$6.50 below the high record established last week, and General Motors advanced \$5 a share to a new high record at \$174. U. S. Iron Pipe climbed \$15 a share to a new peak at \$750 and numerous others advanced \$3 to \$6 a share.

INCOME TAX IS YIELDING MORE THAN LAST YEAR

might find itself with less cash than it obtained last year in the same period. Another effect of the inflow of income tax funds was to bring the government's cash balance last Saturday to the comparatively high figure of \$438,572,477, while the manipulation of the floating debt timed for the March 15th payment date has resulted in the retirement of short obligations to a total of \$842,000,000 for the month and the incurring of new short time debts so far in the month to a total of \$1,086,000.

YOUTH HELD AS DYNAMITER TELLS GRAND JURY STORY

OREGON CITY, Ore., Mar. 20.—The Clackamas county grand jury today was taking testimony in the case of Earl Jones, held since the dynamite blast last Thursday which flattened the Robert H. Jones ranch home near Boring, Oregon, killing Mrs. Jones, a son, Harold, and injuring Mr. Jones, a daughter, Ethel, and Mrs. Jones' sister, Gladys Roe.

Earl's father was still in a critical condition today at a hospital in Portland. The two girls were out of danger, although still suffering from shock, broken bones and bruises. Jones' leg was broken in four places and he suffered severe shock and body bruises. Earl's pretty 17-year-old sweetheart, Irene Schweitzer, who has declared she will stand by Earl, but is assisting Sheriff Mass in his investigation, has been subpoenaed to testify. Richard Jones, 16, who was tossed 40 feet by the blast but escaped serious injury, is to relate his story of the explosion. Sheriff Mass said he would take Earl Jones to the funeral of Mrs. Jones, his step-mother, and Harold, his half brother, this afternoon.

State Supreme Court Decisions

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 20.—The regents of the University of Oregon have a legal and constitutional right, under an act of the 1927 legislature, to issue bonds for the erection of a dormitory on the University campus, says an opinion of the supreme court today.

The opinion holds that the bond issue of \$400,000 will not constitute a state indebtedness, therefore that it is not in violation of the constitutional prohibition against the creation of a state indebtedness in excess of \$50,000. The opinion was written by Justice Belt in the case of Marion F. McClain, appellant, against the University regents, and affirms Judge Walter H. Evans, who heard the case in the lower court for Lane county.

Contrary to the argument of the attorneys for the regents, the court holds that the university regents constitute an agency of the state and not an independent legal entity.

Other opinions today were: Bill Bridge company, appellant, vs. Dave Lachman and Lachman, Expositions Shows and A. Carson, appeal from Multnomah county; action in replevin. Opinion by Justice Belt. Judge Dalton Biggs affirmed.

Steiger, defendant, and Edward Steiger, et al, defendant; appeal from Marion county; suit upon alleged oral promise made by T. W. Steiger involving disposal of estate. Opinion by Justice Brown. Judge L. H. McMahon reversed.

H. H. George vs. Spokane, Portland and Seattle railway company, appellant; appeal from Multnomah county; action for conversion of household goods. Opinion by Justice Bean. Judge T. E. J. Duffy reversed.

S. J. Kaminsky, appellant, vs. James Good, defendant, and Multnomah county, guardian and respondent; appeal from Hood River county; action for garnishment of defendant's salary. Opinion by Justice Bean. Judge Fred Wilson reversed.

John F. Blair, appellant, vs. Enelly Blair, appeal from Multnomah county; suit for divorce. Opinion by Justice Bean. Judge Ashby C. Dickson affirmed.

Ralph Derrick, appellant, vs. Lena Derrick, respondent; suit for divorce; appeal from Marion county; opinion by Justice McAllister. Judge L. H. McMahon affirmed.

A. R. Richardson vs. Investment company, appellant; appeal from Multnomah county; action involving costs of suit; costs disallowed either party in opinion by Justice Belt.

A. E. Davis vs. Bush and Lane Piano company, appellant; appeal from Multnomah county; action to recover for labor and material. Opinion by Chief Justice Rand. Judge Walter H. Evans affirmed.

Hal McEwen vs. A. B. Cutler, appellant; appeal from Multnomah county; motion for appeal. Judge George Rossman affirmed in opinion by the court.

Leroy H. Andrews vs. W. J. Jones and Son and Billie Lemon, appellant; appeal from Multnomah county; action for damages. Judge Walter H. Evans affirmed in opinion by the court.

Lloyd G. Trullinger, appellant, vs. Dooly and company, et al, appellant; appeal from Multnomah county; Judge John H. Stevenson affirmed in opinion by the court.

Petition for rehearing denied in Vawter vs. Rogue River Valley Canning company.
