TWO CAPTURED AND STILL TAKEN AT REEDSPORT

Sheriff Percy Webb received a report this morning from Deputy Sheriff W. G. Grubbe at Reedsport that a 40-gallon still, together with 20 gallons of moonshine and 400 gallons of mash had been captured at Reedsport, William Durant and Ray Anderson were arrested as operators of the still. Durant was released from jail about two weeks ago after serving time for a violation of the liquor law. The still was located in a deserted cabin on the Lumbard homestead on Dean's creek and was discovered by school children who notified the officers. Deputy Sheriff Grubbe and Chief of Police Dodson, who have been watching the still for several days, arrested the young men when they arrived at the scene to run off the next batch of liquor. They are to be brought out to Roseburg as soon as sentence can be pronounced upon them.

THEY'RE MILD and yet THEY SATISFY

ALBERT B. FALL NOT TO TESTIFY IN OIL HEARING

Physicians Declare He Is Not in Condition to Stand Strain.

WANT HIS DEPOSITION

Former Secretary of Interior Anxious to Give Testimony and Defend His Position.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 22.—The conspiracy trial of Albert B. Fall and Harry F. Sinclair today was severed by Justice Jennings Bailey who ordered the wealthy oil operator tried alone on April 4.

Sinclair and the former secretary of the interior originally were scheduled to go on trial for a second time April 2 but counsel for Fall obtained a postponement on the grounds that he was too ill to be present.

Government counsel immediately moved to have Sinclair tried separately and the motion was granted by Justice Bailey, who set the trial date immediately.

Counsel for Sinclair opposed the move to sever the case contending that Fall's testimony was necessary to the oil man's defense.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 22.—Notwithstanding his expressed anxiety to tell his story in court, Albert B. Fall has apparently escaped the necessity of taking the stand in the immediate future to record his own defense of the leasing of Teapot Dome.

Government physicians have reported that the rapidly falling man is in no condition, physically or mentally, to stand the strain of a trip to the east. Likewise, the Teapot Dome committee of the senate, was virtually decided that he is to be examined, at least for the present, in the oil investigation. Meanwhile the question of a severance of the Fall-Sinclair conspiracy case, so that Harry F. Sinclair may go on trial on April 2 must be decided, and the Sinclair forces are resisting such a move on the ground that Fall is a material defense witness.

Although a deposition might be taken from Fall by the defense, the government has no such privilege in a criminal case. George P. Hoover, counsel for Sinclair, has said that even should a deposition be desired, there is not sufficient time between now and April 2 to obtain it. On the other hand government attorneys say the defense

has known all along that Fall was too sick to travel and that they should have guarded against such a contingency.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 22.—There is to be no effort at this time by the senate Teapot Dome committee to obtain the testimony of Albert B. Fall who has stated that he is ready to answer all questions that may be put to him in connection with the matters involved in the Fall-Sinclair oil conspiracy case.

Both Chairman Nye and Senator Walsh of Montana, who have been

directing the affairs of the committee, thought the former interior secretary's reply to the request of the committee as to his readiness to testify closed the matter for the time being at least.

"I think this disposes of the matter we had in hand," said Senator Walsh. A similar view was expressed by Chairman Nye, but it may be that the question will be taken up at any executive meeting of the entire committee later.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 22.—Reports from government physicians who examined Albert B. Fall agree with reports made by his personal physician that the former secretary is unable to come to Washington for his trial on April 2.

The report of two physicians who made the examination at the request of Owen J. Roberts and Atlee Pomerene, special government prosecutors, said that Fall was in an extremely feeble condition.

The government prosecutors indicated that the affidavit which will be presented in support of Fall's motion to continue his trial to a later date, was to the effect that the former secretary's heart and lungs are in a very weakened condition and say that neither his physical nor mental condition would permit of his being placed on trial at this time.

The prosecutors accepted the report of their medical representatives as indicating that the court would grant continuance of the

case insofar as it affected the former interior secretary. They will insist, however, they said, that Sinclair be placed on trial April 2.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 22.—The offer by Albert B. Fall to make a deposition and allow the trial of Harry F. Sinclair to get under way April 2 will be opposed by George P. Hoover, counsel for Sinclair.

"It would be difficult to examine Fall in advance of the trial," said Hoover, "and we will oppose such procedure. Because of it not being practicable to examine Mr. Fall in advance of government's presentation of its case, it would be impossible for us to do it now before April 2, the day set for the trial."

"If the court should sever the cases of Fall and Sinclair and then grant a continuance to Sinclair or continue the case against both of them until the later part of May or the first of June we would then be willing to go ahead with the trial of Sinclair alone and use Fall's deposition if he was able to be present."

Arguments on Fall's motion to continue his trial because of ill health were called for before Justice Jennings Bailey in the District of Columbia supreme court this afternoon. If the motion is granted the government will ask that Sinclair be placed on trial alone April 2.
