IMMUNIZATION IS GIVEN FORTY-SEVEN SCHOOL CHILDREN

During the past week 47 children in Douglas county received the first treatment for immunization against diphtheria, according to Dr. DeWalt Payne, county health officer, who is in charge of the work of the Douglas County Health Unit. This, Dr. Payne says, is a step in making diphtheria a disease of ancient history in Douglas County and the U. S. by 1930. It is estimated that one-third of all grade school children in the U. S. have already been immunized and will not contract this dread disease. At one of the schools, Dr. Payne reports, the teacher had her baby brought for immunization. At another school a mother walked in with her child from a home three miles away.

"It is only when danger is realized that such prevention is asked for," the health officer says. "Several months ago I attended a clinic conducted by a throat specialist. Every week he treats from 15 to 20 children who have had diphtheria of the laryngeal type in which an outside opening had to be made in the windpipe to save the child's life. These children come in weekly for dilations of the larynx and after treatment for from one to three years some are able to talk and breathe naturally again. After seeing such results of the disease one would run all the way to a doctor's office to be immunized and have the children immunized."

PEN AUTHORITIES SAY WILLOS SANE

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 26.—Authorities of the Oregon penitentiary are unable to agree with two women who waited on Governor Patterson yesterday and offered arguments to show that James Willos, sentenced to hang, is insane.

Henry W. Meyers, superintendent of the prison, said today that Willos' thoughts run along different lines from those of most condemned men, but said that he was unofficially pronounced sane several months ago. Willos has been making a study of Christian Science. He is to be hanged Friday, April 13.

Ellsworth Kelly, who is to be hanged the same day, shows little change in demeanor. He is described as "nervous and high strung."

ESCAPED CONVICT RETURNS FROM RENO

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 26.—Dale Painter, who escaped from the state penitentiary in 1923 was returned yesterday from Reno, Nevada, and will serve out his original sentence of one year.

Painter was first received in 1921 from Jefferson county for stealing a calf. He was paroled May 1, 1922. He was received again April 14, 1923, from Harney county for horse stealing. He escaped 20 days later and was not heard from again until three months ago when he was arrested at Reno for a minor offense. Upon finishing a jail sentence he was turned over to a guard from the Oregon penitentiary and returned here.

STOCK LEAPS UPWARD

NEW YORK, Mar. 26.—Common stock of the General Motors Corporation leaped to the lead of the upward movement on the stock market again today, selling at a new high record of \$144.50, a gain of \$1.50.

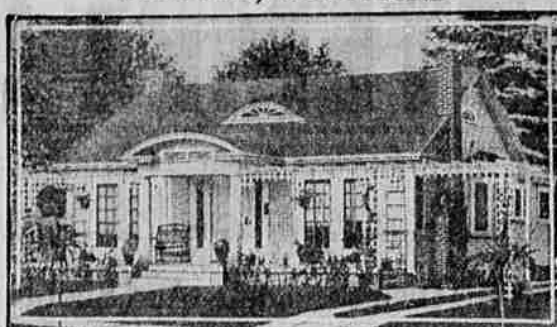
