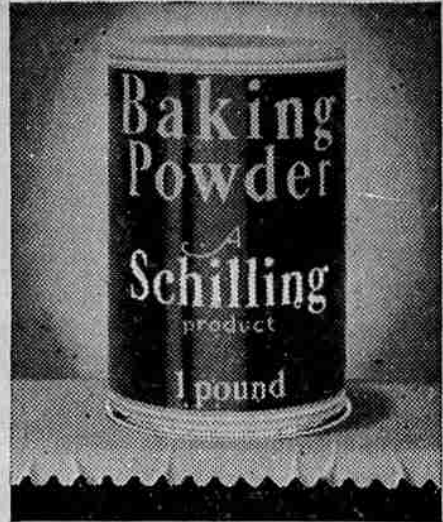

FRENTHAM, Surrey, England, Mar. 28.—Despite being thrown by a favorite hunter, Miss Muffett, II, during the highland brigade steeplechase meeting at Stockton, the Prince of Wales remounted and won the race.

The prince, riding in the race, competed as colonel-in-chief of the Seaforth Highlanders.

Weather conditions for racing were atrocious with a heavy wind and pouring rain. Marking the pace practically throughout, however, the prince won handsily. When three fences from the finish Miss Muffett II stumbled and threw her royal rider, but the prince quickly remounted and continued the race.

PRISONER BROUGHT HERE

Durant was placed under \$500 bail, but his bondsman withdrew and surrendered him to the deputy sheriff. He will be held for investigation by the grand jury. Officer Grubb is to remain in Roseburg and will take up his duties as first field deputy under Sheriff Webb.

POLISH STUDENT COMMITS SUICIDE; COMRADES IN RIOT

PRZEMYSL, Poland, Mar. 28.—Rioting during which a number of students were wounded broke out here yesterday following the suicide of one of their comrades.

Franz Skokowski, 14, threw himself under the wheels of an express train Tuesday because he had been chaffed by a professor for his youthful love for an unnamed actress.

The youth slapped the face of the teacher and the student's father, hearing of this, said: "There is no place for you at home."

Stricken with sorrow and shame, Skokowski wrote farewell letters to the professor, his father and his comrades, saying that life was a disappointment to him.

All the schools and colleges were closed yesterday to commemorate his death.

After the youth's funeral, which was attended by every school child in the whole city and thousands of their elders, the students rushed to the school building and demolished all the furniture. They did the same to the professor's home. Rioting broke out and police wounded a number of students.

The youth's father, who is a high Polish official, was compelled to flee for fear of vengeance at the hands of comrades of his son.

INSURGENTS AND CATHOLIC PRIESTS SHOT IN BATTLE

MEXICO CITY, Mar. 28.—Dispatches from Irapuato, Guanajuato, today said 92 insurgents, two Catholic priests, the chieftain Romingo Anaya, two army officers and four soldiers, had been killed in the bloodiest battle which had occurred since the insurgents became active.

Forty insurgents were wounded and 47 captured in fighting at San Isidro Ranch near San Francisco Del Rincon Tuesday and Wednesday. General Genovevo Rivas, commander of the forty-third regiment, and six soldiers were also wounded.

Military authorities declared that they had delivered the death blow to the uprising in the state of Guanajuato. One hundred and eighty horses and 67 rifles were captured from the anti-government forces during the combat. Insurgents who numbered 300 fought desperately for 24 hours under Chieftain Anaya and the two unnamed priests against the forty-third regiment. The insurgents were strongly fortified in the San Isidro ranch, but were gradually driven out of the various buildings as the fighting progressed. The combat started at 7 a. m. Tuesday and lasted until Wednesday noon when 47 insurgents surrendered after a final attempt to break through the ring of federal troops surrounding the ranch.

PORTLAND TEAM GOES TO TORNEY

CHICAGO, Mar. 28.—Forty of the country's best basketball teams, survivors of some 20,000 that started the season, will be in the tenth annual intercollegiate basketball tournament starting next Tuesday, and continuing until Saturday night. Morton High school of Glenview, Illinois, won the title last year. Thirty-five teams, representing 31 states, are already entered. Thirty are state champions; three are runners-up and two hold local titles.

Two of the most interesting teams are the United States Indian school of Albuquerque, winners of the New Mexico tournament, and Carr Creek, Ky. Four Indian tribes are represented on the Albuquerque quintet. Carr Creek lost the Kentucky championship to Ashland, also in the tournament, in a game that went four overtime periods. The team is composed of typical mountaineers, who came to the state meet at Lexington unknown, and so won the people of that city that Lexington is paying their expenses. With-out a gymnasium, the Carr Creek boys practiced out of doors, wearing overalls for gym suits.

MYRTLE CREEK MAN FINED FOR POSSESSION QUANTITY OF BEER

Thomas Wilson, Myrtle Creek man, was arrested last evening by Sheriff Webb and charged with unlawful possession of intoxicating liquor. He was brought to this city and at 10 o'clock appeared before Justice of the Peace Hopkins, entering a plea of guilty. In his possession was found about 25 quarts of beer. Wilson was given a sentence by Judge Hopkins of \$100 or be confined to the county jail for 60 days. Not being able to furnish funds for the fine he was committed to jail.

NO REWARD PAID YET FOR CAPTURE OF D'AUTREMONTS

SPOKANE, Wash., Mar. 28.—The government has not yet paid any of the rewards offered for the capture of Ray, Roy and Hugh de Autremont, notorious train bandits who are serving life sentences in the Oregon penitentiary. This was announced from the office of Charles Riddford, United States postoffice inspector for the northwest district.

Reports from Medford, Oregon, on Monday, quoted the district attorney's office there as saying that \$5,300 reward had been paid to Sergeant Pack for the capture of Hugh de Autremont.

It was stated at Mr. Riddford's office that a Corporal Reynolds was responsible for the capture of Hugh, but that his reward has not yet been paid. Rewards for the apprehension of all three bandits will be paid at the same time. It is understood here that the government will base payment on the report of Riddford, who was active in the manhunt. Mr. Riddford is now on his way to Washington, D. C., on official business, the nature of which has not been announced.

Markets

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 28.—Unusually heavy demand for fat heavy hens was a feature on the local poultry market today and dealers predict even larger inquiry, as the Jewish feast of the passover draws nearer. The passover holidays commence at sundown on Thursday, April 5, and continue until sundown of the following Thursday.

Farmers who are holding fat chickens for shipment are advised to ship them prior to that time as many special Jewish dishes of the passover season are prepared in chicken fat and prices will be unusually good while the demand lasts. Heavy hens were quoted today at 24¢/25¢ each, with indications that prices might rise if supplies were short.

Other classes of poultry and country dressed meats were steady today with receipts and demand well balanced.

Butter and egg prices were likewise steady and unchanged today with receipts of both heavy, at 29.624 pounds of butter and 3.297 cases of eggs. Storage holdings of butter were reported at 4,930 pounds and of eggs at 106,163 cases. Potato prices were firm on wholesale vegetable markets with best table stock selling around \$2.00/\$2.50. Small quantities of seed potatoes were selling at 25¢/3 cents per pound.

Rhubarb was plentiful today, mostly local stuff, and brought from 6 to 8 cents per pound.

Large quantities of poorer quality onions were selling at low prices, mostly stuff and ones which were showing signs of sprouting. Good number 1 yellow onions were steady at 31¢/4 cents per pound with supplies diminishing.

Fine quality local spinach was selling today around \$1.00/\$1.25 per 20-pound box.

Marking the approach of the end of the Umpqua Valley broccoli season, prices were higher on better grade stuff. No. 1 offerings of large size cauliflower were in good demand around \$1.75 per crate. Other grades ranged downward to \$1.25 per crate.
