TY COBB TO QUIT GAME, CLEANS UP IN STOCK MARKET

NEW YORK, Mar. 30.—The Evening Post, in a special dispatch from Augusta, Ga., says today that Ty Cobb has decided to retire from baseball, following a reported clean-up of \$200,000 in the stock market. Inability to get back into playing shape after workouts with the Athletics also figured in Cobb's decision to quit, according to the Post, whose correspondent says his information comes from an unimpeachable source.

"Cobb's legs could not stand the strain of another campaign and he was contemplating retirement when the market turned favorable for him and influenced his decision," the story says.

Cobb is reported to have reaped an estimated profit of \$200,000 in General Motors and Coca Cola during the unprecedented rise in the stock market within the last week.

AUGUSTA, Ga., Mar. 30.—Ty

Cobb has no intention of quitting baseball this year, he said today when informed of reports that he had decided to retire after cleaning up \$200,000 in the stock market.

As to the report of his cleaning up, Cobb said:

"I wish that was true."

Regardless of his financial condition, he said, he intends to keep his agreement with Connie Mack with whom he has signed a contract to play with the Philadelphia Athletics this season.

Cobb explained that he was in Augusta because of the illness of his wife, who had a minor operation a few days ago.

"The Georgia Peach declared he was in better physical condition than in several years. He scoffed at reports that his legs were giving out."

"I gave Mr. Mack my word," he said, "that I would play one more year of baseball, and I am going to leave here Monday for Philadelphia."

HUBBY TARGET FOR HUNTRESS AND EXPLORER

Mrs. Esther Wilson Shoots Husband as Climax of Marital Troubles.

2 WOUNDS INFLICTED

Lady Who Has Slain Lions and Tigers Now Facing Assault Charge in New York City.

NEW YORK, Mar. 30.—Mrs. Esther Wilson, Arctic explorer and big game hunter, was held today on a charge of felonious assault after shooting and seriously wounding her estranged husband, Dallett Wilson, New York attorney.

Mrs. Wilson, immediately after the shooting, told police she had called at her husband's office to demand a settlement of their marital difficulties.

"I wanted either to live together or be divorced," she said, "I offered to let him get the divorce, but he refused."

Mr. Wilson was wounded in the arm and in the back.

He is 49 years old, his wife two years younger. They were married 18 years ago, and separated six months ago. They have no children.

Both had been previously married and in 1910 were named co-respondents in separate divorce actions brought by Mrs. Wilson's first husband and his first wife.

Both couples were prominent in New York society at the time.

Mrs. Wilson came to New York from Washington Sunday. Yesterday afternoon she went to her husband's office in the Hecksher building on Fifth Avenue and was admitted to his private suite.

A stenographer told police she heard Mrs. Wilson demanding an increase in her allowance from \$450 to \$1000 a month. At six o'clock two shots rang out. Associates ran into the room and found Mr. Wilson lying on the floor with his wife standing over him, a revolver in her hand.

Mrs. Wilson returned from her latest hunting trip to Africa Jan. 1, 1928, after bagging lions, leopards, tigers and other game. She claims to have been within 10 degrees of the North Pole on an Arctic expedition, the only white woman with that distinction. While in Africa on her last expedition she contracted sleeping sickness.

"Temporary maniacal insanity," Remus, an attorney, acted as one of his own defense counsel during his trial for murder. He testified he had been tortured by his wife's infidelity with Franklin L. Dodge, Jr., Lansing, Michigan, a former department of justice agent, who was largely responsible for sending the former bootleg chieftain to the Atlanta penitentiary, for violation of the liquor laws.

After trial of a month a jury returned a verdict of not guilty "by reason of insanity," twenty minutes after it had been given the case.

The Hamilton county probate court, however, adjudged him insane and committed him to the hospital.

CHAMP "WOMAN" BILLIARDIST MAN, DEATH REVEALS

SAN LUIS, Okla., Mar. 30.—Death has revealed that Frances Anderson, known for many years as "champion woman billiard player," in reality was a man.

Anderson ended his own life here yesterday by slitting his throat and wrists with a razor. Not until the body was prepared for burial did the secret of 30 years of masquerading become known.

Employed in one of the woman's stockrooms he wrote a letter indicating he had contemplated death and carrying a plan that his secret might be preserved.

"Do what you want with my body," the letter said, "but don't let the world know my secret."

Other than the conclusion obtained from the clippings, authorities were unable to learn much about Anderson. He apparently had spent considerable time in Los Angeles. He was about 60 years old.

CHRISTIAN CHURCH MEETS SUNDAY LAST TIME IN OLD HOME

A jubilee program is to be presented at the Christian church Sunday, celebrating the last meeting in the old church building. Easter Sunday the congregation is to move into the new edifice on Douglas and Kane streets, and so will make a special ceremony of the last services in the old structure that has been used as a place of worship for so many years.

The Bible school is making a determined effort for a large attendance and is putting on a "radio program." Appropriate services will be held morning and evening.

The church is arranging for a big day on Easter, and on the following Sunday, April 15, will start a pre-dedication evangelistic campaign. Charles E. Scoville, one of the country's greatest evangelists, a man who ranks with Billy Sunday and men of that standing in religious circles, has, through fortunate circumstances, been secured for a short meeting here, starting April 25.

Rev. Scoville is now engaged in a meeting at Klamath Falls, but leaves in a few days for a religious conference at Cincinnati. During his absence his evangelistic party, which consists of a group of specialists in that type of endeavor, will come to Roseburg and will assist the local congregation in its campaign. Services will be held starting April 15, with Rev. W. M. Baird, pastor of the church, as the preacher.

Rev. Scoville will arrive in Roseburg on the 25th and will be in the city for ten days or two weeks and on April 29 will conduct the dedication of the new building.

Rev. Scoville is usually engaged in union evangelistic efforts and has conducted campaigns in principal cities all over the world. In this instance, however, he is interested in the work of the local church and is coming to Roseburg to aid in the dedication. His party will be one of the largest and most outstanding group of religious workers over to visit this city.
