DECLARES HAYS ATTEMPTED HALT OIL PROBE IN 1924

WASHINGTON, Mar. 30.—A story that Will H. Hays sought to bring political pressure to bear on the late Senator Edwin E. Ladd of North Dakota, then chairman of the Teapot Dome committee to end abruptly the oil investigation in 1924, was related here today by former Senator Alva T. Adams of Colorado, who then was a member of the committee.

Adams said that Ladd had related the incident to him at the time of its occurrence. The story was that Hays had come to Washington and summoned the veteran chairman of the committee to the White House. Ladd assumed that the invitation was from the president and proceeded to the executive offices.

He was met there by Hays, who suggested that it might not be well for them to be seen together and proposed that they ride around town while they discussed the oil situation. Ladd assented, and a started for his automobile, but Hays demurred because of the presence of the chauffeur and urged that a taxicab be used.

The North Dakota Independent who subsequently was cast out of the Republican party councils in the senate, concurred and the two rode around for more than an hour with Ladd's car following on behind.

Adams said Ladd had told him that Hays declared the investigation was beginning to take on an aspect that boded no good for the Republican party and that as a Republican the North Dakotan should join with other Republicans on the committee to wind it up.

Ladd, as the story goes, finally became incensed and reminded the former that he owed a duty to the senate in the investigation and that terminated the interview. Ladd stopping the taxicab and transferring to his car, which still had been trailing behind the public vehicle while the conference went on.

Adams was unable to recall whether this occurred before or after Hays had first taken the stand before the committee. Hays finally testified that Sinclair made advance of \$250,000 of Continental Trading company Liberty bonds to Hays to wipe out a campaign deficit.

FALL SAYS SINCLAIR RELUCTANT IN TAKING THE OIL LEASE

(Associated Press Leased Wire) EL PASO, Texas, Mar. 30.—Harry F. Sinclair, wealthy oil operator charged with conspiring with Albert B. Fall to defraud the government in the lease of the Teapot Dome naval oil reserve, accepted the lease reluctantly, after once rejecting it, associates said Fall would testify today in giving his deposition to be used at Sinclair's trial in Washington next week. "Here is your lease, Mr. Secretary," Fall was expected to testify Sinclair said, "I am done with it."

CANNERY IS GUARDED

(Associated Press Leased Wire) SAN PEDRO, Calif., Mar. 30.—A guard was established around the home and fish cannery of Gilbert C. Van Camp while police followed up clues today to an apparent attempt to dynamite his plant and to the authorship of a threatening letter received by him. They expressed the opinion that difficulty between the packer and his employees was the cause. Several sticks of explosive, with fuses attached, were found near the cannery buildings late last night by Paul Gregory, manager. The police said an attempt was being made to trace the letter-writing to one of Van Camp's fishermen.

RANCHER'S ARMS BROKEN
