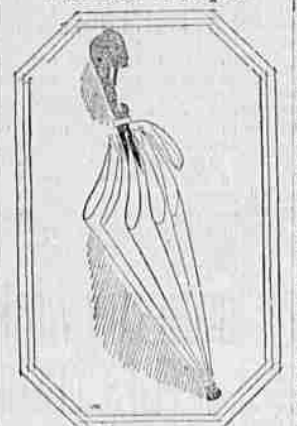

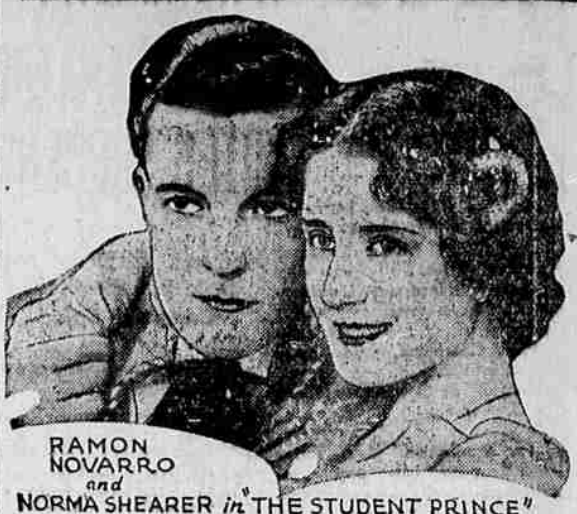
A display of antiques and relics is being arranged for the afternoon and members of the club are to bring any articles of that nature to add to the exhibit.
