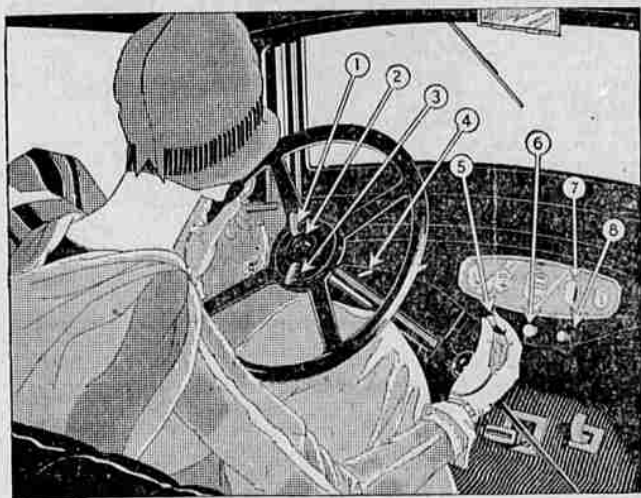

GERMAN PLANE IS FUELED; MAY HOP OFF TOMORROW

DUBLIN, April 5.—The German airplane Bremen today was fueled at Baldonnel Airfield and ready to take off at a few hours' notice. The field itself was still soft from recent rains and authorities said there was little chance of the heavily laden plane being able to take off for New York before tomorrow.

STOLP, Germany, April 5.—Colonel Grossa, aide to General Umberto Nobile, has arrived here to take charge of the preparations for the Italian expedition into North Polar regions in the dirigible Italia.

ARBITER AWARDS TO HOLLAND AN ISLAND CLAIMED BY AMERICA

THE HAGUE, April 5.—The Netherlands have been given title to the island Las Palmas (Miangas), lying between the Philippines and the Dutch East Indies. Possession of the island was disputed by the United States and Holland. Professor Max Huber, Swiss statesman, acting as arbiter, decided in favor of Holland.
The claim of the United States was based on the Spanish cession of the Philippines in 1898. The United States wished to control the island, which is only two miles long and three-quarters of a mile wide, because it was believed that it was being used by opium smugglers as a rendezvous.

BEWARE HOT CROSS BUNS, DIVINE SAYS

LONDON, April 5.—Hot cross buns, millions of which are made annually for Good Friday, were labeled as home wreckers by the Rev. James Shepherd addressing an assembly of women at Islington Chapel. He said:
"Don't eat hot cross buns on Good Friday. Don't give them to your husbands. They are buns that were offered to pagan gods.
After a hearty breakfast of hot cross buns, you may act like a pagan. Many homes have been wrecked by indecentible hot cross buns. So whether you are married or single leave them alone."

Hawley's Rule Presages School Rule Idea

Congressman's Reign Over Ways and Means Body Recalls His Salem Professorship.

WASHINGTON, April 5.—A touch of the old school class room and its pedagogic rule may be injected into proceedings of the ways and means committee of the house under the regime of Rep. Willis C. Hawley of Oregon, new chairman designate.
Tentatively selected to succeed William R. Green of Iowa, who is retiring from congress to a federal judicial post, Hawley may find the "legislative class room" a little more unruly than those he presided over at Willamette University at Salem, Oregon. He was president of that institution.
As a stalwart in the ranks of house republicans he will find his most difficult job in keeping the democrats under control, as the ways and means committee with its power to initiate tax and tariff legislation is one of the big policy making committees in congress, and for that reason probably more political rows are stirred up at its meetings than in any other of the half hundred committees on Capitol Hill.

But Hawley, whose father and mother were among the first pioneers to travel the old Oregon trail, is accustomed to and unafraid of political skirmishes and, if things become too boisterous, he has one of the deepest and most melodious of voices that can drown out opposition and make himself heard in any verbal fight.
The chairman designate has been a member of the house for a score of years. During virtually all that time he has been a member of the ways and means committee.

BRIDGE CONTRACT GIVEN TO PORTLAND BUILDERS

SACRAMENTO, April 5.—The Parker-Strum company, Portland, Oregon, was low bidder here yesterday for construction of a steel cantilever bridge across Smith river, eight miles from Crescent City, when bids were opened by the state highway commission. The construction company bid \$170,479.50. Engineers estimated the cost at \$159,799.50.

303 MORE CHINESE REDS LOSE HEADS

CANTON, China, April 5.—Canton was tense today after 303 Reds had been executed by the military authorities in an attempt to thwart an uprising. The communists boasted that bloodshed would only make their movement the stronger and hasten the fall of the present Cantonese government.
Seventy-three Reds were executed today and 230 earlier in the week when a 14 year old street urchin revealed communist plans to the authorities after listening to them gossiping in the streets.
