SALVATION ARMY WORK FOR FIRST QUARTER 1928

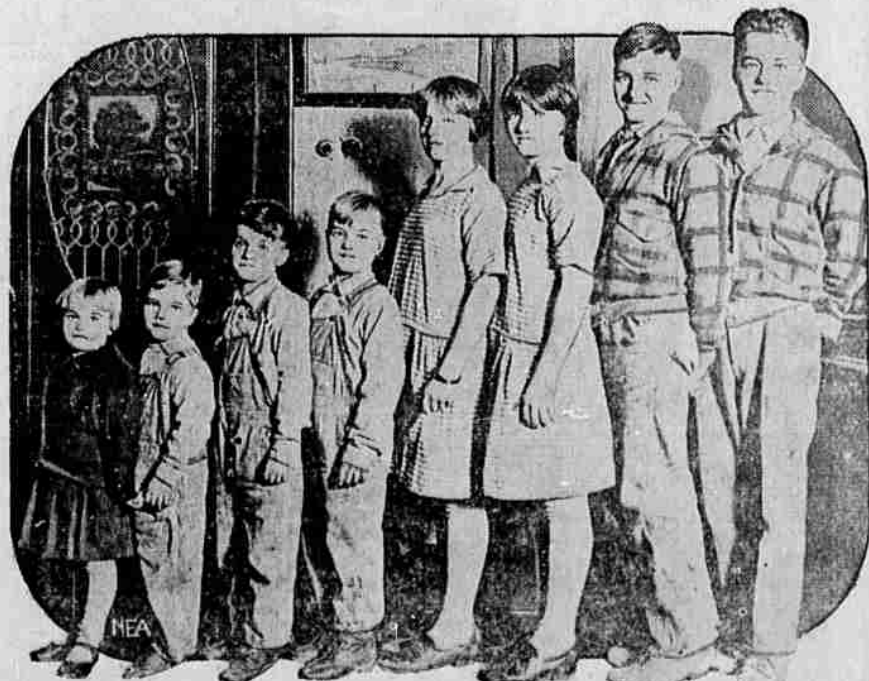
Envoys and Mrs. B. R. Stufflebeam, in charge of Salvation Army work in the Roseburg district, have issued a report of their activities for the first three months of 1928, which gives a good idea of the amount of relief work accomplished. This report shows that 315 families have been aided. Meals

provided total 631. During the three months 316 pieces of clothing were provided those in need, while 61 pairs of shoes were given away. The cash value of these articles and the food supplied totals \$212.25.

EARTH FISSURE IN IDAHO MAY REVEAL NEW OIL DEPOSIT

LEWISTON, Idaho, April 6.—A fissure in the earth three miles long and varying in width, which has been discovered in the White Bird section 100 miles southeast of Lewiston, today caused much interest and some concern among inhabitants of this region, with its poison gas.

The great gap in the crust of the earth is from a few inches to three feet in width and extends in almost straight line from White Bird Mountain in a southeast direction.

The fissure approaches the north and south highway, one of Idaho's largest traffic arteries at a point about three miles from White Bird, said reports made by residents of that district, who stated that a section of the highway is endangered by the rift.

A large amount of earth has fallen into the fissure, and at some points it was reported the great cliff has been partially filled. At other places the slash raps to an undetermined depth. Visitors to the phenomenon state that the odor of the gas was very pronounced.

Geologists who have examined the rift stated that such phenomenon was very common in Mexico and some of the southern states, where oil and gas have been discovered.

Some seepages of oil were reported by Idaho contractors at the time of excavations and cuts were made for the state highway, but no examination has been made in the White Bird section to determine the possibilities for oil.

FEDERAL BUILDING AT KLAMATH FALLS TO COST \$225,000

WASHINGTON, April 6.—In a final report to congress on public building construction for 1929 the budget bureau today recommended erection of 33 federal structures throughout the country at a cost not to exceed \$68,000,000, about one half of which would be appropriated at this session.

The recommendations were made in compliance with two public buildings acts authorizing the expenditure of \$20,000,000 annually outside of the District of Columbia until \$200,000,000 in consumed.

The recommendations include: Klamath Falls, Oregon, postoffice, \$225,000 limit, \$50,000 this year.
