OPPOSITION BARS VOTE THIS WEEK ON FARM AID BILL

WASHINGTON, April 6.—(Index) Opposition from senators of the cotton-producing states has upset the program of Senate leaders for a vote this week on the McNary-Idaho farm relief bill. The disavowal of the southern members toward the bill, coupled up today when Chairman McNary of the agriculture committee, gave an agreement for a vote by next Tuesday, but Senator Simmons, Democrat, of North Carolina, blocked the move with an announcement that he wished to wait some amendments. After a conference of the senators from the cotton section, it developed that Senator McWalter, Democrat, of Tennessee, intended to offer some amendments restricting the power of the proposed farm board to use the equalization fee. Under the amendments now being considered, the various committees to represent each commodity would be named by the president with the consent of the senate rather than by the farm board. Furthermore, the board would be required to have the consent of each committee before it could impose the equalization fee on a commodity under control of that committee. However, there are indications that Senator McNary, author of the bill, is not strongly opposed to the changes and may accept the amendments which could still clear the way for final disposition of the bill early next week. Today's debate on the senate floor was launched by Gooding of Idaho. He declared that the measure "proposes to step up agriculture to the position of industry and labor." The Idahoan said that the farm-ers of the country had lost \$30,000,000 since 1920, and that 2,500,000 persons had left the farms in that time. "The farmer is the one man who never fixes the price of a farm product," said Gooding, citing the wheat and cotton markets as fac-

INSURANCE FIRM ASKS INJUNCTION IN OREGON SUIT

SALEM, Ore., April 6.—The Mutual Health and Benefit association of Nebraska, with agents in all of the cities and towns of the state, in a suit filed here against Clara A. Lee, state insurance commissioner, alleges that the commissioner has refused to issue a new license to either itself or its agents, and is asking a temporary injunction restraining the commission from further interfering with its business in this state. The company claims that it put up \$201,000 in United States government bonds with the commissioner, that it complied with all of the requirements of law, yet refused the licenses. The complaint states that the commissioner refused to grant the license on the ground that the corporation was a mutual or assessment company without capital stock, and was not entitled to do business in the state.

intelligent scheme of control and put up the price of rubber, thus making American automobile owners pay Britain's war debt. The plan worked for a while. Herbert Hoover put an end to it by his attack on the British rubber trust.

Washington reporters say, probably inaccurately, that President Coolidge is "shocked" at the suggestion of \$750,000,000 to make the Mississippi river safe. A country that could give ten thousand millions to Europe, add half a billion a year to railroad receipts, and plan, wisely, to cut \$200,000,000 a year from corporation taxes, need not shudder at the thought of spending part of its billions to make the Mississippi safe.

BOARD OF CONTROL EXCEEDS POWER IN AUTO INSURANCE

SALEM, Ore., April 6.—The state board of control, according to an opinion by Attorney General Van Winkle, is exceeding its authority in attempting to regulate all other state departments and institutions to purchase the particular automobile insurance policies specified by the board. In other words the various departments may act independently in purchasing insurance. The board of control gets for a \$12 premium a policy amounting up to \$10,000 indemnity for injuries to one person, up to \$20,000 for injuries to more than one person, and \$1,000 property damage. Under the 1927 legislative act making the board of control purchasing agent for all state departments the board has insisted on requiring departments to take out this policy. The attorney general's opinion holds that "the legislature did not intend to vest the board with power to purchase insurance on motor vehicles owned by departments other than the board of control."

The attorney general also holds that the term indemnity insurance covers only property and personal damage and not fire and theft risks.

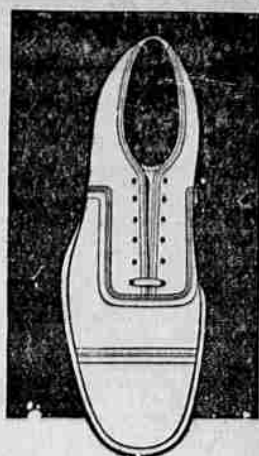

SALEM, Ore., April 6.—The state highway commission, at a meeting in Portland Friday, April 20, will open bids as follows: Douglas county—Gardiner Summit section of Roosevelt coast highway, 1.95 miles of grading. Gilliam county—Ramsay canyon market road 1.9 miles of surfacing. Wehrli canyon market road 1.9 miles of grading and surfacing. Both projects to be awarded as one contract. Klamath county—Beatty Forest Boundary section of Klamath Falls Lakeview highway, 21.3 miles of broken stone surfacing. Lane county—Bridge over McKenzie River on county road about 11 miles south of Coburn. This is a county project. Umatilla county—Bridge over Umatilla River at Yakum on Yakum-Stage Guleh market road. County project. Union county—The furnishing of fabricated structural steel for a 70 foot steel span over Catherine Creek near Hot Lake. County project.

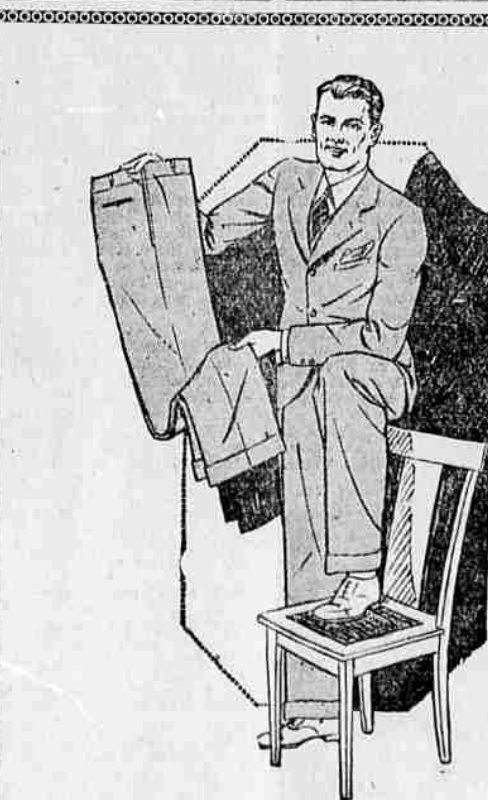

This meeting was held under the auspices of the extension service and the Douglas County Horticultural Society, cooperating. R. A. Basenark, president of the local horticultural society, presided. C. L. Long, horticultural specialist, was the principal speaker and discussed briefly the outlook for the fruit industry. Plans were also discussed regarding arrangements for the State Horticultural Society which meets in Roseburg, December of this year. It is planned to feature the problems of the fruit industry because of the fact that prunes are the principal horticultural crop of this county. An attempt will be made, according to plans outlined, to secure as large an attendance of local growers as possible.

PIPE ORGAN FOR ANTLERS THEATRE BEING INSTALLED

The pipe organ purchased several months ago by the Umpqua Amusement company for the Antlers Theatre arrived in the city yesterday and is being installed today by four factory mechanics. The organ was manufactured by the Robert Morton company near Los Angeles and was built especially for the local theatre, conforming to the specifications furnished by the theatre company. The organ is one of the largest in Southern Oregon and in addition to the usual pipe organ has complete

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orchestral effects. The organ chamber is situated above the stage with the openings through the proscenium arch, a type of installation now being favored in all large theatres, giving the best effects. Mr. Gross, manager of the local theatres, stated today that installation will probably be completed Sunday and the organ will be played at the Sunday performances.
