CALLOW INTRODUCES NEW OAR AT PENNSYLVANIA

NEW YORK, April 6.—Scanning the intercollegiate seas from his new counting tower along the Schuylkill river, Rusty Callow looks this year for the greatest college rowing season the sport has ever known.

Rusty has come out of the west, after five seasons of brilliant success at the University of Washington, to take over the helm at Pennsylvania and attempt to put the Quakers back on the rowing map. Callow exhibits with considerable type a new type of oar, spoon-shaped and rounded at the tips instead of being squared, as in the old conventional blade. They are Rusty's idea. He started experimenting with them two years ago at Washington with the famous boat builder, George Pocock. They have been adopted by Washington this year and Rusty will equip his own variety with the new set he has just received.

"They seem to me a distinct advantage over the old type," Rusty avers. "They are easier to feather

and particularly good for rowing in rough water such as we often have on the Hudson."

TWO SWIMMING RECORDS SET BY CINCINNATI BOY

Waker Laufer, 20, Makes
Famed Weismuller Take
Second Position at
National Meet.

CHICAGO, April 6.—Not Johnny Weismuller, the "human fish," but a 20-year-old Cincinnati youth, Waker Laufer, is the scoring ace of the national amateur record breaking indoor swimming championships for 1928.

Flashing thru the water in world's record time to capture championships in the 300-yard individual medley and the 150-yard back stroke events and placing second in the 100 and 220-yard free style swims, Laufer, who competed unattached, scored 16 points. Weismuller was second with 15, while the Illinois Athletic club of Chicago led seven other clubs for club honors with 14 points.

Weismuller and Pete Desjardins of Stanford university defended successfully their titles in the 500-yard free style and fancy high board diving, respectively. Weismuller won his race by 60 feet and floated along at comparatively slow time.

Five world's records were shattered in the swimming championships which closed last night, while still another was shattered by Walter Spence of the Brooklyn Y. M. C. A. in an official, lone try in the 100-yard breast stroke which was not a part of the championship competition.

RETAINING WALL ORDERED BUILT AT LONE ROCK

The county court today awarded a contract to W. A. Smith and G. W. Vaughn of Glendale, for the construction of a retaining wall and fill at the base of Lone Rock. There is a road up the right bank of the stream beyond Lone Rock and at the present time the road is under water during the flood period. The court made an inspection yesterday and decided that rather than spoil the beauty of the big rock, for which the spot is famous, it was better to build a concrete retaining wall at the base and fill up to a level above high water. The improvement will cost about \$1,300. The road serves two large farms and a number of summer camps.

FILIPINO ORATORS BEAT CALIFORNIA

BERKELEY, Calif., April 6.—A three-man debating team of the University of the Philippines last night defeated the team of the University of California on the campus here, on the question, "Resolved, that the Philippines should be given immediate independence."

The Philippine team took the affirmative side of the question and won an audience vote by 234 to 117. A crowd of about 500 attended, of which approximately 300 were Filipinos.

COLUMBIA FISH WHEEL CASE DATED APRIL 18

SALEM, Ore., April 6.—The United States supreme court will hear the Columbia river fish wheel case April 18, says a telegram received at the office of Attorney General Van Winkle. The act was declared constitutional by the federal district court at Portland in a case started by McGowan and Son.

The act prohibits the operation of fish wheels in the Columbia, fishing with seines above Cascade Locks and limits the length of seines below the locks.

HELENA, Mont., April 6.—The Montana Power company of which John D. Ryan, president, has announced he had agreed to sell to the American Power and Light company, a unit of the Electric Bond and Share company, at a price described as "above \$82,000,000," is the Pioneer Big Power company of the state of Montana. It serves about two thirds of the state of Montana, has an area of 14,000 square miles, with hydro-electric power.

European Divorces, Big Families

PRESTON, England, April 6.—Recognition from the king of some kind is expected here by the townsfolk for Mrs. James Spearlett, to whom has been born the twenty-fifth child. The father, aged 56, says he was as excited and as nervous over the stock's last visit as he was concerning the first.

Fourteen of the children are living—eight girls, two of whom are married, and six boys, all healthy and rosy checked. With exception of the two married daughters, they all live with their parents, the eldest, a boy, aiding in supporting the family. The father makes about \$25 a week, and the boy about half that amount. Those who are able to do odd jobs about town do so and bring all their earnings to their mother.

Mrs. Spearlett, robust herself, says the children never needed the attention of a physician.

"It's only cooks they want, not doctors," she remarked. The mother runs a small general store in the front room of her house, in this way being able to buy food for the family at wholesale prices.

BERLIN, April 6.—Berlin holds an unenviable divorce record. Annually over 8,000 couples are legally separated in the German capital, which represents a 100 per cent increase over pre-war figures.

In 1913 the number of divorces granted in Berlin amounted to 29.3

per every 100,000 inhabitants which proportion had increased to 186.3 by 1925.

As a paramount cause for this apparent indication of matrimonial inconsistency the many precipitate war marriages are mentioned which as soon as the enthusiasm of war hysteria had subsided proved untenable.

According to the Prussian board of statistics, out of a total of 31,000 divorces, 20,527, or 66 per cent, were pronounced on grounds of violation of conjugal rights, 31.6 per cent on account of infidelity, 4.3 per cent for bigamy.

In 256 cases the grievance was desertion. In 49 mental derangement, and in 79 threatened murder.

APPLEFORD, England, April 6.—England's oldest jockey, John Faulkner, a little wizened man with muttonchop whiskers, has celebrated his 100th birthday.

Faulkner has been twice married and has had 32 children, the eldest being 47 and the youngest 26. During the early years of his life Faulkner rode at the light weight of 63 pounds, and has jockeyed horses on the flat and in steeplechase in every part of the country.

He is at present nursing an injury to his thigh caused by a kick from a mare, but is able to hobble about and attend to the garden around the picturesque little cottage.

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FORMER DRAIN RESIDENT DEAD

DRAIN, April 6.—(Special to the News-Review)—Word was received here on Wednesday of the death of James J. Lichen, which occurred at Raymond, Wash., the previous night. He was about 79 years of age. Mr. Lichen formerly resided in the Drain vicinity for several years but about nine years ago he removed with his family to Salem, Oregon, and has resided there and at Raymond ever since. He was an exemplary citizen and always took an active interest in public affairs. He was a member of the Baptist church and of the I. O. O. F. lodge, his membership being in the Drain lodge.

Surviving him are his widow and the following named children: Robert Lichen of Seattle, Wash., Mrs. W. H. Sneed, Mrs. Ernest Rhodes and Mrs. Susie Beaman of Raymond, Wash., and Mrs. Clara Hoover of Salem.

The body is being brought to Salem for burial.

Markets

PORTLAND, Ore., April 6.—Trading was rather quiet on local markets today. Further weakness cropped out in the butter market, and prices dropped all around.

Prime firsts and first dropped two cents per pound to 38c and 37c respectively and the higher grades dropped a cent each to 40c per pound.

Butterfat buying prices also receded with quotations today a cent lower at 45c delivered in Portland, 43c at track, and 42c at station.

Eggs were steady except for a cent drop in the quotation on standard extras to 24c a dozen.

Poultry markets were steady today although conditions were somewhat mixed. The supply of legions hens is unusually heavy and indications are that prices of light hens will be substantially lower the end of the week. Heavy colored hens, on the other hand, are scarce and prices firm at 24c to 25c per pound. Capons, turkeys and broiler chickens are likewise in small supply and steady to strong. Nearly all the broilers which are being received are small and bidding for larger ones is strong.

Spring lambs are in unusually good demand and are cleaning up as fast as received on the local dressed meat markets. Prices today ranged from 30c to 35c depending on quality while fall lambs were also higher at 25c to 28c. Other classes of dressed meats were steady with supply and demand well balanced.
