

BALLYHOOD PLAN
OF ROUNDING UP
VOTERS DEcriED

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
WASHINGTON, April 6.—Opposing the "brass band" method of getting the people to the polls, John Hays Hammond today proposed to the national civic federation that joint committees on active citizenship be organized in 500 leading cities of the country to show the eligible the way to the ballot box and hold educational forums during the political campaigns to discuss issues.

Addressing a meeting of the federation's campaign committee, Mr. Hammond, its chairman, said the federation had no local organizations to set up such committees, but that the general federation of women's clubs had agreed to form them if other national bodies represented in the federation would lend their aid. Declaring there are 62,000,000 citizens eligible to vote in the next November elections, Mr. Hammond said he hoped the committee drive would lead at least 65 or 70 per cent to exercise their right of franchise as against

the 50 per cent which voted in 1924.

In leading up to his proposal the committee chairman said the fact that there was not a 100 per cent registration in the last election should not be too deeply deplored because similar conditions prevailed in other countries. Furthermore, he questioned the wisdom of doubling "a vote which takes so little interest in public affairs that it has to be dragged out, threatened and bribed into going to the polls, many delinquents declaring that voting is a waste of time, as both parties stand for the same thing and both are equally corrupt."

"To get out a big vote that does not know what it is voting for," he said, "is as futile, from the standpoint of good citizenship, as to educate the voters on the issues of the hour and then let them stay at home, go off on excursions or play golf on election day."

Pirates and Sox Win But
Are Forced to Go Extra
Sessions—Giants
Drub Senators.

NEW YORK, April 6.—Annual educational tours of major league baseball clubs through the minors are developing into give and take affairs in which the title belts are giving baseball's best some terrific punishment.

The New York Yankees, Brooklyn Robins and St. Louis Cardinals were defeated by minor league opposition yesterday, while the Pittsburgh Pirates and Chicago White Sox had to go into extra innings to win and the Boston Braves and Cincinnati Reds spent part of the afternoon to get even so that they could finally move on to victory.

The Yankees bowed to Nashville, 11 to 10, in 10 innings. Ruth hit his second home run in two days but it was not a novelty for the game produced three other circuit smashes, the winning volunteers outlit the world's champions.

Frankie Frisch went from the sublime to the ridiculous with four hits and two errors. His errors hurt the Cards more than his hits helped St. Louis fall before Evansville of the Three Eye league 11 to 7.

Atlanta downed Brooklyn 9 to 8 with Bobby's ace, Dazzy Vance and Jess Petty doing the pitching for the Robins.

In a game of tight pitching, the Phillies stopped the Athletics, 3 to 2, in the Philadelphia series, the contest producing only ten safeties, equally divided.

Ty Cobb cracked out two. Bill Dietrick, the reformed infelder, saved the day for Shotton's crew with a catch worthy of a regular outfielder.

The Giants continued to outlit the Washington Senators and were helped to victory, 9 to 7, by wobbly fielding on the part of the American leaguers.

Jahn blasted a home run as a suggestion that the New York club did a smart thing when it drafted him.

Chicago's White Sox came thru with three runs in the tenth inning to win, 5 to 2, from Louisville. The Sox made no headway against the aged Nick Culp, still good enough as a pitcher to have a horse named for him. Old Nick allowed no hits in his five inning job of work.

The Dallas steers gathered but three hits from Vangilder and Sullivan, the Detroit Tigers winning 7 to 0. Paul Easterling's home run helped. A few more may win him an outfield place.

Rogers Hornsby hit the ball hard to assist the Braves in winning a 7 to 4 game from Chattanooga, and a crowded eighth inning when the Reds scored four runs sent Cincinnati home in front of Indianapolis 8 to 5.

The Pirates had to go 11 innings to stop San Antonio, 10 to 6. The Texans did their counting early, scoring all their runs in the first two innings.

Cleveland took advantage of good pitching to take a game from the Montgomery Lions 6 to 1. Rain at Tulsa, possibly brought on by the St. Louis Browns' terrific hitting the day before, made baseball out of the question.

NAVY DANCE ROW LEADS
TO OFFICER'S DISMISSAL

GIBRALTAR, April 6.—Captain Kenneth G. H. Dewar today was found guilty by a court martial today on one of two charges of actions to the prejudice of good order and naval discipline growing out of the now famous dance aboard the battleship Royal Oak and Malta.

The captain was found guilty of the first charge, that of acting to the prejudice of discipline in accepting and forwarding a letter from Commander H. M. Daniel to the squadron commander containing terms subversive to naval discipline. The letter was in criticism of the conduct of Rear Admiral Bernard St. G. Collard.

Captain Dewar was sentenced to be dismissed from the ship and severely reprimanded.

LOYAL SON WINS FIGHT
FOR FATHER'S LIBERTY

BOISE, Idaho, April 6.—A Wisconsin youth's trek to Idaho and his fight to free his father from prison has apparently ended in victory with a tentative order from the pardon board for the release from the state penitentiary of A. R. Baken.

The struggle began last January when Alvin Baken, 19, learned that his father, from whom he had not heard for six years, was in the Idaho state penitentiary for obtaining money under false pretenses. Leaving his mother and four younger brothers, the boy worked his way to Idaho, and ap-

peared before the pardon board with a plea for his father's release. The plea was denied on the ground that no work was provided for the elder Baken should he be released.

Yesterday Alvin again appeared and said he had secured work for himself and father in a logging camp. They would soon earn enough to pay their way back to Wisconsin, he said. The board's action lacks only the formal approval of the attorney general, which is expected to be forthcoming.

NAMED TELEGRAPH EDITOR

FAMOUS HUNTRESS
WHO SHOT HUSBAND
IS OUT ON BAIL

NEW YORK, April 6.—Mrs. Esther Wilson, Arctic explorer and big game hunter, charged with shooting her husband, was free under \$25,000 bail today.

Dall was furnished by Samuel Rothberg, known as "Stitch" McCarthy, the "mayor of Grand street," who said he was acting for a man and a woman, friends of Mrs. Wilson's in Washington, where she had made her home previous to the shooting.

Rothberg is a professional bondsman. Mrs. Wilson had been in jail since last Thursday.

Her husband, Dallett H. Wilson, prominent attorney and politician, is still in a hospital recovering from the two bullet wounds inflicted by his wife.

ROYALTY WASHES
FEET OF BEGGARS
IN PIOUS SPAIN

MADRID, April 6.—The king and queen of Spain today washed the feet of 26 beggars, 13 men and 13 women, in an annual holy Thursday ceremony betokening Christian humility. Twelve of the men and three of the women were blind.

After the simple foot washing ritual, the poor mendicants were led to another apartment and each presented with a new suit or dress, overcoat or mantle, underclothing, a bag containing 30 pieces of silver and a basket of the finest fruits and foods. On leaving the palace, the beggars sold the baskets to a huge crowd, which had gathered outside, for good prices.

The ceremony took place in the royal palace in the presence of high functionaries of the court, religious officials, hundreds of Spanish aristocrats and many foreign visitors.

Similar services occurred in the palaces of every archbishop and bishop in Spain.

LAFOLLETTE FORCES TAKE
LEAD IN LATE RETURNS

MILWAUKEE, Wis., April 6.—Control of the Wisconsin delegation to the Kansas City Republican convention still awayed in the balance between the regular Republicans and the LaFollette forces when 80 per cent of the precincts in Wisconsin had reported today.

In 12 of the 26 contests the regular Republicans were leading. Although the LaFollette forces held a slight edge, as their candidates forged to the front in 14 contests, the race was so close that a change of a few hundred votes in certain districts might displace the leaders.

It appeared probable on the face of returns that fourteen LaFollette delegates would go to the convention pledged to Norris. Of the 12 regular Republicans now holding leads, two were pledged to Lowden, one to Hoover, and nine uncommitted.

Governor Al Smith had easy sailing in the Democratic vote, making a clean sweep of the entire delegation of 26.

WEAK SPOT IN
\$3 AUTO LICENSE
MEASURE SHOWN

SALEM, Ore., April 6.—In case the voters approve, at the November election, either of the initiative measures reducing the annual license fee on pleasure cars to \$3 a year, the average motor vehicle license paid by Oregon car owners would be only one-fourth of the average license fee and property tax paid by pleasure car owners in California.

This was pointed out recently by Thomas B. Kay, state treasurer, who said that under the proposed initiative measure the annual motor vehicle fee is fixed at \$3, and no provision is made for placing the pleasure automobiles on the property tax roll. As a result of this, the state could not expect to collect in excess of \$3 for the operation of pleasure machines. In California the average plate

license fee is \$5.30 a year, while the average property tax on cars is \$11.90. Adding the average gas tax of \$15.48, California car owners contribute annually for the operation of their cars an average of \$32.68.

In Washington the average plate license is \$18.67, with an average property tax of \$10.07. The average gasoline tax paid by Washington motorists is \$9.59 a year, making the average contribution resulting from the use of their machines \$38.33 a year.

The average gasoline tax in Oregon is \$14.27, which would make the average total tax in this state under the proposed new laws \$17.27 a year.

PHONE CONTACT WITH AIR
Liners IS PROBABILITY

NEW YORK, April 5.—Perfection of apparatus for communication from the home or office to the air liners of the future is the next objective of engineers of the American Telephone and Telegraph company.

They ultimately hope to extend regular telephone service into the skies so that a person using an ordinary phone in office or home can speak to a person flying in a plane.

Experimental equipment has been gathered together at Whippany, N. Y., and a new Fairchild cabin monoplane has been purchased for use in the tests. The plane is to be converted into a flying laboratory with many of the newest devices of the radio and telephone sciences. The present tests are a continuation of efforts first made in 1925.
