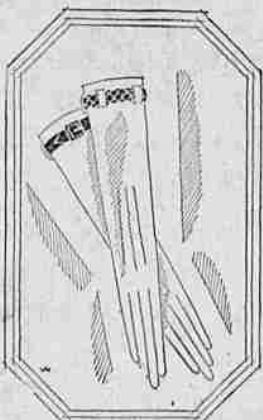

MOTORCYCLE CRASH IS FATAL TO STUDENT

TACOMA, Wash., April 7.—Renald Orr, 17 years old, popular school athlete of Loveland, a Tacoma suburb, was fatally crushed Friday when his motorcycle crashed into a telephone pole near his home. Paul Rice, 17, young Orr's chum, was critically injured, being thrown against the pole and under the machine from his seat behind the driver.

Rice has a possible fracture of the skull and his face and scalp are bruised and cut. He probably will recover, however, physicians say.
