YANKEES DOPED TO WIN THIRD STRAIGHT FLAG

Nearly All Critics Favor Them in Spite of Poor Pre-Season Form.

MACKMEN RANK NEXT

Some Think Senators Have Chance for Top Place—Speaker, Cobb Batting Well.

By ALAN J. GOULD

(Associated Press Sports Editor) NEW YORK, April 9.—The poor showing of the New York Yankees in their spring training games has failed to shake the confidence of the big majority of experts that the world's champions will again lead the American league parade.

These newspaper critics may be riding for a fall as most of them did last year when they picked the Athletics to win, but 35 per cent of those polled by The Associated Press this spring are convinced that Babe Ruth and his mates will repeat.

Forty-eight out of forty-nine writers and sports editors who contributed their opinions to this annual consensus of The Associated Press, pick the Yankees to make it three straight pennants. Tossing out the results of several exhibitions of these critics have been that even though the race this year may be closer than in 1927, when the Yankees finished 19 up on their nearest rivals, there is no reason to doubt that the powerful attack of the New Yorkers will again be dominant.

Athletics "Doped" Next
Of the handful of experts who predict the Yankees will be bumped off their high perch, five select the Athletics, led by Cobb and Speaker, as pennant-winners, while two name the Washington Senators as first choice.

This minority places the Yankees second in six selections and third in one list.
In sharp contrast to the National league selections, where the critics are divided in a wide range of opinion, there is remarkable little difference of opinion about the ranking of American league clubs. In fact they are picked right down the line to finish exactly as they did last fall.

Four Have Poor Chance
The Detroit Tigers round out the first division in the consensus and the pennant-contending "big four" that is conceded a big edge over the other half of the circuit. In fact only four critics think well enough of the chances of any of the other teams to pick them for first division berths. Three of these ballclubs go to the White Sox and one to the Cleveland Indians.

The White Sox are rated fifth and Cleveland sixth in the state, with the Browns conceding only a slight edge over the Boston Red Sox in the battle to escape last place.

Yanks Enjoy Batting
NEW YORK, April 9.—New York baseball clubs were back in major league territory today after a sudden suggestion of a Yankee effort to share in the glory that has been the Giants' on a triumphant spring journey through the south.

Praying at Charlotte, N. C., yesterday, the warm champions took advantage of a sensational advance in the home run market to score 25 runs against the local hotshots of the Sally league.

The game permitted Lou Gehrig, junior member of the firm of Ruth and Gehrig, home run specialists, to qualify for 1928 with his first home run of the practice period. He smashed two out of the park but his partner in crime against pitchers, the Big home run specialist, failed to run his string for April to four.

6 Straight for Giants
The Giants also collected their quota of glory by stopping Washington for the sixth time in a row. The Senators won the first game of the inter-league series in a match and have not been able to repeat. The Giants marched to their 13th straight victory by a score of 10 to 2.

The trans-Atlantic flier as well as several other persons were the guests of Joel Remington Fithian at the barbeque held near the Fithian estate. Soon after the picnic began, two of the guests were seen in close conversation and both left soon afterward for an airfield. After purchasing two dozen eggs, they chartered a plane and flew over the picnic scene.

As the first egg was dropped, Lindbergh, who is vacationing in Santa Barbara from his months of ovations and publicity, appeared to enjoy immensely the humor of the Easter eggings.

DETROIT, April 9.—Mrs. Evangeline L. Lindbergh, mother of Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh, took off from the Ford Airport at 8:55 a. m. today for Toronto, where she will attend the annual convention of the Ontario Educational association. She is to be made a life member of that organization.

Mrs. Lindbergh was accompanied by Miss Maud Dawson, also a teacher at the Cass Technical High School here. The Baltimore passenger cabin plane in which they took off was piloted by Louis G. Melster. Mrs. Melster also was a member of the party.

SAVES HUNDRED MEN, FIFTY NAGS BY AN ICY SWIM

PRINCE ALBERT, Sask., April 8.—Charles Smith, in charge of camp "B" of the Past Lumber company, north of here, today was the hero of a tale which is without parallel in this region.

While a hundred men and fifty horses were encamped on the north bank of the Saskatchewan River near Nipawin, prior to crossing the river into the village, the ice began to move. Following a brief conference they decided to chance a crossing. The horses were driven through the fast rising river water and after great difficulty both horses and men succeeded in gaining a position on one of the large floes.

The floe with its strange freight was carried nearly a mile downstream by the current and through the movement of ice, the men and horses were separated from shore by nearly 150 feet of water. Mr. Smith then swam to shore in an effort to direct the floe to land. A rope was tied around his waist and he plunged into the icy torrent, fully clothed.

AUTO THEFT GAME GETTING HARDER

CHICAGO, April 8.—Stealing an automobile and "getting away with it" is becoming harder every year, according to C. A. Vane of the National Automobile Dealers association, in announcing the result of a survey of automobile thefts in 28 American cities.

A total of 95,083 cars were stolen in the 28 cities last year, but of this number \$7,156 or 91.7 per cent were recovered.

Newport, R. I., had the only perfect record of all the cities. Thirty-six cars were stolen and 36 recovered.

Detroit led the list of cities in both the number of cars stolen and the number recovered. The figures were 12,356 stolen and 11,600 recovered.

PACIFIC COMBED FOR LOST VESSEL

HONOLULU, April 9.—A third naval vessel, the mine sweeper Whipple, was sent out from Pearl Harbor yesterday to look for the steamer Asiatic Prince, a British ship overdue a week at Yokohama. The mine sweeper Laidlaw and Harris left Pearl Harbor Saturday to search a wide area north of the Hawaiian Islands. The naval authorities said yesterday neither ship had found trace of the missing vessel after traveling 700 miles northwest of Honolulu. They were instructed to continue the search.

WARM RACE FOR PENNANT DUE IN THE NATIONAL

Seven Clubs, Thru Changes, Appear Much Stronger Than Last Year.

GIANTS BIG PROBLEM

McGraw to Depend Largely on New Men, Including Cohen at Hornsby's Old Station.

(Associated Press Sports Writer) NEW YORK, April 9.—National league pennant hopes, rising, a sap in the spring, cover more territory this year than has been the case in recent seasons. Seven clubs sit up and evince interest at the mere mention of the championship.

Only three points separated the first and third place clubs last year and the training period has left no suggestion that the race this year will be any less contested.

The first division clubs of last season, Pittsburgh, St. Louis, New York and Chicago, have undergone striking changes under the idle baseball months. The Pirates and Cubs claim added strength through an exchange of improved physical condition of several stars and the Giants have replaced one of the game's greatest hitters with a youngster, who will play second base where Rogers Hornsby worked in 1927.

The addition of Hazen Cuyler to Chicago's outfield has converted Joe McCarthy's outer trio into one of the strongest in the game and at the same time, "Sparky" Adams is credited with having "made" the Pittsburgh infield. St. Louis adds O'Farrell, Thevenon, Slades and Rheim in much better shape to give their best efforts.

Giants Unknown Quantity
The Giants present a problem. Hornsby has gone to Boston and Grimes to Pittsburgh. Andy Cohen has been given the second base assignment and must sink or swim around it. The other assets are Frank Hojan, a promising young catcher, Frank O'Doul, a hard hitting outfielder, and several brilliant young pitchers, Bill Walker, a Denver left hander, leading the list.

Three clubs who were in the second division hope for better things and even vision a pennant at the end of the season. Cincinnati has lost Pete Donohue, an able pitcher, but a return to winning form of Adolfo Luque, a Cuban star, has encouraged Jack Hendricks and his aides. The Reds think George Kelly, much improved in health, will do some fancy first basing and hitting.

Numerous Shifts
Boston Braves, bolstered by Hornsby at second and Lester Bell at third, expect to display more punch. The Braves have picked up Eddie Brandt, a left handed pitcher who seems to have the goods.

Brooklyn has drawn on Boston for Dave Bancroft, who can still play shortstop and hit; and Cincinnati has contributed Rube Bressler to the outfield. Hendrick and Herman, former first basemen, have converted into outfielders and the minor league have sent Blanton, Rincorda and Freigan to lead a hand in the infield with Tyson to help in the outfield.

The Phillies must undergo a period of reconstruction before they can challenge their fellows. A good start was made in getting Bill Kelly for first base, Arthur Whilney at third and Hal A. Darrick, an infielder-outfielder.

PORTLAND MESSENGER BOY INJURED IN COLLISION

PORTLAND, Ore., April 9.—William Bradley 21, messenger boy, was seriously injured today when a motorcycle he was riding collided with a street car at the east end of the Morrison street bridge. His skull was fractured. The accident was the fourteenth traffic mishap over Easter.

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FAMINE ADDS TO CHINA'S MISERY

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

SHANGHAI, April 9.—Famine conditions in the provinces of Shantung and Chihli are reported to be becoming steadily more acute. Crop estimates are only a fraction of normal years and the shortage of grain is resulting in the starving of thousands of persons.

Girls ten years and older are reported being sold for \$10 Mexican while those under ten years old are being sold for \$5. There are said to be few buyers, even at these figures.

Dispatches from Shanghai on January 26 said that it was estimated that 4,000,000 persons were destitute and in a state of semistarvation in the provinces of Shantung and Chihli.

A survey made late last year by foreign authorities and observers showed that thousands in Shantung were found to be subsisting on the bark of trees, chaff and grass, while in 35 of Shantung's 107 counties the crop was less than 10 per cent of normal. The belief was expressed that the famine would be as intensive as that of 1920-21, although the area was much smaller.
