## VERMONT DAM IS BROKEN BY RIVER

WELLS RIVER, Vermont, April 10.—A bursting dam at Gilman, 35 miles north of here, caused passing alarm today but aside from a short lived rise in the already swollen waters of the Connecticut river, was not believed to have had serious consequences.

The dam, the property of the Gilman Paper company extended across the river between 200 and 300 feet and was about 20 feet high. Late yesterday afternoon the water had risen to a point nine feet above the top of the dam wall or two feet higher than during the disastrous floods of last November.
