UNITING FOR TOURIST TRADE

The California practice of cooperation, nationally proverbial and in most places envied, is carrying its far-sighted citizenry beyond the borders of the state. Now they seek a publicity union of California with Oregon and Washington to promote scenic and recreational advantages of all three states, from Canada to Mexico, for the purpose of attracting tourists. This was formally announced at the visit here Sunday of the advance contingent of the Redwood region boosters, who will be followed by the main body of about two hundred the latter part of the month. Further public information is that the California Automobile association is leading a movement for development of a more direct route between the northern part of that state and the Yellowstone park region. Such a route would extend from Redding to Lakeview, Oregon, and across central Oregon to Burns to connect with the highway there. It would be known as the Yellowstone Trail. Still further information is that the Press Association of California has included a trip to famous Crater Lake and "other Oregon points of interest" in its program for this year. Our southern neighbor is certainly suiting action to the motto of "all for one, one for all" as it applies to a campaign for tourist trade. Oregon and Washington cannot fail to see the mutual advantage in entire coastal cooperation for such a purpose. It is estimated that this year will see thirty million persons—one-fourth of America's population—on pleasure bent in automobiles. They will spend many, many millions of dollars. Oregon can certainly get a larger share of that money legitimately by acting in concord with Washington and California than in acting independently. And the more Oregon profits, the better for Roseburg, with the great North Umpqua region close by. Locally we should get strong for the coastal chain plan and some day we'll get reciprocal boosts for the highway to Diamond Lake.

SAFER INSURANCE BUSINESS

An organization of state insurance agents for the chief purposes of raising ethical standards and placing operations generally on a one hundred per cent clean, business-like basis is proposed by State Insurance Commissioner Clare A. Lee in an address to the convention of state agents in this city. Requirements of a bond and membership fee and a mental test to determine familiarity with insurance laws and practices to eliminate the "curbstone" type of policy solicitor, as Mr. Lee suggests, appear like a desirable plan and one that may meet with legislative approval. Why shouldn't it find its way into the Oregon statutes? Examination and test laws protect the public as far as is reasonably possible from incompetent lawyers, doctors, dentists, school teachers, plumbers, electricians, barbers and many other professions and trades, and there is no apparent reason why it shouldn't be protected as well from that type of insurance solicitors who, either from lack of business principles or thorough knowledge of the code, are apt to bring undeserved losses to their patrons and, at the same time, equally as undeserved blame upon the companies they represent. An objection to Commissioner Lee's plan might be based upon the thought that the duty of confining insurance agencies to only competent and reputable persons should devolve upon the companies rather than the state. Be that as it may, however, the public should be given the fullest measure of legal protection in its dealings on insurance matters. If the companies desire a law that will provide the maximum of such protection, the state should not hesitate to enact it. A license then issued to an individual to write insurance would be a state guarantee to the public that little or no chance for either misrepresentation or misunderstanding would exist when a policy was issued.

\$5000, dead or alive, for any bank or gully of charging usurious interest. That would be technically as lawful as the bankers' generous offer for burglar corpses.

Holland, Belgium and other countries are injured financially by American restrictions on importation of bulbs, flowers and plants. Americans regret the necessity of keeping out bulbs hard to get here. Science might find some way to make bulb importation safe, by use of gas or brief application of heat sufficiently intense to kill harmful bacteria without destroying life in the bulb.

Bar, shape and plate steel prices were raised in February. Last week steel pipe prices went up 5 per cent.

Raising prices is one way to keep up income when business is dull. But is it the BEST way?

WEATHER HOLDING GERMAN AIRPLANE

OREGON SUPREME COURT TO CELEBRATE SUNDAY

SALEM, Ore., April 10.—On invitation of Albert Tozier, caretaker of Champoug Park, historic site of the establishment of provincial government in Oregon, the state supreme court will go to Champoug next Sunday for a brief ceremony in commemoration of the first law action by the supreme court of Oregon. The records show that this first action was the case of Ahl Smith vs. Nivevah Ford, wherein action to recover a team of oxen and that the season was held on Taalatin Plains the third Tuesday in April, 1841. The case was conducted by Judge O. Russell, assisted by R. Moore, justice of the peace. Members of the present supreme court will speak at the meeting Sunday.

PRINCE OF WALES FALLS OFF HORSE 27TH TIME

FLAGGMOORE, England, April 10.—The Prince of Wales registered his 27th fall today while riding in the High Peak point-to-point races. He was not hurt.

Hiding his mare, Miss Griss, the prince took the first three fences in good style, but the mare took off badly at the sixth fence, stumbled and threw her royal rider over head.

The prince caught her, remounted and continued the race, but at the last fence was again thrown. He was not hurt in either fall.

Thousands of spectators, still on Easter holidays, watched the race. The prince, in his racing during the past few weeks has had a great deal of hard luck at the fences, having thrown three times on one day and twice on another.

His last fall was on April 2, but he was back in the saddle on April 5, and captured the royal nuptial cup at Oxtou by twenty lengths.

STALLARD'S REVISED BILL ACCEPTED FOR BALLOT

SALEM, Ore., April 10.—Secretary of State Kozer has filed the ballot title for the revised Stallard \$3 automobile license fee bill. The title, prepared by Attorney General Van Winkle, reads as follows: "To provide a \$3 annual license fee for motor vehicles of all kinds except trucks, trailers, semi-trailers and electric vehicles for commercial purposes for which class as such fees remain unchanged; also except passenger buses which it exempts from all license fees now paid except the present seat tax; also exempting motor vehicles not common carriers used primarily for commercial purposes from additional license fees which they now pay; exempting for hire cars of all kinds from any and all license fees whatsoever and abolishing all fees based upon the weight of motor vehicles."

OLD MAPS GIVE INFORMATION ON SCOTTSBURG ROAD

County Engineer Floyd Frear has come into possession of two very interesting maps of Douglas county, or, rather, of the state of Oregon, showing information concerning Douglas county. One of the maps was drawn in 1852 and the other in 1859 and were secured through the United States government. Mr. Frear obtained the maps in an effort to secure information concerning the old military road to Scottsburg, this information being needed in road work now in progress.

The map shows the roads to Scottsburg existing about as present, one going in from Drain and the other from Wilbur. The north and south road, now replaced by the Pacific highway, turned off about at Anlauf and went through on a line to Corvallis instead of by way of Eugene as at present. This old road to Corvallis still exists and may be traveled in the summer time. There has recently been some agitation for its improvement.

These early maps are very accurate in their detail, especially in view of the fact that there was little available material from which to work. The Umpqua river is shown very accurately and distances on the whole are very carefully worked out.

What is now known as Reed's port was then listed as Providence. Scottsburg was the principal town of the county, while Winchester marked the head of travel along the river. There was no Roseburg and, in fact, no town between Winchester and Canyonville, which was then listed as "Kenyonville."

All of the country east of what is now the Pacific highway was unexplored territory and was left blank.

The maps were drawn under the direction of General "Fighting Joe" Hooker, later of Civil war fame, who was designated by the president to make the surveys.

The boy, who came south with his father, Dr. Bolling Lee, of New York City, became a "regular buddy" of the mayor's on the special trip to Stone Mountain and Mr. Walker later told newspaper men that he intended appointing the youthful Robert on his official staff. Upon doing this, he would have made an exact copy of General Lee's uniform, now preserved in Richmond, Va., and would request that Robert wear it on all state occasions.
