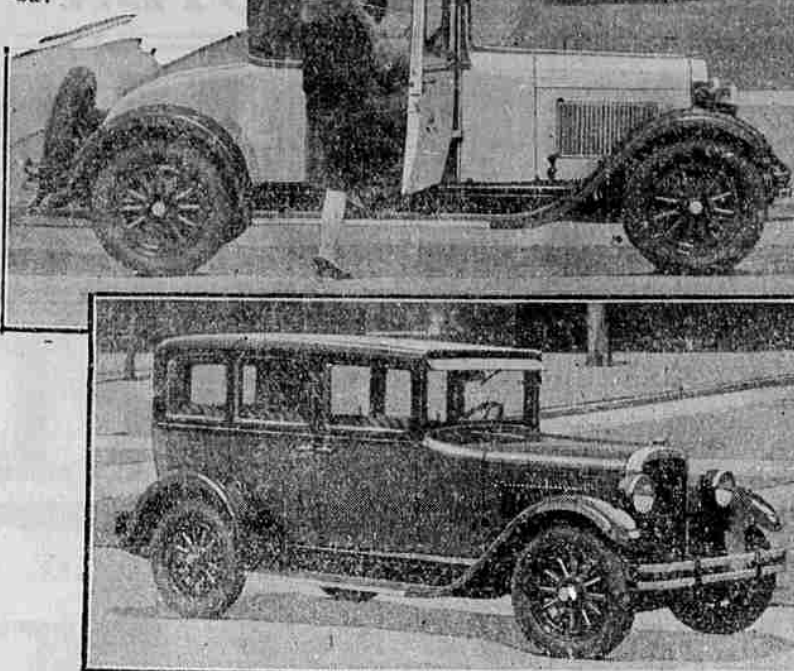


Dodge Brothers Introduce The Standard Six

MULTNOMAH TO BE REIMBURSED FOR SHORT ACCOUNTS

PORTLAND, Ore., April 11.—The county will be reimbursed for shortages of Fred W. Angell, ex-district court clerk, and the late John Brown, justice of the peace at Gresham, the county commissioners were told today.

As the first step in making good the shortages, the Fidelity and Deposit company of Maryland today turned over to the county commissioners a check for \$4,000 to cover the full penalty of Angell's bond for 1923-24 and '25.

The New Amsterdam Casualty company tendered a check for \$1,000 in the case of Brown, whose shortage amounted to \$1042.50. The county in this case will stand a loss of \$42.50, Brown having been bonded for but \$1000.

In Angell's case the total shortage was \$5,500. Part of this shortage occurred in 1927, when Angell was bonded by the United States Fidelity company. The difference between the actual shortage and the \$4,000 paid today, amounting to \$1,500, will also be paid, \$1,000 by the bonding company and the other \$500 by Angell himself, thereby making good the total shortage.

Bonding companies have indicated that they will not prosecute. District Attorney Myers said today he had no comment to make on the case.

Angell, it was said, was putting forth every effort to make proper restitution.

BASEBALL DERUT IN EAST GREETED BY COLD WEATHER

Cold weather, baseball's nemesis, cast a chill about a majority of the eight parks for the major league openings today but the enthusiasm of the impatient fans was such that shortly after noon 250,000 customers were ready to move to the battle fields. The cold, raw weather, with heavy clouds in eastern cities, suggested that the "warming up" of players would be only a resture.

Washington fans who participated in an advance opening yesterday under unfavorable weather conditions wrapped themselves in blankets and indications today were that fans in several other cities would follow the capital example.

Governors were ready to test out the first ball and the presidents of the two leagues and Commissioner Landis were adding a touch of distinction to three cities.

OREGON GAME AND FISH SUBJECTS AT MEDFORD MEETING

Only a meager description of the man was obtained from the girl.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 11.—Stroller chickens were quoted lower today in line with price reductions in the Seattle markets. Receipts were heavier and the outlook for next week promises sufficient supplies of good sized broilers to meet the rather large demand which has kept the market shrunken up previously at strong prices.

Capons were in limited supply today and demand good at steady prices. Turkey receipts were also nominal. The hatching season is now on and raisers are not marketing anything to speak of. Other classes of poultry were plentiful with prices generally easier.

Further weakness in the butter market was evident when prices on lower grades receded a little. Prime first and first dropped half a cent to 28 and 37 cents respectively. Other grades and butterfat were unchanged.

Egg prices were firm with standard first up half a cent at 22 cents. Old potatoes moved slowly today at weak prices.

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FORUM LUNCHEON PROGRAM TODAY VERY INTERESTING

The Chamber of Commerce forum luncheon today was well attended and proved a very profitable and interesting meeting. Many visitors were present to hear the program. The male chorus gave two selections, accompanied at the piano by Mrs. C. S. Heintze. An announcement was made that next week's program will be in charge of the Umpqua Chiefs and that the Strawberry carnival plans will be discussed.

Today's program featured a talk by Frank J. Norton, proprietor of the local cannery, who went into detail regarding the local industry, showing how a nationwide reputation is being built up for Douglas county canned products. He stressed the necessity of cooperation on the part of the grower in maintaining a high quality pack in order to keep the business that is being developed. He told of his trip East and his findings there regarding business conditions, bringing a very optimistic report.

He was followed by H. H. Fletcher, local meteorologist, in charge of the weather bureau station. Mr. Fletcher contrasted the weather at Yellowstone Park, from which station he came about the middle of February, showing that in coming to Roseburg he came to a climate that in February was very like that of Yellowstone in the summer. He told of receiving reports from stations all along the coast during the past week, and that Roseburg's weather was the most mild of any of the reporting districts. Roseburg's climate, he said, is ideal and is the climate for which many people are seeking. He urged that the weather conditions be given more advertising. He also extended the services of the department in providing weather statistics to those who desired them.

EIGHT SLAIN, 17 JAILED IN LATEST MEXICAN ROUNDUP

MEXICO CITY, April 11.—Dispatches from Guadalajara today said eight insurgents, including a chieftain, were killed and an army officer and one soldier wounded in three clashes at various points in the state of Jalisco.

Seven women and ten men arrested when Mexico City police raided three houses in or near Mexico City in search for supporters of the Jalisco insurgents were released today. Two other persons arrested at the same time, Felix Plata Juarez, a relative of the priest Miguel Projaure, who was executed after an attempt to assassinate General Obregon, and Damazo Martinez, were held for further investigation.

Police claimed they seized a supply of arms and ammunition intended for the Armi government forces in Jalisco.

COURT REJECTS COUNTER ACTION OF EX-KLANSMEN

PITTSBURGH, Pa., April 11.—A counter action of five ousted Ku Klux Klansmen seeking a receivership for the order in Pennsylvania was thrown out of federal court here this afternoon by Federal Judge W. L. S. Thompson. Judge Thompson interrupted arguments to hand his opinion from the bench. He held the federal court was without jurisdiction and that the question of a receivership and accounting for money collected in Pennsylvania by the Klan was a matter for the state courts.

Charges that Imperial Wizard Hiram Evans, of the Ku Klux Klan, used Klan money to foster murder, riots, arson, and other acts of violence, were made in court by Van A. Harrickman, attorney for five deposed members who seek a receivership for the order in Pennsylvania.

In a heated argument with Klan counsel, Harrickman, himself a defendant in a suit filed by the Klan, said Evans not only misused the funds of the order but had boasted he was the order and he would elect presidents, control congress, dominate the courts and overthrow state governments.

SENATE RAISES AMOUNT FIXED FOR FARM AID

WASHINGTON, April 11.—An amendment by Senator McKellar, Democrat, Tennessee, providing an appropriation of \$100,000,000 for farm relief under the McNary-Haugen bill instead of \$250,000,000 was adopted today by the senate. The vote was 42 to 39.

Increase in the proposed fund to \$400,000,000 was supported by 25 Democrats, 16 Republicans and the Farm-Labor senator while eight Democrats and 22 Republicans opposed it.
