escaped being in the midst of the disaster. The bomb was placed at the base of one of the electric lamp posts lining Piazzal Giulio Cesare and exploded about the time the king was scheduled to pass the spot. The base of the lamp post was three feet high and contained a little wicket gate which could be opened easily with an old-fashioned watch key. It was thought the malefactor disguised himself as an electrician and opened this wicket as though making repairs.

**Many Arrests Made**  
MILAN, Italy, April 13.—With sixteen dead and ten of the forty injured near death, the Italian authorities today worked swiftly in an effort to discover the perpetrators of yesterday's bomb explosion which missed King Victor Emmanuel by the slim margin of ten minutes.

Anxious to satisfy the nation's demand that the victims be avenged, the police worked strenuously. Many arrests were made.

### NEW AIRPORT TO BE GRADED SUNDAY MORNING

Materials, Machinery and Labor Donated for Preparing the Temporary Runways.

Roseburg's new airport is to be put in temporary condition for use next Sunday, a large group of members of Umpqua Post of the American Legion being expected to report to donate labor for the improvement of the tract. Only a small amount of hard labor is to be done, and this can be completed in a short time, provided there is a sufficient force of workmen. A fence is to be removed and a bridge built across the small stream at the east side of the field. Grading of the runways will be done by machinery.

The county court has donated the use of the county's road machinery for grading and scraping the runway, and the surface will be graded down so that ships may land there. The surface is already level and on good smoothing to be put in good shape.

E. L. Price, soil specialist with the state college was over the field yesterday with the members of the aviation commission and made several suggestions. He made some soil tests and advised that the entire tract be sown heavily to grass. This will quickly form a sod that will permit use of the field in wet muddy weather. Irrigation along the runways can keep the sod green there in the summer if desired. The field is to be drained naturally, he stated, that only surface drainage will be necessary to provide a fine all-year airport.

After the runways are prepared tomorrow, the field is to be marked, so that it may be spotted from the air. Markers are also to be provided in the city pointing to the field. The Terminal Hotel is to put a large arrow on its roof, pointing to the field, and J. W. Tollman in Riverside has consented to have a marker placed on his building.

Denn-Gerretsen company is donating five gallons of Certaintone paint to provide the markers at this field and at the Tollman building and for signs that are to be prepared by Roy Huffman, who is donating his labor.

The several oil companies are donating gasoline and oil for operating the tractor and grading machinery, while C. A. Lockwood is donating tractor and implements.

It will be several months before the city can sell its bonds and secure title to the airport, and as the season will be well advanced by that time the legionnaires, who sponsored the project, are putting the field in temporary condition for use, so that no time will be lost in securing all possible benefit from the airport. This work is being done without cost to the city, the veterans doing all of the work and taking the initiative in all activities.

### M'NARY-HAUGEN BILL PASSED BY SENATE, 53 TO 23

WASHINGTON, April 13.—Bearing a majority of 30 senate votes in its favor, the McNary-Haugen farm relief bill resisted today on the doorstep of the house where early action is expected to send it to the White House. There, an almost certain veto faces it for the second time.

Passed late yesterday by the senate by a vote of 53 to 23, as compared to the 47 to 39 sanction given it at the last session, the measure retained the controversial equalization fee which caused President Coolidge to veto the bill last year, principally on the ground that this provision was unconstitutional.

Should the president again return the measure to congress without his approval, administration leaders in the senate doubt whether it could be passed over the veto even though the vote yesterday showed more than a two-thirds majority of those present for it. They believe that with a full membership present a two-thirds majority could not be obtained.

A farm board, appointed by the president with the consent of the senate, also would set up an advisory council, named by farm organizations, established for each commodity. Approval by the council would be necessary before the fee was applied.

In arguing for executive approval, McNary contended that because the fee became effective plenty of time would be available for the courts to pass on its constitutionality.

### EVANS DENIES IN COURT NEGRO WAS BURNED BY KLAN

lan Klansman, had testified that the fate of a negro had been debated in the Dallas lodge and that later the negro was taken out, tarred and oiled, and then set on fire, late in 1920.

"No such occurrence ever took place," said Evans. He declared that in the fall of 1920 there were no klansmen in Dallas, and that the first klansmen were taken into the order there in 1921.

Evans declared he tried to stop a Klan parade in Carnegie, Pa., when one klansman was killed during a riot, saying the parade was held when the police told the klansmen they could stage the demonstration if it was peaceful.

He denied that he ever said riots would increase Klan membership, and said he had never ordered klansmen to whip anyone. The imperial wizard denied that "black robe" or "night rider" gangs existed within the Klan, and said that in all his life he had never ordered any bombings. Asked if klansmen were forced to take a "blood curdling oath" to follow him blindly, he said the first duty of a klansman was to abide by the laws of the United States.

### MUCH INTEREST SHOWN IN OPENING OF TROUT SEASON

With the opening of trout season set for next Sunday the thoughts of the sportsmen are turning to the preparation of fishing tackle and the overhauling of the old gear. Indications are that the fishing streams of the county will be well supplied with fishermen Sunday, not alone from local sources, but from neighboring counties and states as well.

Windows of sporting goods stores are crowded with displays of fishing tackle and a fine trade has been reported by each business. Outside the windows the sportsmen were to be seen discussing the merits of various brands of tackle and talking over plans for the Sunday trip.

Prospects are for a fair catch Sunday. The water is still a little high and muddy for good trout fishing, but some fish should be taken on bait. Trout are reported to be jumping for flies late in the warm evenings, but the fishing experts are not advising fly fishing at this time, recommending that the most of the fishing be done with bait.

Chinook fishing is now starting and some good catches are being made by trollers.

### ATTY-GEN. AIDE IN CALIFORNIA IN BOOZE FIGHT

SAN FRANCISCO, April 13.—Leo French, deputy state attorney general, and his wife, Ethel French, were arrested at the Bellevue hotel here today on charges of resisting police officers, being drunk in public and disturbing the peace, in the fight which preceded the arrest French was clubbed by a hotel clerk, police said.

The entire fifth floor of the fashionable hotel was in an uproar before police subdued and handcuffed the state official and took the couple to the city prison. Both were released on their own recognizance.

Joseph Bella, who confessed slaying Mrs. Julia Flaherty, of Danville, Illinois, the mother of seven children, was the third of the trio of convicted Illinois murderers for whom Friday the 13th of April had been fixed for death. Every preparation for his electrocution had been completed at the Chester state penitentiary when a reprieve until May 22 was issued by Governor Small. Had there been no interruption, Bella would have been the first man in Illinois to die in the electric chair. Birger would have been the last to hang, his conviction having come before the law replacing the gallows with the chair became effective.

**Patterson Issues Pardon**

SALEM, Ore., April 13.—Clarence Thompson, who three and a half years ago was sent to the state penitentiary for embezzling \$5,000 state funds while holding the position of cashier in the state treasurer's office under Treasurer O. P. Hoff and Jefferson Myers, was freed yesterday under a conditional pardon from Governor Patterson.

The governor's action was recommended by the state parole board. Thompson's minimum expired Wednesday, making him eligible for clemency, and since he had no scores against him as a prisoner the pardon was granted. One of the conditions is that Thompson live outside the state, and it is said he will live in the state of Washington.

**Court's Position Given**  
SALEM, Ore., April 13.—The state supreme court today issued a formal statement of its position concerning clemency for Ellsworth Kelley and James Willos. The statement bears out previously published press statements to the effect that the court as a judicial body would make no recommendation. The press statements, however, mentioned a telegram from Bradley Ewers, Willos' attorney to the governor in which Ewers said members of the court would individually recommend commutation to life imprisonment. Ewers' statement was confirmed by Chief Justice Rand when shown a copy of the telegram. The chief justice emphasized to newspaper men that such was the position of the court members, not on the bench as a court, but individually off the bench.

**BRUMBY EXONERATED IN SUBARMININE DISASTER**

WASHINGTON, April 13.—Complete exoneration of Rear Admiral Frank H. Brumby, in charge of salvage operations after the submarine S-4 disaster, was included in a supplementary report by the naval court of inquiry, approved today by Secretary Wilbur.
