Gentle Effects Emphasized by Materials and Colors

Both are in pansy shades—by all odds the most popular colors this spring.

The first is fashioned of two quite contrasting materials, angora wool and satin. It is circled and lavender. The angora jumper is of the lighter shade, with a hand banding around the neck and a wide hip-banding, side pockets and cuffs of the deeper shade satin.

The skirt of satin has its wide pleats attached hip-length, giving the effect of a skirt yoke. Bone buttons of still a third purple shade fasten the pockets and the cuffs and decorate the side front of the jumper banding.

Topped by Natural Baku

The hat topping this outfit is natural colored baku, with a novel brim that is much wider on one side and has a tricky little slash and turned back brim where the wider part meets the narrow front. A double bow of purple grosgrain catches the color note of the suit.

The second suit is charmingly new—with its notched lapels, its double-breasted front, emphasized by glass buttons and its jumper that can serve the double purpose of being a coat if one wants to wear a dainty waist with the skirt.

This suit of flat crepe is of the new shade called pansy. Its lustrous texture gives the impression of two tones or more. It has hand-stitched one-inch bandings that give a richness to the bottom of the jumper and cuffs and match them up with the pleats that run clear around the skirt.

The third hat tops this is of transparent felt, in a dark pansy shade. Its brim shields the right eye and then ties itself into a decorative bow on the left side, giving that eyebrow line that is the correct one for spring this year.
