Mrs. Grinstead named those in the year book of prayer for the day; and Mrs. Fies offered prayer for the missionaries.

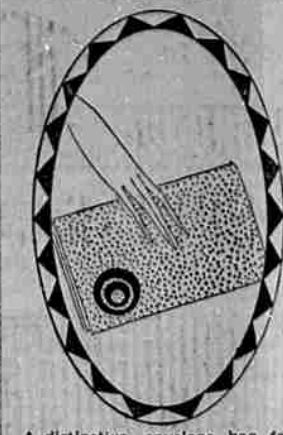
The president, Mrs. Geo. E. Houck, named four goals for the society: giving, going, praying and working.
