CHINESE AGAIN CULTIVATING BIG CROPS OF OPIUM

Poppy Fields So Extensive Food Products Become Scarce; Habit Cure Found in Japan.

CHUNGKING, Szechuen, China, April 16.—In the plains and valleys of southwest China, the largest opium crop since the government's anti-opium edict of 1927 is nearing harvest. In this part of China the poppy is a winter crop, harvested in April and May. Openly and with the encouragement of their military overlords, the farmers have planted the poppy so extensively that in some areas food products are scarce because the fields are given over to opium growing. A foreigner who traveled through one Kweichow district reported 29 fields of poppies to one of wheat.

An American engineer recently returned from Kweichow brought an analysis of conditions which make opium the principal source of official revenue for that province and virtually the only profitable commodity for export. Kweichow has no roads connecting it with other parts of China. Transport is by coolies over narrow trails. One coolie carries an average load of 70 pounds, and from Kweichow it takes him 15 days to reach a market at Chungking on the north or 20 days to reach water transport at Luchow, Kwangsi, to the east. He gets about the equivalent of 40 cents a day. If he carries opium his load is worth about \$200 in Kweichow and double or triple that in the Chungking or Canton market. If he carries rice or other grain his load will be worth no more than \$2.50 in any market, and the transport cost would eat this up before the coolie had covered a third of his journey.

MUKDEN, Manchuria, April 14.—Relief for opium addicts who want the habit broken is promised by Japanese scientists working under the Kwantung Leased Territory Government at Dairen. Dr. K. Ozawa and Dr. T. Kuroi report a large measure of success in experiments in search of an opium cure. For the past year they have been treating patients in a government hospital, and absolute cure is claimed in 75 per cent of the cases.

The treatment consists of hypodermic injections of a compound of arsenic, iodine and calcium.

GARDINER WANTS FERRY SERVICE TO REEDSPORT

A county ferry service between Reedport and Gardiner is wanted by Gardiner residents so that tourists may have access to the Umpqua and Roosevelt highways, according to T. W. Angus and J. A. Janelle, who were travelers to Marshfield Monday, says the Port Umpqua Courier.

A plan by which private boats can be used and the county spared the expense of investing money in crafts is sponsored by the district. They state that if a contract for the service is awarded to the lowest bidder the county would have only part of the expense to pay, as a nominal charge could be made for hauling the passengers and freight between the two cities.

It is pointed out that tourists who visit Gardiner could better make their way to Reedport by the use of a county ferry and in this manner, not only would Gardiner be benefited but Reedport would also share in the move.

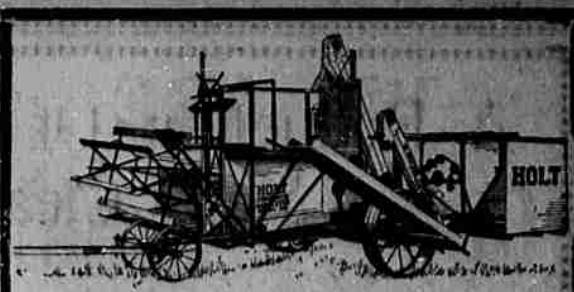
