IDEAL MAN FOR SECRETARY OF STATE

No important office in the state of Oregon demands closer supervision or a more intimate knowledge of public business than that of secretary of state. Its administrator should be practical, efficient and energetic. All three traits are happily combined in Hal E. Hoss, candidate for the Republican nomination, whose popularity is co-extensive with the boundaries of the state that he desires to serve as successor to Sam A. Koser. The middle initial of his name might well stand for "Energy," for it is that dominant quality in his make-up that carried him from a railway section employee to the position of private secretary to Governor I. L. Patterson. The age of seventeen found him managing a small newspaper. This his natural talent and progressiveness soon outgrew and in time he became identified with leading metropolitan dailies and won recognition as a leader in state press affairs. The journalistic and printing professions could not absorb all his capacity for work, however, and he devoted much activity to commercial and civic organizations. At one time he was secretary of the Oregon City Chamber of Commerce and the director of a business men's association. As private secretary to Governor Patterson, Mr. Hoss made the most of the opportunity to increase his knowledge of state affairs, and it may be truly said that he has become thoroughly conversant with Oregon's administrative needs. If personal experience and past record of activities count for anything, Mr. Hoss may be regarded as an ideal man for the position of secretary of state. We know of no candidate for any state office who can present better evidence of personal fitness for the favorable consideration of the electorate.

INFLUENZA, FOOD SHORTAGE MENACE

ICE-BOUND FOLK

(Associated Press Local Wire)
ASHLAND, Wis., April 19.—Seven hundred inhabitants of Madeline Island, only six miles from the Wisconsin mainland in Lake Superior, are living on short rations and fighting influenza as efforts to give them succor go forward here.

Although it is only a few short miles from the island to Bayfield, the nearest mainland point, efforts to reach Madeline have been balked by a field of breaking ice. Islanders, at the risk of their lives,

have attempted to reach the mainland and obtain food, but have been turned back by the treacherous ice fields. Their plight and their efforts to relieve it have been related by telephone which connects by cable with the mainland.

Meat, flour and staples have been exhausted. Canned goods are the only food supply and these are near exhaustion.

The influenza outbreak was described as not serious, relatives and neighbors caring for twenty cases reported. The services of a physician, however, have been urged.

STUTZ BLACKHAWK LOSER IN PRIVATE RACE FOR \$25,000

INDIANAPOLIS, April 19.—Two race between a privately owned Hispano-Suiza and a Stutz Blackhawk was called off at 8:21 a. m. today after 17 hours and 21 minutes of the proposed 24 hours trial had elapsed.

A broken connecting rod caused withdrawal of the Stutz entry. When the Stutz withdrew the Hispano-Suiza had travelled 1,857 miles and had maintained an average speed of 79.14 miles an hour.

The Stutz was more than six hundred miles in the rear, having been forced to spend much time in the pits because of mechanical trouble.

The race was called off by Eddie Edemurn, official of the American Automobile association, after he had ascertained that the owner of the French car did not care to continue racing alone merely for the purpose of possibly establishing a track record.

Charles Weymann, owner of the Hispano-Suiza, said his only interest was to win the \$25,000 wager which he had with F. E. Moskovich, owner of the Blackhawk.

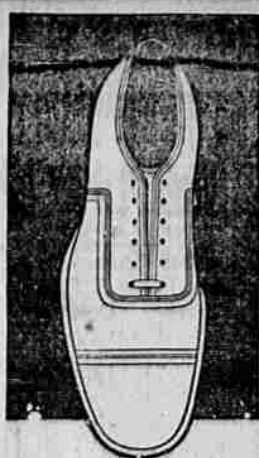

CARNIVAL THIS YEAR PLANNED ON HUGE SCALE

Many New Features to Be Introduced for Annual Festival.

WILL START EARLY

Decoration to Be Put Up for State Conventions That Come Just Before Carnival.

Roseburg's strawberry carnival this year is to be one of the biggest and best the city has ever known, according to T. H. Ness, head of the Umpqua Chiefs and general chairman of this year's carnival committee. In fact, there will be nearly a week of carnival, due to the fact that there will be two big state conventions immediately preceding the festival.

The Business and Professional Women's Club opens its state convention on Friday, May 18, continuing over Sunday, and the I. O. O. F. grand lodge convenes Monday, May 21, and continues until Thursday, May 24, the date of the carnival opening.

This means that Roseburg will be visited by approximately 7,000 people during the carnival period and so the festive spirit will prevail for a considerable period of time.

The decorations committee is working in cooperation with the Business and Professional Women's clubs and with the I. O. O. F. grand lodge in dressing up the city and the street decorations will be put out about a week before the carnival and will be in keeping with the two state conventions that are to be held during the week.

The Kline Shows, that have been engaged for the carnival, will arrive on the week of the 26th and will be in operation for the full week. The Kline Shows have combined with two other big carnival companies, so that there will be a far larger group of attractions than ever before. The company operates all of the games, booths and shows under one management instead of leasing out concession rights, and those who have had dealings with the Kline management in the past know that every effort is put forth to keep the games free from any objectionable features, and under the new system of control an absolute pledge is given that there will be no games in operation that can in any way prove objectionable.

A particular plea is being voiced by the carnival committee this year for cooperation on the part of the residents of the city and the merchants and business houses in the matter of decorated automobiles and floats.

It is desired that there be a greater showing of decorated automobiles than ever before. In the past there have been some fine showings of decorated cars and last year there were some excellent entries, although there were not as many as desired. This year it is hoped that the parade of decorated cars will be one of the greatest features of the carnival.

Business houses are asked to take away their automobiles to the matter of entering decorated floats in the industrial parade, which it is hoped to make a great event of the carnival.

The various committees have all been appointed and are hard at work. The committee on the queen's contest has started its work and the race will be on with in the next few days. This year all of the contestants will have an added incentive in the way of prizes to be awarded to those who enter, so that those who fail to win the coveted honor of being elected queen will receive some worthwhile prize for their efforts.

Attractive carnival hats are being ordered and will be sold as a part of the queen's contest. A Whippet coach is to be a prize in the parade drawing on the night of the queen's ball.

There are many fine features to be introduced this year in connection with the program of entertainment. Aside from the usual features there will be some new and unique stunts, one of which will be a great exhibition of fireworks at Finlay Field on one night of the carnival. There will also be a good program of sports arranged for the several days.

There is an immediate need for full cooperation and support in staging this year's carnival. Because of the great many visitors who will be in the city during the carnival period, Roseburg should put forth a special effort to stage an entertainment that will prove of great interest. This will require the utmost cooperation on the part of all residents of the city. It will be necessary to raise a large sum of money to carry on this year's carnival and the solicitation committee with whom he is the field. It is urged that those who are interested in the city's
