MEREDITH COUP IN
IOWA PLANNED BY
ANTI-SMITH WING

DES MOINES, Ia., April 20.—(A. P.)—Outnumbered more than five to one in the number of pledged delegates, Iowa democrats favoring E. T. Meredith, former secretary of agriculture, for their presidential choice, plan to raid the province of more than 571 uninstructed delegates in the state democratic convention here April 20.

They hope thus to muster enough strength to defeat instruction of the state's 26 delegates to the party national convention for Gov. Alfred E. Smith of New York.

In pledged delegates the Meredith forces now have less than 150 votes of the 667 necessary to control the state convention. Smith-instructed delegates total approximately 550, or about 117 short of

convention control. Early claims of the Smith group listed more than 100 "favorable" delegates among the uninstructed forces, while the Meredith faction claimed assurances from nearly 100 in the unpledged bloc.

Failing to obtain sufficient strength to control the convention, the Meredith group may concentrate its final convention effort to prevent instruction of any kind. Interest in tomorrow's gathering, which will bring to a climax the hotly contested presidential preference campaign in Iowa, centers in contests over 81 delegates from Polk and Woodbury counties, containing the two largest cities—Des Moines and Sioux City.

Each of the counties elected two sets of convention delegates, favoring Smith and Meredith respectively. The contests will be ones for the credentials committee to settle.

WORLD'S BAPTISTS
WILL ASSEMBLE AT
TORONTO IN JUNE

TORONTO, Ont., April 20.—All corners of the world are expected to send preachers and laymen to the Baptist World Convention in Toronto in June.

A delegation of 10 from Australia alone is numbered among the 7,000 who are expected to gather here. The convention, which will open on June 23 and close June 29, is the regular gathering of representatives of the Baptist World Alliance.

Since the functions of the alliance meeting are advisory rather than legislative, churchmen explain, it is not expected that contentious matters of doctrine and interpretation that have disturbed churches in various parts of the

world will be discussed. Rev. Dr. E. Y. Mullins, president of the Southern Baptist Theological seminary, Louisville, Kentucky, who is president of the alliance, has been supervising arrangements for the convention.

Dr. Mullins reports that there has been remarkable progress by the Baptists in Roumania, especially since the granting of religious rights and freedom by the government.

"At one time they were terribly persecuted by the state, church and civil authorities, but this has ceased in consequence of a petition drawn up by the alliance's executive committee and signed by Baptists all over the world," he said.

"Interesting developments are afoot among the Baptists of South America where a plan is being devised to call a Latin-American Baptist convention in 1929. Another important plan is the establishment of a Baptist theological seminary in Moscow, Russia. Part of the fund raised for this purpose will become available soon and a number of young preachers await the opening of the school's doors."

CHICAGO FAVORS
ANOTHER WOMAN
GOVERN SCHOOLS

CHICAGO, April 20.—The notable success of the late Ella Flagg Young, as superintendent of the Chicago public school system, has created considerable sentiment in school and political circles for the appointment of a woman to the post of the ousted William McAndrew.

Names of three women, none of whom is actively engaged in school work, have been discussed; Mrs. Eva Holland Hamilton, who heads the republican women's organization in Cook county; Mrs. Elizabeth M. Fife, a practicing attorney; and Mrs. Leonard Brundage, club woman and wife of the former republican 24th ward committee-man.

Appointment of a successor to McAndrew, who was found guilty at a school board trial of insubordination and pro-British teaching, is not expected to be made until the last of May when a reorganization of the school board is anticipated. The term of President J. Lewis Coath, who led the attack upon McAndrew, expires at that time.

SYMPATHY BRINGS
\$250 TO ALASKAN
CARRIERS OF MAIL

WASHINGTON, April 20.—The thermometer stood at 50 below zero. But Wilbur Jewell merely pulled down his ear muffs tighter and set out from Chitana, Alaska, to deliver letters of Christmas greeting to the people of the circle. Before he got there he had severely frozen his hands and feet.

Sitting in her living room by the fire in a comfortable home in Norwalk, Conn., a woman read in the newspaper about Jewell's sacrifice and decided he ought to be rewarded.

Then, some time later, she also read about Maurice O'Leary, another Alaskan carrier of mails; who froze his hands and feet reaching his horse, which broke through the ice while they were making their lonely route, and had to have some of his fingers amputated.

\$7,500,000 FIELD
TO BE READY FOR
NAVY-NOTRE DAME

CHICAGO, April 20.—When navy meets Notre Dame on Soldiers Field October 13 in a football classic of the fall, Chicago's \$7,500,000 memorial to its war dead will stand completed—not only as the greatest stadium in the world but also as one of the world's greatest amphitheaters and exhibition halls.

Famed already as the modern coliseum where hundreds of thousands worshiped at the Eucharistic congress, where army played the navy and where Tunney defeated Dempsey, for the second time, Soldier Field when completed will include besides a place for spectacular outdoor pageants an extensive series of exhibition halls.

On either side, halls 975 feet in length and 50 feet wide will afford great quarters for exhibitions, in addition to the 600 feet long hall at the end.

Temporary wooden structure forming seats at one end of the stadium has been removed and concrete stands are rising in their place. The wooden seats were in prominence during the Tunney-Dempsey fight at the \$5 rim-side locations.

The stadium's builders, the south park commissioners, have promised to have the completed stadium in readiness for the Navy-Notre Dame game this fall.

DONOHUE, SHOCKER AND

OKLAHOMAN AGAIN LEADS
PACK OF MARATHONERS

CHILSEA, Okla., April 20.—Encouraged by rosters from his home town, Andrew Payne again has taken over the leadership in the cross-country marathon.

The Claremore youth led the field of 77 in the 44.7 mile jaunt from Tulsa yesterday to finish in 7:23:23, forcing Peter Gavuzzi of Southampton, England, from the lead in elapsed time. This gave Payne a total of 279:29:02, for the 1664.9 miles from Los Angeles.

Gavuzzi, who showed the Oklahoman into second place several days ago, needed 16 hours, 25 minutes and 10 seconds, giving him a mark of 281:07:15, nearly two hours more than Payne.

The caravan today had a 51 mile trek to Miami. Tomorrow the athletes will skirt the southeastern corner of Kansas on their way to Carthage, Mo.

TWO OF OUR WARS
UNNECESSARY, IS
CADMAN'S VIEW

ATHENS, Ga., April 20.—A growing consciousness against the necessity of wars that was little known prior to 1914 is the chief force working in the world today to prevent future wars, Dr. S. Parkes Cadman, New York minister and president of the federal council of churches in America, stated at the fourth annual religious welfare conference of the University of Georgia last night.

"A great percentage of the wars that have been fought, including two of our own, have been unnecessary wars," declared Dr. Cadman. His statements were made in reply to questions from the audience. Asked if a man should decide his duty to fight in case a war was declared and whether a man

should be declared a traitor if he did not fight, Dr. Cadman said: "That is something for every man to decide for himself. We have to rely upon that new consciousness. I do not doubt that any emergency will find the American people ready."

WINTER SLAYS STORKS

RADIO TO KANSAS KIN

The students, Fergus McKeever of Lawrence and George I. Jones of Topeka, operating low wave length stations 9DNG and 9AEK established connection with NINIC in Nicaragua Sunday night and a message from Governor Ben S. Paulsen was relayed to Kansas marines. Last night the greeting was acknowledged.
