CHRISTIAN CHURCH
PRE-DEDICATION
CAMPAIGN STARTS

The Charles Reigh Scoville evangelistic campaign got away to a good start yesterday when Rev. James R. Axtell, assistant evangelist, preached strong sermons to representative audiences at both the morning and evening sessions.

Instead of having an evangelistic service tonight Rev. Wm. R. Baird and Professor Isaac N. Faris will put on an evening's entertainment, Rev. Baird giving a number of readings and Mr. Faris several piano solos. There will be no charge of admission but an offering will be taken and the proceeds applied to equipping the pastor's study.

According to an announcement made by Rev. Baird the revival will be resumed Tuesday evening at 7:30 when Rev. Axtell will deliver one of his strongest sermons entitled, "Intercessory Prayer." Dr. and Mrs. Scoville, who have been attending the international convention of the Disciples of Christ, held in Columbus, Ohio, are expected to reach Roseburg in time for the Thursday night services.

Dr. Scoville in a written message informed the members of his party that the Columbus convention went over with a bang and that great progress is being made on the pentecost campaign which is being planned to commemorate the 100th anniversary of Pentecost, the inaugural day of the church.

Dr. Scoville, who is chairman of the committee on arrangements, says that plans are now complete for the greatest religious awakening in the history of the church. Every Christian church in the world will conduct a great Christian crusade during May and June of 1930, and the campaign will be concluded with a mammoth communion service at Washington, D. C., where the proposed \$1,250,000 Christian temple will soon be a reality.

The Sunday school attendance topped the 500 mark yesterday and plans are under way for 500 next Sunday.

The outstanding features of Sunday night's preliminary service was the cornet solo entitled "Calvary" by Mrs. Joseph Shockley, and the vocal solo entitled "Face to Face" by Rev. Baird, Miss Edna Carlson, Strang will sing Tuesday night.

In his introductory sermon Sunday morning Rev. Axtell drew a striking lesson from the life of St. Paul, the greatest New Testament character who turned the world upside down by his intense zeal. Mr. Axtell said the one great need of the world today was a bunch of Christians who would be willing to recklessly abandon themselves to the cause of Christ.

In his evening address he enlarged on the interview between Christ and the young ruler who came to the Savior seeking the way of eternal life.

Rev. Baird announced Sunday that a series of cottage prayer services will be held each Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday morning.

INCOME TAX SEEN
BY COMMITTEE AS
OREGON'S REMEDY

PORTLAND, Ore., April 21.—Oregon's tax problem can be met by the adoption of a state income tax, in the opinion of a sub-committee of the Oregon property tax relief commission, which met here late yesterday.

The report was written by Claude E. Ingalls, and was adopted by the sub-committee with only one dissenting vote, that of L. B. Smith, of Portland. The sub-committee did not recommend any form of income tax, preferring to wait until after the November election to learn what action voters of the state take on the three income tax measures that will come before them.

Ingalls stated that a four per cent flat rate income tax will yield \$1,700,000 annually.

Smith objected to the committee's stand on the ground that the advocates of the measures to be voted on will use it as campaign material.

The general commission is to receive the sub-committee's report this afternoon for discussion.

LONGVIEW FORGER
GETS PRISON TERM

LONGVIEW, Wash., April 21.—George W. Weavers, alias R. D. Ritters, 35, giving his home as Pendleton, Oregon, pleaded guilty to first degree forgery today and was sentenced for two to ten years in the state penitentiary.

Weavers admitted forging a check for \$55, using the name of H. E. Van Bowers, Kelso manager of the Shell Oil company, passing the check in purchasing a suit of clothing. He also admitted issuing a forged check for \$175 as a down payment on a used automobile. He was arrested late yesterday when the clothing store became suspicious and detained him on a pretext while it investigated and found the check forged.

In forging Van Bower's name Weavers used a rubber stamp taken from a Shell oil office which turned two night ago. Officers were investigating today to determine whether Weavers had any connection with the blaze.

HUMAN VOICE IS
REPRODUCED BY
MECHANICAL MAN

NEW YORK, April 21.—A mechanical voice spoke to the members of the American Physical Society at their annual dinner last night after a day devoted to the difficult business of canvassing recent achievements in their active field of research.

"Hullo!" It said with the excessively broad "a" attributed by American comedians to countrymen of its creator, Sir Richard Paget, noted British inventor and physicist, who was a guest of the society and manipulated the device.

"Hello London, are you there?" It asked, a little later, and then exclaimed:

"O Lilla, I love you!"

Sir Richard explained that his invention conformed to the laws of physics as applied naturally in human speech through control, by movement of the tongue and lips of the resonance developed in the mouth of the action of the vocal cords.

A bellows, operated by the foot, takes the place of the lungs, and an organ reed serves as the vocal chords. The function of the mouth and tongue is duplicated in several ways, a cardboard tube may be used with the tongue action supplied by manipulation of a disk fitted on the end of a rod. Different tones are obtained when a pinched rubber tube is moistened on the inside, but skillful hands and fingers applied to the end of the reed makes the most effective substitute for the natural organs.

The device is the product of a long study of the physics and mechanics of the human speech, which, Sir Richard observed, is a combination of two arts—the emotional art of grunting and the intellectual art of pantomime to convey ideas by movement of the tongue and lips. For example, he called attention to such root words as "up" and "down." In the former, the tongue and chin move upward while the speaker grunts, while in the latter, the pantomime is reversed.
