ROSEBURG WOMAN, RESIDENT 30 YEARS, DEAD

Mrs. Isia F. Cavender, wife of C. W. R. Cavender of this city, passed away at the family home on Winchester street Sunday afternoon following a brief illness.

The body has been removed to the Roseburg Undertaking company chapel and the funeral will be held in the auditorium, the time to be announced later, as the family is awaiting to hear from relatives. Dr. Frank B. Matthews will officiate and interment will be in the I. O. O. F. cemetery in charge of M. E. Ritter.

COLUMBIA RIVER FISH WHEEL BAN UPHELD IN COURT

WASHINGTON, April 23.—The appeal of F. J. McDowen and Sons, of Astoria, against the validity of the Oregon law prohibiting the operation of fish wheels and drag seines on the Oregon side of the Columbia river was dismissed today by the supreme court.

The court affirmed the decision of the lower courts sustaining the law.

JAPANESE LOSE SUIT TO DEFEAT ALIEN LAND LAW

WASHINGTON, April 23.—The alien land law of Washington was sustained as constitutional by the supreme court today in a case brought by the White River Gardens, Inc., when it affirmed the decision of the lower court.

The state charged the corporation had been formed by S. Katsumo, a Japanese, to take over land he had purchased on White River near Seattle. It asserted the trustees and officers of the corporation were dummies and that Katsumo had transferred his holdings to his daughter born in this country and a citizen, to circumvent the law.

During the oral argument of the case the court indicated it could see no reason to set aside the findings of the state court that the incorporation was a violation of the law and that the land became the property of the state.

PET COUGAR TAKEN AWAY BY THIEVES

GRANTS PASS, April 23.—Josephine county has developed a new kind of thief. Last night a pet cougar, a year old, was stolen from the service station owned by Henry Webb on the Redwood highway. The cat, which weighed more than 50 pounds, was tied by a chain in an enclosure. Thieves broke the lock and led the animal away, one pulling and the other evidently shouting. The cougar did not want to leave, as the tracks showed that he had dug his claws in the ground and had to be dragged along. The cougar was a real pet which, according to his owners, purred like a huge cat when petted.

BUILDING-LOAN ASSOCIATIONS TO CHECKED CLOSER

SALEM, Ore., April 23.—For a closer check on the business and methods of savings and loan associations in Oregon, State Corporation Commissioner McCallister has devised a system whereby a record of every loan made will be received by him every month. These will come from 22 companies that are incorporated in the state, having a total capital of about \$25,000,000.

Heretofore a check has been made on each company only once a year, at the time of preparing the annual report. The new monthly individual loan system is to be made by means of cards prepared by the commissioner. This will show principal and interest, date of the loan and plan of payment. Also it will show the name of the mortgagor and the exact location of the property mortgaged, the improvements and the association's appraisal value of the property. On the opposite side of the card is a blank form for the department's appraisal of necessary.

OVERHEATED BRAKES SET MOTOR BRAKES ON FIRE
