

SENATORS HEFLIN AND EDWARDS TILT OVER PRESS ITEM

Al Smith's Campaign Fund
Gives Alabamian Fresh
Lot of Material
for Tirade.

WASHINGTON, April 24.—Senator Edwards of New Jersey and Senator Heflin of Alabama, Democrats, looked on with interest today over the campaign expenses of Governor Smith of New York.

Challenged by Edwards to prove his statement that Mayor Frank Hague of Jersey City was paying the expenses of delegates of that state to the Houston convention, the Alabama senator retorted that the Smith managers were carrying on "the most corrupt campaign from the standpoint of the use of money. Squirrels, rabbits, coyotes, cougar, in the history of the party."

Edwards took the floor to describe as "untrue from beginning to end" the recent remarks of Heflin concerning Hague's activities.

"Let me repeat," he said, "the unfair and libelous charges hurled at Mayor Frank Hague and the Democrats of New Jersey by the Alabama senator are untrue and I herewith challenge Senator Heflin to substantiate them, either in whole or in part."

Heflin replied that he was merely reading a story in the Trenton Evening Times that Hague was paying expenses of the New Jersey delegates to the convention in exchange for Smith support. He said he accepted the statement of Senator Edwards who will be one of the delegates that his expenses were not being paid.

The Alabama senator then launched into another attack against the south's campaign, declaring that "earnings" of the use of money by

the Smith forces had been found in North Carolina.

"They bought up newspapers, dailies, and weeklies, in the south," he said. "They are throttling and stifling the vehicles carrying information to the public. This is one man. He is using a machine, Tammany, obtaining money from abroad and the whiskey interests to campaign for the presidency."

Heflin said he had not vouched for the truth of the newspaper story he read from Trenton.

Heflin read a letter which he said was sent to him from California by G. D. Cummings and included a newspaper advertisement for Governor Smith as a presidential nominee. He read the letter which asked "who is putting up the money for all this advertising?" And, "is the pope putting it up?"

SINNOTT'S JOB EYED BY SEVEN REPUBLICANS

PORTLAND, Ore., April 24.—Several prominent republicans of the second Oregon district have been mentioned as possible candidates for the republican nomination for congress. Among them are: Bruce Dennis, of Klamath Falls; Roy W. Risher, of Pendleton; Daniel Boyd, of Enterprise; Denton G. Burdick, of Redmond; Fred E. Kiddle, La Grande; E. S. Nelson, Heppner; R. R. Butler, The Dalles, and A. R. Shumway, Milton.

No democratic candidate had filed for nomination but since Sinnett's withdrawal democrats of the second district have indicated that there will be candidates. Former Governor Walter M. Pierce being one of the prospective aspirants.

Judge Norborne Berkeley, of Pendleton, announced himself last week as a democratic candidate.

AMERICAN MINE
HEAD SAID SLAIN
IN SANDINO RAID

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, April 24.—George Marshall, of New York, assistant manager of the La Luz, Los Angeles, mine, seized last week by Sandino and his followers, was reported to have been killed by the rebels in a radio message received today by Clifford D. Ham, collector general of customs from W. J. Crampton, collector of customs at Puerto Cabezas.

Crampton reported that the La Luz mine was robbed of \$1300 cash and merchandise and livestock amounting to \$8,700.
