ROSEBURG'S BUILDING YEAR

Construction projects announced or tentatively planned in Roseburg during the first four months of 1928 give unmistakable and gratifying promise of an annual total very close to, if not surpassing, the record mark of 1925, which was \$511,515, a figure based on official building permits. Since January first, the aggregate total of amounts involved in announced building construction is \$323,000, itemized as follows: Court house, (exclusive of equipment), \$200,000; airport (exclusive of site purchase) \$11,000; New Service Laundry (exclusive of equipment) \$12,000; Medical Arts building, \$60,000; James Hutchings' business block, \$25,000; Baptist church enlargement, \$15,000. In addition to this program there is now being planned for the present year nearly \$75,000 worth of residence and business buildings, the details of which are not ready for public information. And it is a safe assumption that still further building projects will develop with succeeding months, warranting the prediction that when the grand total for 1928 is footed up it will be somewhere around the half-million dollar mark. Taken altogether, the business program, present and prospective, for the present year testifies to the soundness of Roseburg's business conditions and its public spirit. Civic pride is manifest in the projects of a public nature and confidence is evidenced by the investments of private capital in business and residential structures. This is certainly neither the time nor the place for the pessimists and crepe hangers.

TOWNS ALONG WAY GREET CARAVAN ON THE UP COAST RUN

Word has been received by the Chamber of Commerce, that the Redwood Empire Caravan, leaving San Francisco on Wednesday just after lunch, was at Chico yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock, expecting to reach Redding for the night. The schedule adopted for the trip is being carried out successfully, all stops being made on time. All along the way the caravan is meeting with wonderful receptions, lots of people coming out to greet the travelers, offer with town hands and favors in way of fruits or souvenirs. All of the Californians, of whom there were 76 in the caravan leaving Chico, are anticipating their arrival in Oregon, and are expecting a large delegation, headed by Governor Patterson, to meet them at Grants and participate in the trip over the Redwood highway to Crescent City tomorrow. The trip along Roosevelt highway, up the coast from Crescent City includes stops Sunday morning at Fort Ord, Gold Beach, Bandon, etc., and will be enhanced by a group of about 35 Cave Men from Grants Pass. The News-Review and, possibly others, will meet the caravan at Coquille, where lunch is scheduled for the entire party of a hundred or more. The shift to Marshfield after lunch will be brief, owing to caravan schedule to reach Roseburg at six o'clock Sunday evening, and a big crowd is expected to be on hand at the Hotel Rose, where the local band and Umpqua Chiefs and Squaws will do the honors. More band selections and a banquet at the Hotel Umpqua are scheduled at 6:45.

From information received by the local chamber this morning, it is stated that Governor Patterson and party will arrive in Roseburg in time for lunch at The Rose today, and left early for Grants Pass, where he will be guest of honor tonight, officially representing Oregon in welcoming the Golden State delegation. It was also given out officially that Medford

is sending a splendid representation with the caravan at last as far as this city. From here north a number of Roseburg people will join the tour, going to Eugene and perhaps farther. Hope has been expressed that a goodly number of Roseburg cars may join the caravan at least as far as Eugene, expressing therein the good will of this community and the universal desire to participate in the benefits accruing. It has aptly been said that the community which invests the most is the one which reaps the most. Looking at the whole affair from this view point, it is believed Roseburg and her hospitality will long linger in the minds of these people headed this way.

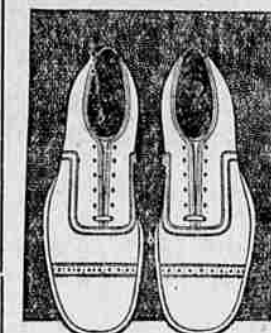
