YONCALLA MAN, TAKEN ILL HERE, DIES AT HOSPITAL

Ezra Jay Odell of Yoncalla was suddenly taken ill while in Roseburg yesterday, and was removed to Mercy Hospital, where he passed away this morning at 10 o'clock at the age of 63 years. He was born in Minnesota on January 1, 1863. He came to Oregon about 18 years ago, locating in Central Point, Ore., and on December 8, 1912, was married to Carrie G. Hazelrigg. He is survived by his wife and two daughters, Thelma and Opal of Yoncalla. Also one brother, Spurgeon Odell of Rio Linda, California. Mr. Odell was well known in Yoncalla, having lived there for several years, and was engaged in farming. He was a member of the M. W. A. of Central Point. The body has been removed to the Douglas Funeral Home and funeral services will probably be held in Stearns' chapel at Yoncalla, next Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

MARTIN MADDEN, CONGRESS VETERAN, PASSES SUDDENLY

WASHINGTON, April 27.—Martin Madden, veteran member of congress from Illinois, died suddenly today. Mr. Madden expired within a few minutes after being stricken by an acute attack of heart trouble. He was 73 years of age.

Martin B. Madden was successful in two fields of effort which do not ordinarily overlap.

Just as in politics he rose from an obscure seat on Chicago's city council to a place of leadership in Congress, so in his earlier years he had climbed from penniless English immigrant and waterboy in a stone quarry to head of a large and prosperous business establishment.

For him, both as business man and public servant, the magic words were effort and economy. Lessons that he learned in his earlier struggle for a living were applied religiously to public fiscal policies in the years he served as head of the House committee on appropriations, which originates all the appropriations for the United States government.

Three times he declined the nomination for mayor of Chicago. Then in 1897 he retired from the council to become a candidate for United States senator, but was defeated. He retained an active part in republican politics, however, and in 1905 was elected to the House, to become quickly one of the great republican triumvirate from Illinois, which included, beside himself, Joseph G. Cannon and James R. Mann.

will play. The other scheduled games are I. O. O. F. vs. National Guard, Tuesday, May 8; DeMolay vs. American Legion, Thursday, May 10; I. O. O. F. vs. DeMolay, Tuesday, May 15; American Legion vs. National Guard, Thursday, May 18.

This is as far as the schedule has so far been completed. There will probably be a break during the week of May 29 as the I. O. O. F. convention and the Strawberry Carnival will be on that week. It is considered very probable that as the lodge convention will be on during the week the I. O. O. F. team will play two games, possibly one against a picked team from the league and the other against an outside team. Thursday is the last day of the convention and the first day of the carnival and it is possible that an outside team may be brought against the I. O. O. F. team to furnish an afternoon attraction for that day. The Roseburg and Myrtle Creek high school teams are to play on the afternoon of the second day of the carnival.

Following the carnival the schedule will be resumed and the regular order of Tuesday and Thursday games carried on.

It is planned to have the games start as soon after 5:15 as possible, which will give plenty of time for 7-inning games, or 9-innings, if desired.

Support Needed

One thing that is absolutely necessary this year is the support of all baseball fans. While the expense of maintaining such a league is not heavy, yet there is some cost attached. The admission fee will be only 10 cents per person and the money will be used to purchase baseballs, bases and other equipment. The personnel of the several teams makes it certain that the games will be well worth attending and it is hoped that the baseball fans of the city will give their support and encouragement to the league, that there may be a revival of baseball interest in the city.

Clubs Have Teams

One indication that there is much interest being shown in baseball this season than in any late year, is the fact that the

three service clubs of the city are blossoming forth with baseball teams.

The Kiwanis club has been meeting with the granges of the county in joint entertainments during the late winter and early spring months and these gatherings have been greatly enjoyed. It has been desired to continue some form of entertainment between the granges and Kiwanis club during the early summer and the club is organizing a baseball team and expects to issue challenges to the various granges of the county for games. It is expected that the contests will be followed by an evening of entertainment in the open air.

The Activians have also organized a team and have challenged the Kiwanis club for a contest. The challenge has been accepted and this game is contemplated for the near future.

Not to be outdone by these two clubs, the Rotary Club has also formed a team and is vowing a debt to the Kiwanis and Activians. The Rotarians met last night and organized their players in preparation for the season. The club has a large number of ex-hall players in its membership and should be able to put a strong team in the field.

The fact that the three service clubs have organized teams is expected to result in a service club tournament at some future date, while there will probably be games arranged also with teams from neighboring cities.
