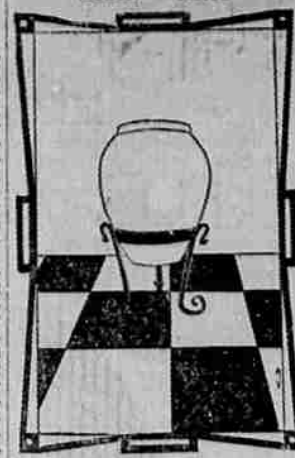
pocketbook. It is not exaggeration, either. Miss Loos has simply hit on the fact that most men are simply "awful" around for some clever little gold-digger to pluck them.

GERTRUDE CLAIRE, 60 YEARS ON STAGE, DEAD

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., April 28.—Gertrude Claire, veteran stage and screen actress, who more than 22 years ago crossed the continent in an old-fashioned "repertoire wagon" to join the first motion picture stock company formed in Los Angeles, died here at her home today. She was 76 years old and had been engaged in theatrical work for more than half a century.

Born in Chicago, Miss Claire made her stage debut at the age of 15. Several seasons later, she was being starred and for many years played with John Drew, Edwin Booth and Richard Mansfield.

In more than 20 years of picture work, she played with every star of prominence in Hollywood. Her last role was that of mother of the character played by Clara Bow in "Red Hair."

Funeral services will be held here Monday afternoon.
