ENGLISH CHURCH VOTES TO REVISE BOOK OF PRAYER

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
LONDON, April 28.—Final approval of the revised prayer book measure of the church of England was voted today at the special session of the church assembly. The measure about which so much controversy has centered now goes to the House of Commons for acceptance or rejection.

The total vote was 395 for the revision and 153 against it, divided as follows in the house of bishops, 32 for and 2 against; in the house of clergy, 183 for and 59 against; in the house of laity, 181 for and 92 against.

BORAH STARTS FIGHT FOR DRY PLANK IN PLATFORM

WASHINGTON, April 28.—Taking to the country his fight for a prohibition plank in the next republican platform, Senator Borah, republican, Idaho, will open his campaign before the Hamilton club at Chicago tomorrow night.

This will be the first in a series of four or five addresses the senator will make on prohibition during the next few weeks but he finds it impossible because of the pressure of work here to make a continuous campaign.

After his Chicago address he will journey forth to speak in both the east and the west. The Idahoan, who has sent prohibition questionnaires to a number of the candidates for the republican presidential nomination is prepared to carry on his fight for a dry plank at the Kansas City convention.

SANDINO'S AMERICAN CAPTIVE WELL TREATED

WASHINGTON, April 28.—State department advisers today said G. B. Marshall, American manager of La Luz Mines in Nicaragua, is still held prisoner by Sandino's forces. Consul Samuel J. Fletcher at Bluefields telegraphed:

"The only employee of La Luz Mining company in danger is G. B. Marshall. Rumors indicate he is still in the hands of Sandino, but is well cared for in Bonanza mine where, according to rumors, Sandino is entertaining him."

American Minister Eberhart at Managua said it was almost impossible to obtain any reliable information in the disturbed area.

CHICAGO HAS \$13,300 TO MEET \$1,000,000 DEBT

CHICAGO, April 28.—The city of Chicago today had an unappropriated balance of only \$13,300 in its corporate fund, official report

of the city comptroller, Charles C. Fitzmorris showed.

Financial experts described the situation as the most acute since 1917, when it was necessary to vote bonds to sustain the corporate fund. The aldermen approved a plan to recall all unexpended appropriations, to defer those pending and to direct department heads to use "coolidge economy."

Against the balance of \$13,300 now on hand, the city has emergency needs and incurred obligations calling for expenditures of \$1,945,421. This means that if the city were to pay all its obligations it would be \$1,932,121 in debt and would have nothing to spend until the beginning of the fiscal year.

McNab, who was 21 years old, was the son of John L. McNab, a San Francisco attorney living here.

IMPEACHMENT CHARGES IN KENNEMAR CASE DROPPED

WASHINGTON, April 28.—The impeachment charges against Federal Judge Frank E. Kennemar of the northern district of Oklahoma were dismissed today by the house judiciary committee.

The charges were dropped after a subcommittee had presented its report that the facts brought out during hearings conducted behind closed doors had not supported the charges which recently were filed against him.

Chairman Graham of the judiciary committee declined to make any statement concerning the case.

MUCH WOOL UNSOLD

PENDLETON, April 28.—About a million pounds of unsold wool remains in the hands of growers in this county, the largest amount of any county in the state, according to local wool authorities.

Growers are declining to contract their crop in advance of shearing operations, preferring to take chances with a raise on the eastern markets.

PENDLETON, April 28.—A special election will be held in Pendleton on June 5 at which time the people will vote on the Vert Memorial proposal, in which Vert, wheat rancher, plans to give the city a \$45,000 memorial auditorium and museum building.

ITALIAN PLANE HITS TREE; BOTH OCCUPANTS UNHURT

DWARF, England, April 28.—Maneuvering a moth airplane at Stagline Airfield, preparatory to a flight to Rome with the Italian physician, Professor Raffaele Bastianelli, the Italian flier, Lieutenant Antonio Locatelli, crashed into the neighboring trees. The wings were completely torn off and onlookers were horrified, expecting a disaster.

The wingless fuselage, however, continued on at a normal flying angle and alighted safely at some distance from the trees. Professor Bastianelli and Lieutenant Locatelli were not hurt.

ONE FIREMAN KILLED NINE IN HOSPITAL

PATERSON, N. J., April 27.—Twelve firemen were buried under 15 feet of debris when the second floor of Lynn's Department store collapsed during a fire today.

Nine of the men were removed to hospitals in a serious condition. One was dead when found.

The three-story brick building was destroyed with a loss estimated at \$250,000.

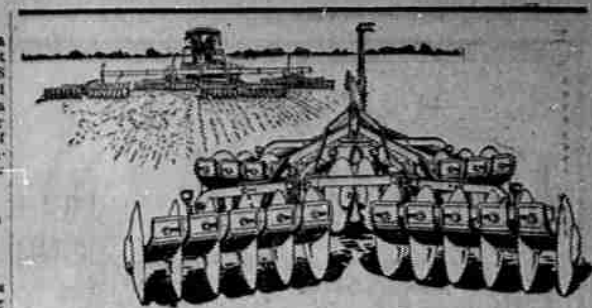

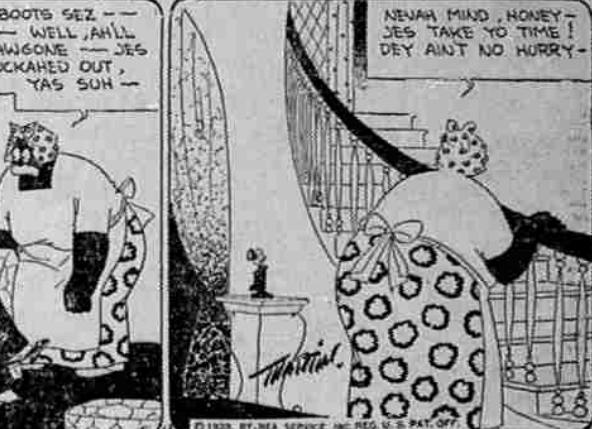
