## Weekly Review of Foreign News

(Associated Press Local Wire)  
In many parts of the world last week the rumbling of earthquakes was followed by death and devastation. Greece and the Balkans suffered most. Whole towns and villages in Thrace, Macedonia and other sections of Greece were thrown down and in some cases almost crumbled into dust. Storms followed the movements of the earth and thousands of helpless people under the fiercest of shelter, suffered intensely.

As in such cases for the Americans were foremost in relief measures.

**War's Human Harvest**  
A great victory was heralded for the nationalist forces in Shanghai province, China, according to early dispatches which later revised, indicating that the nationalists are still in possession of Shanghai, capital of Shanghai.

**Aviation Record**  
Captain George H. Wilkins and Charles S. Ebleton, who successfully flew over the top of the world, crossing past unexplored regions of the Arctic, are at St. Petersburg and are reported to have in mind an expedition to the South Pole. They are to proceed first, however, to Norway by steamer.

Two Polish army aviators, Major Louis Idzikowski and Major Casimir Rubala spent last week in crossing an airplane at Le Bourget, France, for a contemplated flight to America. Their movements have been mysterious although it is said they have had the backing of the Polish government.

Secretary Kellogg's anti-war proposal, the text of which was presented to Great Britain, Italy, Germany and Japan and to which France is agreeable with certain revisions, was well received by these powers. Germany has already accepted the proposal in principle.

**May Tax Petrol**  
The British budget has been presented to parliament by the chancellor of the exchequer with provisions for an eight cent gallon tax on petrol. The chancellor pro-

poses a decrease in expenditures for the coming year and has formulated his budget by reducing taxation on local industries, freight carrying railways, canals and harbors and agriculture.

John Bassett Moore, American judge on the permanent court of international justice at The Hague has resigned after serving since 1921.

The approaching marriage of Sinclair Lewis, American novelist, and an American writer, Miss Dorothy Thompson, was announced at Rose Miss Thompson is the daughter of a New York state politician, and Lewis is the author of "Elmer Gantry" which is considered to have dealt unkindly with a minister. Miss Thompson in commenting on this remarked: "My father was not that kind of a minister."

## KANSAS CITY HOME MADE DEMOLAY HEADQUARTERS

KANSAS CITY, April 30.—(A. P.)—A fine old home mansion among rugged elm and maple trees is the new international headquarters of the Order of DeMolay.

The building, on Armour boulevard, once was the home of the late Dr. J. D. Griffith, pioneer Kansas City surgeon. Now it is occupied by the offices of Frank S. Land, founder and grand scribe of the boys' organization sponsored by the Masonic bodies. Land and his staff direct the affairs of the Order of DeMolay, the International DeMolay Alumni and the Order of Chivalry.

The Order of DeMolay was started in Kansas City nine years ago as a club of nine young men pledged to clean living. It now has more than 1,700 chapters in 1,500 cities and seven countries.

The order is non-sectarian. Although sponsored by the Freemasons, it is not a junior Masonic fraternity. The active members are between 16 and 21 years of age. The Order of Chivalry, being open to boys between 13 and 16.

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## MAY 1 EXPECTED SEE RECORD CHILD HEALTH EVENT

Biggest Health Day in History in Prospect—Catchy Slogan Is Adopted.

Thousands of persons in all parts of the country—laborers and professional men, housewives and society matrons—are expected to join with their children May 1 in observance of Child Health Day.

Combining the object of the American Health Association—which stands for improving the health of children—with the usual May fete celebrations, patriotic organizations, the Children's Aid Society, Boy Scouts, Camp Fire Girls and civic welfare groups are planning to make this year's Child Health Day the most successful since the day was inaugurated five years ago. The slogan adopted for the day is that of the child health campaign—"Better children for our nation; a better nation for our children."

Tracing the growth of this particular May 1 celebration, the Woman's Home Companion, for May, in an editorial containing among other features a "Child's Bill of Rights," by Herbert Hoover, cites the success of the four such occasions previously observed and predicts that this one will be of even greater importance.

"Surveys of eighty-six medium sized cities," says the magazine, "prove that the children there are getting only half the health protection they ought to have. One-third of the cripples are made between the ages of two and six years. In this period the greater part of the blindness, deafness and defective speech is discovered, and should be dealt with. Just at this time, when the foundations of life are laid, the child is most likely to be neglected."

Statistics are cited to show the extent of Child Health days last year, and on the basis of these figures work accomplished on May 1, 1928, is expected to have an important part in improving the general health conditions in the United States.

Statistics given show activities in behalf of children's health last year from the eastern seaboard to California. This year, in addition to such activities in the United States similar work is planned in Hawaii.

Last year's reports show that on May 1 the following results were accomplished in cities and states of the union:

Delaware, in a statewide inventory, found that more than 14,000 children had been given protective inoculation against diphtheria since the previous May Day.

Altogether, more than 1,000 pre-school children were examined. In Connecticut 25,000 households found on their milk bottles the challenge of healthy children. "What many of us have still to learn," says the magazine in urging support of Child Health Day, "is the great truth that death and disease are not the handiwork of an inscrutable Providence or a cruel chance. They are enemies to be fought and conquered by devotion and intelligence and a devoted population. The spirit of Child Health Day is hope."

Child suffrage, at least suffrage to the extent of establishing in the United States a list of minimum rights to which every American child is entitled, is suggested in Herbert Hoover's "The Child's Bill of Rights," which will be featured May 1 in several of American newspapers observing Child Health Day.

For the past four years Child Health Day, as equated in detail in the May Woman's Home Companion, has been observed as part of the nationwide May day festival held in all parts of the country.

Hoover's Child's Bill of Rights follows:

"The child to whom we should strive to that there shall be no child in America:  
"That has not been born under proper conditions.  
"That does not live in hygienic surroundings.  
"That ever suffers from undernourishment.  
"That does not have prompt and efficient medical attention and inspection.  
"That does not receive primary instruction in the elements of hygiene and good health.  
"That has not the complete birthright of a sound mind in a sound body.  
"That has not the encouragement to express in fullest measure the spirit within, which is the final endowment of every human being."

## SUNDAY TRAGEDIES

H. E. La Rue, pilot for the Air Transport company, and two men passengers were killed Sunday when their airplane went into a tailspin and crashed into a street on the outskirts of Denver, Colo. Loren Craven of Littleton and Emil Deidrich of Brighton were the passengers.

Mrs. Eugene Van Wert, aged about 45, committed suicide Sunday by hanging herself in the barn at her home one mile south of Goshen, Lane county, Oregon. Melancholia is believed to have prompted the act.

Before the eyes of hundreds of horrified spectators, three men were burned to death in mid-air in their machine airplane Sunday at Eureka, Calif. The plane was piloted by William Spierdix of the Redwood air line. It carried Billy Wenzel and Larry Beatty, local musicians, as passengers.

Major John T. Fancher, 37, commander of the 1st division air service unit, Washington national guard, died in Wasmachoe Sunday from injuries received when an aerial bomb he was holding in his hand exploded.

Two dead, three injured, probably fatally, and one badly bruised and cut are the toll of a collision between an automobile and a Southern Pacific train at Park Place crossing at the Clackamas river, near Gladstone, Oregon, Sunday. The automobile was driven by George M. Rice, Portland, who with Mrs. Rice and their four children had left early in the afternoon for a drive up the Clackamas river. The dead are: Wallace Rice, four-months-old son; Charles Rice, 8, who was hurled into the Clackamas river and drowned. The injured: George M. Rice, 35, internal injuries; Mrs. Rice, 25, skull fractured and internal injuries; George M. Rice, Jr., 9, skull fractured; Harold Edward Rice, 5, possible internal injuries and lacerated cuts and bruises.

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## SCOVILLE DRAWS HUGE CROWDS TO CHRISTIAN CHURCH

Before a crowd that far outnumbered any crowd since the opening of the Charles Reigh Scoville predication evangelistic campaign one week ago, Dr. Scoville, most dynamic of living evangelists, last night, with perspiration oozing from every pore in his body, his long arm raised accusingly, his right foot pounding the platform, his eyes flashing fire and snatching with intense feeling which even his marvelous flow of language failed to adequately express—threw caution to the winds as he uncorked his great sermon entitled, "The Great Salvation." How! How! How! Was the dominant ringing note of last night's sermon. "How shall we escape if we neglect so great salvation?" The most dramatic moment of the evening came when the evangelist, exceedingly anxious and desperately determined to make the audience feel the truth of his theme, raised one of the big wooden chairs above his head, shouting, "I would like to crash this chair to the floor breaking it in a thousand pieces and send this pulpit crashing through the floor into the basement below to make your judgment-bound souls feel the awful truth of my text which says, 'For if the message delivered through angels proved to be true, and every transgression and act of disobedience met with just retribution, how shall we escape if we neglect so great salvation?'"

In the afternoon service for men and boys only the revivalist handed out cakes to his crowd right off the griddle as he made a terrific verbal attack on sins that overcame men and boys sending them headlong into hell. His theme, "Overcome," was handled without kid gloves and he called a spade a spade and an ace an ace, yes and Scoville called sin sin. At the same hour Rev. James Axtell addressed a fine audience of women and girls in the South Methodist church on, "Mother's Faith," pointing out the necessity of the 28th century mother maintaining the same high level of faith that characterized the mothers of olden times.

Thirty-five Converts Won  
Sunday's services were opened at 9:45 a. m. with a big increase in Sunday school attendance. Dr. Scoville made it plain that it was not the desire of himself or members of the Christian church to build up their Sunday school by tearing down another but maintained that there are enough unchurched people in Roseburg to have a Sunday school of at least 500 for next Sunday, May 6th, when the new church will be dedicated. At the close of the session the evangelist gave a talk and extended the first gospel invitation of the campaign and twenty-seven persons walked down the aisle, twenty-two making the good confession and five coming by letter statement. Another fine group was won at the night service.

Arlene Dix Scoville, wife of the evangelist, whose singing is proving such a mighty factor in the meetings, covered herself with glory throughout the day singing four superb solos with each song arguing for the greatest of this noted gospel singer who has won undying praise in every great center of America where she has appeared. Her vocal offering, last night entitled, "Ever You Let Your Room This Morning Did You Think to Pray," simply captivated the audience holding them spellbound until the last note had been sung.

Beginning Tuesday immediately after school, Mrs. Scoville will organize the booster choir composed of children of every church as well as those with no church affiliation between the age of four and fourteen. This will be a real opportunity for the children to gain a lot of Bible knowledge and the drill is worth \$10.00 to any child but does not cost them a cent. At the end of the booster program special prizes will be given to every child who attends regularly and those earning certain credits will be presented with a diploma signed by Mrs. Scoville. Preaching Sunday night's service Rev. William R. Bahr baptized a number of persons, who made the confession earlier in the day. During the baptismal service Dr. Scoville gave the Bible teaching on the subject.

Preliminary plans for the dedication of the new church will be considered this evening when a committee of thirty will meet for luncheon in the dining room of the new church. Dr. Scoville has dedicated a number of churches, the last one being the great temple at Tampa, Florida, which cost \$275,000.

The revival will be resumed Tuesday, 4:15 p. m.
