

Divorce Worries Dolores Del Rio

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., April 27.—How will the news of her divorce be greeted by her thousands of Catholic followers?

That is the thing that is bothering Dolores Del Rio, the Mexican screen star confided exclusively to the writer just before boarding the train for Nogales, Mexico, to file her suit for divorce from her husband, Jaime Del Rio.

The actress, whose rise in the sensational, practically admitted that she would have taken this step for a permanent separation some time ago had it not been for the fear of her standing among those of her faith.

Will Not Marry Again

"However, since I have no intention of ever marrying again, I feel that I have not violated a single law of the church," says Mrs. Del Rio. "The laws of our church say nothing about divorces. They merely state that a divorced person shall not remarry."

On April 11, 1921, Dolores Anunsio, then only 15 years old, and fresh from a convent where she had spent most of her early life, became Mrs. Jaime Del Rio. Both were members of prominent

Mexican families. Two and a half years ago Dolores and her husband came to Hollywood and the Mexican beauty embarked upon her cinema career, guided by Edwin Carewe. For a while things moved along very smoothly. Then the breach started, as breaches will start in celluloid families. The break came shortly before Christmas of last year when Del Rio departed for New York. He has not returned.

"Our divorce is due solely to lack of compatibility between us," declares Dolores. "We had hoped that a separation would end our difficulties, but it failed, so we are following the only course left—a divorce."

Plan Separate Careers

"I have absolutely no thought of re-marriage and feel confident that Jaime is of the same opinion. We both have our careers, mine on the screen and his in the literary world, and we felt that we could pursue them to better advantage separately."

Dolores' career really was the start of the trouble. Until they came to the movie village, Jaime was the absolute head of the family. In Hollywood things were reversed. He became merely Dolores Del Rio's husband. He stood it as long as he could and then left.

**OFFICERS HOLD
OAK CREEK MAN
WAS A SUICIDE**

Her husband ran ahead of her however, and told his brother, Delbert, to tell Mrs. Singleton, that he had not seen Ed for a couple of days. As the woman went back to the house, her husband, who had carried his rifle with him, went up on a slight knoll behind the house. Mrs. Singleton, accompanied by Phyllis Pemberton, the ten year old daughter of a neighbor, went back to the house and there Mr. Singleton met them and opened up the house for his wife and assisted her to load furniture, a stove and other articles into the car, apparently being in good spirits. He helped her get the car across a small stream and then apparently went back to the wood lot. Whether he became despondent because of the domestic troubles and killed himself, or whether the rifle was accidentally discharged is a problem which is a difficult matter to solve.

The position of the body and the weapon can fit either theory. Mr. Singleton had apparently been trimming away the lower limbs of an apple tree. Just behind him was a small tree that had been cut through, and the butt was still resting on the stump, the trunk being about three feet above the ground.

Mr. Singleton's body was found lying face down, parallel to the trunk in the small space between the fallen tree and the apple tree, the gun was under one leg. The bullet had struck the chest, just over the heart, and had penetrated almost directly through the body, coming out through the back. The gun was a heavy .22 caliber rifle, which had been bored out to .25 calibre.

Those who believe that the case was one of accident, think that Mr. Singleton had placed his gun against the trunk of the fallen tree and had started to pull it to his side when the trigger became entangled in the brush and caused the discharge of the weapon.

No Inquest

Because of the fact that there were no witnesses to the accident, it has been decided that no inquest is necessary. The members of the officers feel that there is no use going to the expense of such an inquiry when it has been established that no second party had any part in the tragedy. The gun was thoroughly examined by a finger print expert and found no fingerprints upon the barrel and stock, but all impressions were made by Singleton himself.

The body was brought to Roseburg Saturday afternoon and an examination was made yesterday by physicians.

In view of all the facts surrounding the case, the officers have reached a decision that an inquest is unnecessary and the expense of an inquiry is not justified. Mr. Singleton, who was a very well known resident of the county, was a native of Douglas county, being born upon the farm where his death occurred. He reached the age of 37 years on the 15th of this month. He was survived by his wife, and two small children, also his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Singleton and two brothers. The funeral services are to be held at 2 p. m. Tuesday, at the Elks' temple. Mr. Singleton having been a member of the local lodge. Rev. Frank Matlock, pastor of the Baptist church, will officiate at the funeral and interment will take place in the Oak Creek cemetery. M. E. Ritter, of the Roseburg Undertaking company, is in charge of arrangements.

**PRESIDENTIAL
CAMPAIGN FUND
PROBE ORDERED**

WASHINGTON, April 29.—The senate today ordered an investigation of presidential campaign expenditures.

Within a few minutes after it was offered, a resolution by Senator Robinson, Arkansas, the Democratic leader, proposing the inquiry was adopted.

The resolution went through without debate or a record vote. The audit committee to which it was referred after being introduced at the opening of the session, limited the expenses of the committee to \$25,000.

**BLEASE ATTACK 12
U. S. LAND BANKS**

WASHINGTON, April 29.—Charging that conditions "approaching a national scandal" existed in six of the twelve federal land banks, Senator Blease, Democrat, South Carolina, introduced a resolution today asking Secretary Mellon to transmit to the senate the annual report of the federal farm loan board for last year.

The senate banking committee today ordered a favorable report on the La Follette resolution directing the federal reserve board to take steps to curb the increase in brokers loans by member banks of the federal reserve system.

FINDING OF TRUCK**

Sheriff Webb was informed today that a Ford truck had been abandoned at the Roy Agre place near Wilbur under very suspicious circumstances. The car had been driven down to the river bank and its contents had been scattered over considerable distance, many articles being thrown into the river. From what the officers could learn the car had contained a complete camping outfit. The license plates had been thrown away and the engine numbers had been chiseled off to destroy all possible means of identification. An attempt was made to burn the car but there was little damage done to the machine. Officers are making an investigation of the affair.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 30.—The week commencing tomorrow and lasting through May 7 has been designated by the bureau of agricultural economics as "national egg week."

The purpose of the campaign is to increase the per capita consumption of eggs. "Eggs for vitamins," "take your iron in eggs," "eat eggs every day," were a few of the slogans prepared by the national poultry council.

Prices of eggs and butter were unchanged on local wholesale markets today with a firm undertone noticeable on all grades.

Pork prices were slightly higher at the opening today on country dressed meat, markets with best light hogs bringing 15 cents up. Indications are that pork prices will continue to advance slightly probably to 16 or 17 cents within the next few months. Last year prices went as high as 20 cents but dealers do not look for the market to reach that level this year. Veal continued draggy with receipts heavy and considerable holdover supply on hand.

Poultry markets were quiet this morning with quotations about on a level with Saturday's close. He-

celts were moderate and demand slow.

Dry Oregon yellow Danvers onions were scarce and dealers expect wholesale prices to reach 41 cents for No. 1 onions by the end of the week.
