PLANS ARE MADE FOR DEDICATION NEW OF BUILDING

The pre-dedication evangelistic campaign being conducted in the new Christian church by the Scoville evangelistic company will be concluded Sunday, May 6th when the beautiful new building will be dedicated by Dr. Charles Reig, Scoville of Chicago. BALL SCORES IN MAJOR LEAGUES

Carried along on the crest of a six game winning streak, Connie Mack's Philadelphia Athletics were entrenched in third place in the American league today.

Rube Walberg, one-half of the great left handed team of Grove and Walberg, held the Red Sox to six hits and fanned a half dozen in the Athletics, 4 to 1 victory yesterday.

The Yankees retained their hold on first place by giving the Senators their seventh straight defeat at Washington, 8 to 4.

Buckeye and Brown were pounded for 14 hits as the St. Louis Browns trounced the Indians at Cleveland, 19 to 3.

Detroit suffered a 10 to 6 beating at Chicago as the White Sox hammered four Tiger pitchers for 14 hits. Bill Cissell, costly Sox shortstop, hit safely in his 13th consecutive game.

Brooklyn found its grip on first place in the National league shattered to halt a game as the New York Giants buried the Robins under a 14 to 4 score at the Polo Grounds.

Seved Cardinal errors enabled the Cincinnati Reds to beat St. Louis, 6 to 4, at the Mount City.

Sparky Adams' single in the eighth gave the Pittsburgh Pirates one run and an 8 to 7 verdict over the Chicago Cubs.

Kiki Cuyler was star on the Cubs' attack and defense.

The Boston Braves scored in every inning but the fifth in trouncing the uakers at Philadelphia, 12 to 6.

FISH COMMISSION BOAT DESTROYED

Another event of the fish war at Winchester took place last week when a boat belonging to the fish commission was destroyed from its moorings, floated down the river and then cut in two. The boat was constructed by H. B. Hastings and was practically new. It was valued at about \$40. Sometime between Thursday night and early Friday morning someone took the boat from Mr. Hastings' landing, drifted it about a mile down stream and there pulled it up on the bank and sawed it through the center, completely destroying the boat.

These acts of depredation have been on long standing in the Winchester district. One warden's tent and camping equipment were burned. Another warden's fence was cut in numerous places to allow him a financial loss and to let his stock out of the pasture. Several boats furnished by the fish commission for the use of its employees have been burned or otherwise damaged. Recently the fishladder in the Winchester river dam was dynamited.

It is believed that these things are done by poachers who are warring upon the forces that are endeavoring to prevent illegal fishing in the vicinity of the Winchester dam.

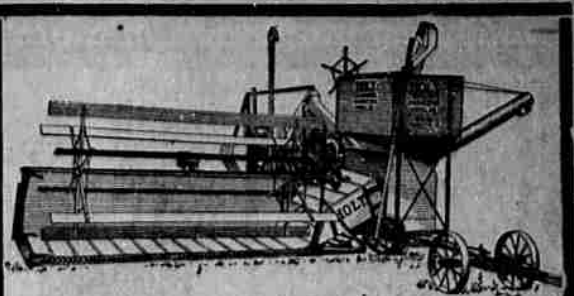

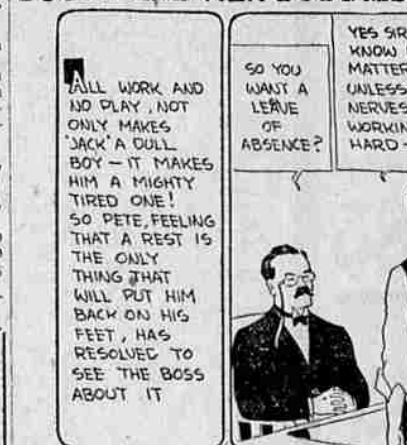
