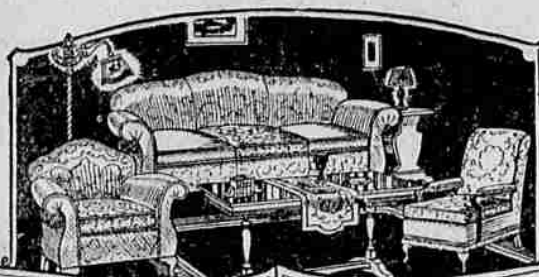

any prominence remaining in China.

He turned up here six years ago with a letter of recommendation from revolutionary Chinese in Edmonton, Canada, whence he hailed. After he had given one display of his prize feat of marksmanship—throwing two coins in the air simultaneously, drawing two pistols and hitting both coins in mid-air—the job of bodyguard and chauffeur to Dr. Sun was his.

When the Kuomintang leader died in 1925 his will stipulated that Cohen should have a life job in the Canton government's central bank. This he held, until he became involved in the Red uprising of last December. The upshot was his purchase of a one way ticket from the scene of the six-year phase of this adventure's career.

Northern Army Retreats
TOKYO, May 1.—A war office dispatch today said that the nationalist forces entered Tsinan, capital of Shantung, at 1 a. m. this morning. The city was evacuated

by the northern generals, Chang Tsung-chang and Sun Chuan-fang late last night.

The northern forces are retreating to Tschow, 60 miles north of Tsinan.

Chinese gendarmes and police are maintaining order in Tsinan, but looting was prevalent throughout the city during the night.

The Japanese foreign office stated today that the Chinese nationalist authorities agreed to permit Japanese troops, recently landed at Tsinan to protect Japanese interests in Shantung, to go to Tsinan by rail without hindrance.

Socialists Parade

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia, May 1.—The three socialist parties celebrated May day with parades and mass meetings in which over 100,000 persons participated.

The parades carried banners denouncing capitalism and demanding division of the church from state and school while the communists demanded the immediate release of Bela Kun, the Hungarian communist, from jail in Vienna.

The parades were comparatively orderly, as adequate protective measures had been taken by the police.

S. P. IRON HORSES ARE STILL GROWING

Southern Pacific today placed orders approximating \$1,400,000 for ten of the heaviest locomotives in use west of Ogden and the longest locomotives yet constructed for the company, according to F. W. Mahl, general purchasing agent, with headquarters at San Francisco.

The new iron horses will be 120 feet long over all and sixteen feet four inches high. When loaded they will weigh 895,100 pounds and have a tractive power of 112,760 pounds. Unlike most locomotives these will have the cab built in the front of the engine so that the engineer will have an unobstructed view.

The locomotives will burn oil and have boiler pressure capacity of 235 pounds which exceeds that of any other locomotive now used by the railroad. Steam from the one boiler will be used through two pairs of cylinders to drive two sets of driving wheels each having eight wheels.

The locomotives will be built in the East and will be equipped with modern appliances. They will be delivered to the company by the end of August and will operate on the Overland route between Roseville, California, and Sparks, Nevada.

203 MILLION TAX SLASH MAXIMUM, SMOOT DECLARES

Democrats, However, Plan to Continue Struggle in the Senate for One Third More.

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

WASHINGTON, May 1.—The \$212,000,000 surplus in sight for next year represents the maximum reduction possible in taxes at this session, Chairman Smoot reported today in laying before the senate the committee's \$203,000,000 measure on behalf of the republican members of the senate finance committee.

"Even this amount," Senator Smoot said in his report, "must be reduced by additional expenditures called for during the fiscal year 1929 by new legislation."

The committee chairman gave notice he would ask the senate to take up the measure on Thursday, although a sharp fight is in prospect with democrats prepared to ask for \$325,000,000 reduction program, leaders expect to dispose of the measure by the end of next week.

Senator Simmons, of North Carolina, ranking democrat on the committee, announced today he would file no minority report because "the issue between the democrats and republicans on tax reduction is so simple that no explanation is necessary." He said he would present the democrats' \$325,000,000 plan on the floor. The main difference between that and the republican scheme is for a great cut in the corporation rate which the democrats would slash to 11 per cent.

EXAMINATIONS FOR CHILDREN OF PRE-SCHOOL AGE URGED

The national congress for parents and teachers is holding its third annual campaign for the summer round-up of children and has enlisted the aid of the local health unit.

Statistical studies reveal an amazing number of correctable defects among all children, including beginners. It is especially for the benefit of the last mentioned that the Parent-Teacher Associations are holding summer clinics to prepare the youngsters for their school career.

The national congress of parents and teachers asks that one pre-school clinic be held in the spring and another in September or October to determine the number of defects corrected as a result of the first clinic.

The parents of all next year's first grade pupils should avail themselves of this opportunity. Local doctors, according to the choice of the Parent-Teacher associations of the local schools are assisted by the health unit to make the examination. The Parent-Teacher associations realize that physical and mental ability are so closely related that any physical handicap can seriously retard a child's program in school and want every child to be given a fair chance.

The local Parent-Teacher associations and the health unit have made plans for such clinics in all the grade schools in Roseburg. They are scheduled as follows: Rose school, May 9th; Benson school, May 2nd; Fullerton school, May 4th.
