The Answers
1. When both declarer and dummy hold singletons or short suits, and trumps can be used in cross-carrying.
2. Lead lowest if honor higher than 10.
3. J if you have no better suit to play.

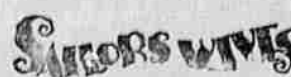

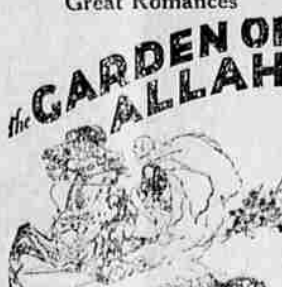
