Japan Steps Out With New Ideas



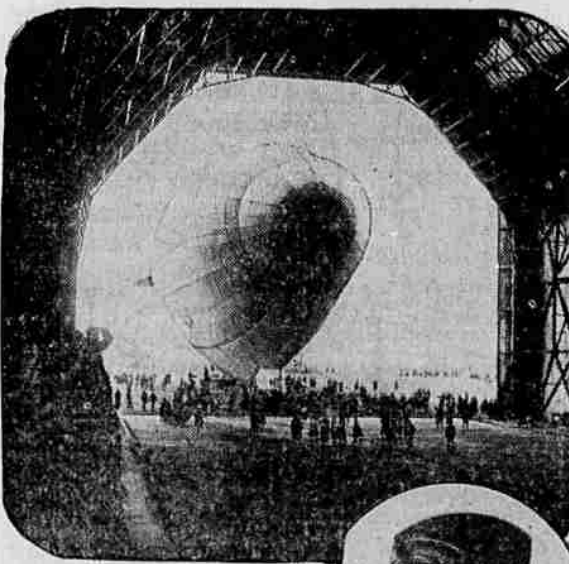
