RIOT MAY COST LIFE OF
SAILOR; ONE GETS JAIL

PANAMA, May 8.—Ensign Frank J. Donohue, a native of Milwaukee, attached to the U. S. cruiser, Rochester, has been sentenced to serve sixty days in the Panama jail by a police magistrate following a fight.

The story was told that Donohue had resisted the efforts of a policeman to make him pay a fare demanded by a "jitney" driver. J. J. Wagoner, a sailor of the U. S. navy boat Nitro, who was stabbed during the riot the argument precipitated, was alive today but his case was believed hopeless. Others injured in the affair were said to be out of danger.
